

Andrea and I just got back from an 8-day trip to New Jersey, eastern Pennsylvania, and Albany, New York. We were blessed to spend time with three of our four adult children. At our first stop in New Jersey, my son Jonah, and his wife, Allyson, announced we're going to be grandparents again in November. This time a girl. This means much greater variety of clothing to buy! We are very excited. God is good.

There are more than 27,000 new grandparents in the United States every week. Many of the new grandmothers were pioneers who entered the white-collar work force in the 1970's and now 40 years later they are reinventing grand parenting. Our generation is spending more money on our grandchildren, 64 percent more, than grandparents did just 10 years ago. At an AARP Reimaging Grand Parenting Program I attended, I discovered the additional spending includes nearly \$5 billion for primary and secondary education. With the cost of childcare — good childcare — grossly expensive, exceeding the cost of a college education, many grandparents are serving as granny nannies.

Anna Quindlen wrote a bestseller "Nanaville" where she says that in the short time she has been a grandmother, she has learned many things. But most of all, she's learned to butt out. No matter how tempted you are to dispense to your children what you think is wisdom and to correct what you think are their mistakes, you must resist. Those who make their opinions sound like the Ten Commandments might end up seeing their grandchildren only on major holidays and in photographs.

One source of the differences in how to raise children is that 20th century parents are giving advice to 21st century kids. In order to navigate the dramatic changes facing the next generation of parents, grandparents need to recalibrate our understanding and give up insisting our kids do things the way we did. I expect each of our children will expect a different level of involvement from us. Like Quindlen, we are not needed to raise, house or nanny our grandchildren, nor do we need to support them or their parents financially. Unneeded, we will provide the help that is wanted.

Some things have not changed with the joys of being a grandparent. Quindlan writes, "Talking with a small child is like talking to yourself — yourself before you forgot to notice things. What evaporates as we age, sadly, is authenticity, that sense of saying your lines for the very first time. When my grandson is running in front of the spray of the hose with his arms outstretched, there is nothing but sensation: the water, the sunshine, the feel of both on his skin. There is no subtext, just ext. Just the moment. I suppose the greatest gift we can give to children we love is to make it possible for them to hold on to that for as long as possible."


