

Dear CCPC Family,

The Search Committee began its search for a new choir director/accompanist in early February 2018. Our goal was to find the right person to continue CCPC's long legacy of high-quality music ministry and programs.

I'm very pleased to announce that Mr. Rick Osborne has accepted CCPC's offer of employment for the choir director/accompanist position for the 11am Blended Service. Rick will begin his music ministry with us on June 3 (the first Sunday in June).

The Search Committee interviewed several highly qualified candidates over the past couple of months, yet Rick was our final choice because of his impressive musical talents, his ability to teach vocal technique to novice and experienced singers alike, and also his deep commitment to leading innovative music programs that enliven worship and ultimately bring people closer to God.

Rick brings to CCPC vast experience in church music and music education. Rick has an advanced degree in organ performance from the Peabody Conservatory. Rick has served for several decades as music director at a Presbyterian Church in Easton, Maryland, and he is recently retired from a three-decade career as a general music educator of children grades K-8.

Rick's former school principal shared with me that Rick is "beloved, compassionate, dedicated, and will prove to be a blessing to our congregation." He added that Rick is particularly talented at nurturing and growing young people's musical gifts. A former choir member of Rick's shared with me that "Rick is very caring and patient with choir members; he also sees what needs to be done around the church and quietly does it."

I believe that Rick's skills and experience will serve to reinvigorate and expand the multi-generational music programs that we offer at CCPC. Rick will lead the Celebration Choir, the Hand Bell Choir, and he will also start a new Children's Choir. Rick will be working with Sam Guillermo approximately one Sunday per month to share musical gifts across our two Sunday morning services.

I have had many conversations and meetings with Rick over the past months. Rick has a warm presence and he is hard working, well-prepared and quietly charismatic. It is fortuitous that CCPC's search for a talented and innovative choir director coincided with Rick's search for the "right church." Rick has shared with me that he has been long looking for a church to devote his talents to; a church that is vibrant, energetic and focused on programs that meet the spiritual needs of current members and attract new members, as well. That's us! That is CCPC!

I sincerely believe that CCPC's partnership with Rick Osborne will help us to offer music ministry that continues to be a source of spiritual inspiration for CCPC members well into

the future.

I'd like to extend my sincere gratitude to the other members of the Search Committee: Bob Brutout, Steve Donoian, and Trudy Neff. I truly enjoyed this experience because I shared it with such wonderful and dedicated CCPC members! Thank you for your input and hard work.

And CCPC members, you have been very patient during this interim period. I think that Rick is well worth the wait. Please join me in warmly welcoming Rick Osborne into our congregation in June.

# A Brief Presbyterian Women History Lesson

Louisa M. Woosley is the first woman minister of record from an American Presbyterian denomination. Ordained in the late nineteenth century despite the prevailing social norms of that time, she serves today as an inspiration for anyone trying to break through a glass ceiling.

In 1874, at age 12, Louisa Mariah Layman first felt the calling to ministry during a Baptist revival meeting. At 18, she married Curtis G. Woosley, a member of the Macedonia Cumberland Presbyterian Church outside Caneyville, Kentucky. Louisa Woosley hoped that her husband would enter the ministry so she could become a minister's wife. Curtis remained a lay person, however, bringing about a period of deep depression for Louisa.

In 1882, after a period of intensive Bible study where she found scriptural support for the idea of women ministers, she suffered a period of illness and was confined to bed for six months. It was then that Woosley fully gave herself over to God, and redoubled her resolve to preach. Her chance came on January 1, 1887, when a minister didn't arrive at a small Caneyville church. The church session, knowing of Woosley's deep knowledge of the Bible, asked her to conduct the New Year's Day service.

Woosley became a successful preacher in the Cumberland Presbyterian Church (CPC) denomination. Woosley argued that denying women the right to preach also denied the Holy Spirit. The Presbytery of Nolin ordained her to the full work of the ministry in November 1889. When the Synod of Kentucky ordered her removal from the roll, the presbytery refused. In 1890 and 1894, the presbytery also elected Woosley an alternate delegate to the General Assembly. Congregations and mid councils within the CPC had a greater sense of autonomy than corresponding bodies in other Presbyterian denominations. The Presbytery of Nolin's actions in support of Woosley were at least partially attributable to its defense of self-determination.

In 1894, the CPC General Assembly endorsed Woosley as a lay evangelist. Many defended the outcome on the grounds of mid council autonomy, even if they were not personally ready to accept women ministers.

The question of women's ordination persisted in the Cumberland Presbyterian Church for years. At least seven other women who were ordained by CPC bodies never received full acceptance from the General Assembly. Not until 1921 — 32 years after Reverend Woosley's ordination by the Presbytery of Nolin did the CPC General Assembly rule that women could be ordained as ministers, elders, and deacons. That decision was 35 years before the Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. took similar action, in 1956, and ordained Margaret E. Towner its first woman minister. The Presbyterian Church in the U.S. approved the ordination of women ministers in 1964. Rachel Henderlite was the first woman minister from that denomination.

# AARP FOUNDATION TAX-AIDE CONCLUDES A SUCCESSFUL SEASON AT CCPC

Since 2009, CCPC has supported the AARP Foundation Tax-Aide program by permitting the use of Dodds Hall for tax preparation on Tuesdays and Thursdays during our tax season of early February through mid-April. We wrapped up another successful season on April 17, having electronically filed 600 returns this season. Based on a conservative estimate for the cost of a professionally prepared return, we saved taxpayers in the Bowie area upwards of \$120,000.

We prepare and electronically file federal and Maryland returns at no cost to our clients. We are trained and certified each tax year by IRS. Because we are co-sponsored by AARP, we give preference to taxpayers age 60 and older, but we welcome all ages. There is no requirement to be an AARP member. We are not certified to prepare returns that involve the more complicated aspects of the tax code (e.g., rental property income).

We are the largest of seven sites in Prince George's County and have grown to 22 volunteers, 13 of whom are certified to prepare returns. We are always looking for new volunteers. We operate by appointment only and must turn away many potential clients from about mid-March due to lack of certified volunteers. Rev. Dick Neff and Elder Steve Donoian are among our certified volunteers.

CCPC also supports county-wide aspects of our program. In particular, Dodds Hall is the site for training of all county volunteers (now 68 strong) the first two weeks in January each year.

I thank the Session and CCPC members for their continuing support. I also am grateful to Justin Devine and the youth group for setting up tables and chairs to our desired arrangement after their gathering on Sunday evenings, so that we are ready to perform our magic on Tuesday mornings.
