

60 Minutes had a segment this past Sunday on the homeless crisis in Portland, Oregon. Portland is my hometown. Actually, I'm from Vancouver, Washington, the neighbor right across the Columbia River, recently rated "The number one Hipster City" in America. Places always become much cooler when I leave. Anyways, Portland has one of the hottest housing markets in America. This is good news for people who enjoy seeing their net worth soar. This is very bad news for the thousands of people who are just trying to find an affordable place to rent.

The perennial question is what to do about rising homelessness in American cities? Homelessness usually peaks with the top of the real estate cycle. Increasingly, job opportunities are located in popular urban areas where housing need far exceeds supply. This is not the first housing crisis. In the 1980's, New York City had over 50,000 homeless residents. Prohibited by city ordinance to house homeless people in their basement, Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church set up cardboard shelters over the heating grates at the entrance to their historic sanctuary. A few dozen folks lived in this makeshift shelter.

One ongoing program to combat homelessness is the shelter program Warm Nights. Warm Nights is a partnership. The county offers grants to an agency that provides professional services and transportation and churches offer space and provide meals. This program has improved in recent years as the county, along with other government agencies around the country, actively seeks permanent housing for families. Hotel Magnate Conrad Hilton funded a study that proved the sooner families are in permanent housing the better they fare and the lower overall cost to the government. Each year I spend time talking to our guests. I am always reminded of how vulnerable folks are in America. A successful worker gets injured and pretty soon they get evicted from their apartment and have their car repossessed. The hole gets deep fast.

I think people care, but that care of often overshadowed by NIMBYism (i.e. Not in My Back Yard). We honestly want the best for others, but just don't do it in my neighborhood. Most affluent communities have strict zoning codes and local ordinances to prohibit groups, including churches, from providing services. An Illinois man named Greg Shiller opened the basement of his suburban home in Elgin, a Chicago suburb, during the recent bitter cold snap. "No way!" said city officials. They immediately shut down Mr. Shillers "slumber party" because it violated a number of municipal ordinances.

Mr. Shiller, 53, is a man of modest means. A mechanic, who sees his real calling working with the homeless. Shiller was a founding member of a nonprofit group called Matthew 25:40. The group is named after the New Testament passage where Jesus says, "whatever you did for the least of these, you did it for me." It should be noted that Mr. Shiller doesn't open his basement on an ongoing basis; just when the windchill at might goes below -15.

On those bitter cold nights, Shiller provides entertainment. He screens G rated movies like "Lassie." Shiller stays up talking to his guests. By morning, he considers them his friends. Like many things in America, this battle between Shiller and Elgin will probably end up in court. Jeff Rowe, an attorney at the Institute of Justice, in Arlington VA is taking on Shiller as a client. "Fundamentally, you have a right to rescue people unless there is evidence you'll do more harm than good." Rowe calls it, "The right to be a Good Samaritan."

As I read my news feed, I see the Stock Market is attaining another record high. Below this headline is an article that reports still stagnant wage gains. Below this, I read the state of Kentucky is adding more fees to Medicaid recipients, including some who earn as little as \$5200 a year. The cost of being poor is going up.



The CCPC LWW team was scheduled to travel to Honduras in January 2018 to help install a water purification system, but we've postponed that trip due to political unrest in the country. Although the situation has not been widely reported in the US media, it is very serious and disrupting normal activities in Honduras. Not only is the US State Department recommending that US citizens not make any unnecessary trips to Honduras, but our Honduran LWW staff is recommending that we not come in January.

#### We are postponing our trip until April 13 – 21, 2018.

Our sincere thanks to all who came to our workshop last Saturday and helped us prepare for the trip. We encourage you to pray for our LWW staff in Honduras, for the people of Agua Zarca who are expecting us to provide a water purification system, and for all who are affected by the unrest in Honduras.
