

n Palm Sunday, April 9th, we celebrate Jesus' arrival into Jerusalem — the City of David. Jesus entered the city to a throng of his followers waving palm branches and shouting, "Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord". When told to tone down the level of enthusiasm, Jesus said, "If I told them to be quiet, even the stones underneath my feet would cry out."

Palm Sunday will be a very festive day at CCPC. In worship, we will introduce new members to the congregation. We will sing the festive songs and have a short drama explaining the significance of the day. We will also use the day to dedicate our new audio and video system in the Sanctuary.

The installation of the new sound system started right after the first of the year. The new system provides increased amplification of the choir. We also updated the wireless systems and installed new microphones for the lecterns. A new speaker cluster provides better coverage for the Sanctuary. All these inputs are mixed with a new digital mixer. The upgrade greatly improves our capacity to record our worship services. If you missed a recent service, go to our website: ccpc.bowiemd.org. Click on worship, then sermons, find the date of the service, click and listen. These recordings are available by Monday morning.

After the sound system was in place, the Session decided to upgrade our projection systems. We decided to replace the 10-year-old projector (a memorial gift by Dick and Nancy Arnold in memory of Nancy's mother) with one that is 2 and ½ times brighter. This really helps overcome the ambient light in our Sanctuary. We decided to install a screen of the same dimensions in the balcony. This new screen, powered by a new projector, allows the choir to see the words clearly and eliminates the blind spots for those who sit in the far left corner. Don Genson worked on the design and researched equipment. Bob Brutout installed the screen. Bob and Dennis Evans oversaw the installation and integration of the new projectors. The plan is to use the old projector in Dodds Hall and install a large retractable screen on the front wall. This system will be used for educational programs, performances, and lectures.

The total cost of the audio and video systems was about \$50,000. The seed money came from a large gift left by Carl Neumann and his sister, Leslee Neumann Black, in memory of their parents, Ada Mae and Harold Neumann. Bob Rice also designated a gift in memory of his parents. The balance of the money came from memorial gifts. See the list below. We will have a brief dedication ceremony and the names and pictures of the honorees will be projected:

Palm Sunday is also the date for the Open House for another project that has been quietly underway for several months. Elder Emelie Rubin headed a committee to come up with a plan to repurpose our old library/former pastors office/children's ministry resources room/multipurpose room in Dodds Hall. Yes, it has had many uses. A huge book sale in early February, headed by Kim Tavel, cleared out hundreds of old books. You might have voted for the color scheme and design theme. The room will now be called the "Belair Room" and will serve as a meeting room, classroom, reading room, and quiet space. With Emelie keeping the project on task, Bob Brutout has completed the work. The funds for this renovation work came from a gift by Mary Frances, in memory of her husband, Jack Jones. The Session invites you to tour the room on your way to the third Lenten luncheon: the Second Annual Pasta Palooza, hosted by Children's ministry.

Take a moment to give thanks for the lives of CCPC Saints whose service to the Lord motivated the giving of gifts in their honor.

Worship Notes

April 2nd

Fifth Sunday in Lent: The Conversion of the diminutive chief tax collector, Zacchaeus, (*Luke 19:1-10*) is a shocking and beautiful story. This is the joyful conclusion of Jesus' ministry as he prepares to enter Jerusalem. Jesus declares, "Today, salvation has come to this house." In Zacchaeus's new life, we find the three aspects of salvation Jesus wants to bring to our lives and our world.

HOLY WEEK SERVICES

April 9th Palm Sunday

Jesus carefully orchestrates his much-anticipated arrival into the capital city of Jerusalem. His rowdy band of followers make so much noise, the Pharisees, always nervous about arousing the Romans, told him to tone down the hoopla. Jesus responds that even if he could, "The very stones would cry out." *Luke 19:29-44*. The children are included in the opening processional.

Maundy Thursday Communion Service 7:30PM

On the night Jesus was arrested, he inaugurated a ceremony through which the church would remember him. In John's version of the Last Supper (*John 13:1-17. 31-35*), when Jesus says, "Do this," he is not referring to breaking bread and sharing a common cup of wine and remembering him through this symbolic act. Instead, he says, "Wash feet." What example is Jesus setting for us?

Good Friday Service at 7:30PM

We will offer a Tenebrae Service of the Passion readings and the extinguishing of candles. The service will include a rich variety of music: choral, instrumental, and congregational songs.

THE CELEBRATION OF THE RESURRECTION: EASTER SUNDAY, APRIL 16th

Sunrise Service at 7:00AM in the Memorial Garden

We will read *John 20,* that focuses on the personal encounter the Risen Lord had with Mary Magdalene. Mary moves from weeping, to turning towards Jesus, to announcing the incredible news that Jesus is alive. We will conclude with communion. The service will run about 30 minutes and will take place in the Memorial Garden.

The Celebration of the Resurrection – Easter Sunday

Services will be at 8:30 and 10:30AM. We will sing the classic Easter hymns and enjoy special choral and instrumental music. The sermon title is "When Does Your Life Really Begin? The text is the resurrection of Jesus' friend, Lazarus, in *John 11: 1-53*.

Children's Easter Program

The program (including the Easter Egg Hunt, Blossoming of the Cross, and the Easter lesson) is at 9:30-10:15AM. Families are encouraged to come early and share breakfast.

The Session will host **a hot Easter breakfast** of scrambled eggs, pancakes, sausage, fruit, juice, and coffee from 7:30-8:30AM. A **continental breakfast** will be served from 8:30-9:30AM to accommodate families arriving for the Children's Easter program.





Christmas in April

Christmas in April, in partnership with local communities, rehabilitates the houses of low-income homeowners, particularly the elderly and people with disabilities, so that they may continue to live in warmth, safety, and independence. Founded in 1988 and headquartered in Washington DC, Christmas in April is a nonprofit organization with affiliates throughout the country. The local affiliates identify homes for rehabilitation and volunteer house captains assess the level and type of work required and prepare lists of chores to be completed. The event culminates on the last Saturday in April when volunteers report to their assigned home to complete the various chores.

This year, CCPC is partnering with All Saints Lutheran Church to rehabilitate a home for an elderly woman in Pointer Ridge. The chores include a bit of yard work, power washing the house, removing a shed, and a bunch of painting inside.

The work will start at

7:30 AM on Saturday, April 29th

and lunch will be provided. We are looking for about 6 to 8 volunteers from CCPC. Youth ages 14 and up are welcome, especially if they need to earn some service hours.
