

very five years or so non-profit governing boards get together to assess the status of the organization. What programs are working? Which ones have lost their vitality? What changes have occurred your community — both demographic and cultural? What emerging needs are not being met? Adaptive organizations (as opposed to reactive organizations) use this information to develop new programs and often make staffing changes to seize new opportunities.

In the last two years, we have made several programing changes based on congregational survey data and analysis of our trends in attendance and giving. Last month in this space, our Christian Education Director, Justin Devine, spelled out the many programmatic changes for this coming year. Most significant are the musical offerings for children and youth under the direction of Rick Osborne. In the next several weeks, these musical groups will be participating in our worship services. This is the second year of our new format and we are still adapting to the changes.

This year the Session is going to look at our mission statement. Is it still relevant? Does it clearly describe who we are and what we are most effective at doing? More importantly, does it help our members invite their friends and relatives to join us in doing Christ's work? How is it used (or not used) in our efforts to make the church more visible in our community?

It has been several years since we last looked at our statement. The statement was forged in meetings with the help of consultants. We place the Mission statement in our weekly bulletin. It reads: Our Mission — *to worship God, to grow in faith and community, and to place our gifts in the service of Jesus Christ.*" It affirms that CCPC is committed to worship, spiritual growth, and to serve. The statement reflected the conviction of the group writing it. CCPC is a congregation that has valued excellence in Adult Education. We have strong youth and children's programs, and we have started many of the local ministries in Bowie — including Adult day care center, first Boy Scout troop, and a Food Pantry.

When I read other church Mission statements, I see that some are longer and more detailed, but they usually say the same thing. Worship, grow, and serve. Although this might be accurate, it is generic. It is like a professional baseball team designing a mission statement. Every team could say our goal is to hit, pitch, and field — three aspects of the game. They would probably say they were committed to doing all these things well and in doing so score more runs than the opposition and win more games.

However, each team actually has different goals and expectations. Miami Marlin players are more concerned with developing skills and mostly focused on statistical goals so players can earn higher salaries. If young players mature at same time — the team might try to make the playoffs every 10 years. However, if you play for the Yankees or Cardinals, you had better be all in to make the playoff every year. If the team is good, but fails to make the World Series, managers are fired. Different teams attract different types of fans. Players that might fit well with the Marlin's would not be on the roster of the Yankees or Cardinals.

The Session appointed a task force, chaired by Elder Ann Fleming, to examine our mission statement. The groups want to design a statement that will be used in our social media and will be prominently used in worship and in our programming. Please pray for the team and at some point we will be sharing their work with you.


Worship Notes
