

fter we arrived in Denver early last Tuesday, Andrea and I drove down to Colorado Springs. We had lunch and then attempted to drive up the 19-mile highway to the clouds to the top of Pikes Peak. We were stopped a half mile short of the top when a snowstorm shut down the road. I was disappointed. We turned back and endured a heavy hailstorm on the way to the hotel downtown. Crazy weather!

We had a lovely dinner that night with former CCPC friends: Pete, Marie, Erin, and Ben Farney.

If you love mountains, you would love Colorado. The state boasts of 54 peaks that exceed 14,000 feet. From almost anywhere in the state you can see the snowcapped Rockies, even in June. Hiking and mountain biking are sports Colorado natives embrace once the ski season ends.

Climbing prominent mountains has made its way onto the bucket lists of type A personalities. In recent years, Nepal has had to limit the number of climbers attempting to reach the summit of Mount Everest. The numerous fatalities, some graphically portrayed in movies, have not deterred the ambitious and/or, foolhardy.

On June 7, the *New York Times* had an article about the record-breaking ascent of California's Yosemite Valley's spectacular El Capitan. This 3000-foot sheer vertical granite wall attracts sports climbers from around the world. You have certainly seen pictures of climbers suspended from the face in their overnight sleeping bags. In 2011 "60 Minutes" ran a segment on climbers who successfully scale the mountain without ropes or other paraphernalia clipped to pre-drilled bolts or wedged into the cracks. These daredevils are called free solos. On June 3, Alex Honnold, 31, made what is being called the greatest climbing feat yet, a free solo up the wall in only four hours.

Immediately after the ascent, *Times* reporter Mike McPhae asked Honnold several questions. *What goes into pre- paring for a climb like this?* Honnold said it is half-mental and half-physical. The physical side of it is quite a bit of work. Going on the training wall every day to figure out the different holds that feel the most secure. The mental side is the bigger unknown. That's the part where you just imagine the whole experience and process it for a long time then wait until you are ready.

Were there any doubts going into the climb? Not so much, Honnold replied. "A couple of years ago when I looked at the wall it was all fear. But now, because of the preparation, and all the time I've spent visualizing and imagining when I got to the peak this morning, all I could think was, this is going to be awesome."

We live in an age where things that were only recently imagined are coming true. Space X goes up and launches its satellites into space and then backs down to a pinpoint landing on a barge with greater ease than I can parallel park my Prius. We have driverless cars. Siri and Alexa instantly provide for all our needs with just a voice command.

In his book, "Drawdown," Editor Paul Hawkins details the 100 most substantial solutions to reverse global warming. In the face of widespread fear and apathy, an international coalition of researchers, professionals, and scientists has come together to offer a set of realistic and bold solutions to climate change. These solutions currently exist, are economically viable, and communities around the world are currently enacting them with skill and determination. The editor believes that if deployed collectively on a global scale over the next 30 years, they offer a credible path to not only slowing carbon emissions but also drawing down the greenhouse gases in the atmosphere. The plans also save trillions of dollars and produce millions of jobs.

Like the climb up El Captian, it all started with Alex Honnold's imagination. Then, over a period of three years, he devised a simple but competent action plan. The impossible is made to look almost easy. There are few things the human mind cannot accomplish. Never underestimate the good that is possible when people use their God-given gifts to work for the improvement of human society.

If you have sporty children, maybe they should consider climbing. Climbing on artificial walls will be an Olympic event at the 2020 Tokyo games. Get outside and enjoy God's beautiful creation.
