Thanks to a generous gift of a Presbyterian elder 65 of us gathered at the Dunes Manor Resort for 2 days of worship, bible study, and fellowship over meals. We all enjoyed the break. It seems like this was an especially long and tough January. The January 29 issue of *The New Yorker* magazine cover shows a shivering woman waiting for a bus with a calendar with brief descriptions of the day's theme. January 1: Hangover, January 2: Lost keys in the snow, January 5: Slipped on ice. A three-day stretch: cold, grey, ugly. For three days in the middle of the month, it just says "flu." January 23: "Still January." My father's advice would be, this too shall pass.

Ground Hog's Day is February 2nd. Whether Punxsutawney Phil sees his shadow or not, we will be through the worst of winter and we can sense the coming of the glorious Maryland springtime. Okay, not glorious if you suffer from Maryland seasonal allergies. January's cold and wet weather provides plenty of time for reflection about the past year. You can read that in our annual report. It is also a good time to make plans and set goals for the year.

The recent issue of the *Presbyterian Outlook* is on church leadership. It might be called church leadership in stormy times. As attendance in worship has declined across the country, leadership has often blamed the culture. Millennials are spiritual, but not religious. Many are simply neither. Like the lone surfer in the bitterly cold waves —onlookers ask — can't he find something better to do? Can't he at least wait until June?

I had a conversation with a church planter. He told me that the unchurched people he meets are not antagonistic towards the church — they simply do not notice the

church. For many folks, the church seems to value stability over anything else. Walking into many churches is to take a step back in time. While the world adapts, the church seems stuck in time, content to serve only the members who are already present while ignoring the many who exist right outside their doors.

Tom Ehrich is a church consultant whose column in *The Outlook* I read faithfully. In his column titled, "Good Christian Leaders," he writes "The Effective leader doesn't value stability, but keeps moving. The effective church leader places no value on things being easy or predictable, but seeks challenge and change." Ehrich believes the church in the past 50 years has made the culture the excuse for its decline.

The problem is "they were looking inward and tried to preserve what they had, rather than looking outward and letting go. They weren't analyzing the present, but merely assumed if they kept doing what they already knew what to do eventually, it would start working again. Their best goal for the future was survival, not success."

Okay — enough reflection. Time to face the windy boardwalk. Its 6 weeks more winter — give or take.



<u>February 11</u>: John 5:1-15. Jesus goes to Jerusalem and encounters a man who has been disabled for 38 years. He heals him. You would think the community would celebrate the man's new life with shouts of hosanna and hallelujah. Since this happens on the Sabbath — the reaction is quite different. Sermon: "Choosing to See or Not to See."
