his year marked my third visit to the Montreat conference center in North Carolina and its annual youth conference. For those of you have not been there before, Montreat is bit of a throwback in terms of its look, layout and culture. The scenery is breathtaking and probably the only place on the East Coast that truly reminds me of growing up in Oregon. The people are kind, walk everywhere and generally move at a slower pace. They also embrace the fact that there is a large ever-present bear population which is only defended against by sophisticated locks on their trash cans. From its iconic arched entry to its wonderful Lookout Mountain, Montreat is the epitome of a location designed to encourage rest for the weary, a retreat from the worries of the world and reconnection with our God in Heaven.

The conference's theme both in motto and song was "Let Love Lead." Our group very quickly determined we liked the theme, but the song would need to grow on us, which eventually it did. The schedule for each day is broken up into four main sessions: 1. A morning keynote address which is always opened up by Montreat's signature "Energizers" (an effective wake up tool for both teens and adults) 2. Two small group sessions of 90 minutes with a lunch break in the middle. 3. An afternoon and late evening recreation time. 4. An evening worship service which mostly follows the format of our traditional liturgy while using many contemporary versions of that liturgy.

The "Let Love Lead" theme drew from biblical passages such as the Prodigal Son, the woman with the alabaster jar, and showing love to your sibling before you can love to the world. The small group sessions are designed to provide a safe and comfortable environment for students to share their experiences, struggles and the realities of their faith. Students are broken up into groups with various students from the conference, which not only gives them an opportunity to meet other students from other churches, but gives different views and perspectives from students outside their group. While small groups are generally everyone's favorite part of the week, factors such as how comfortable the small group leader makes them or the combination of students are all important in shaping each students small group experience. Overall our students were very pleased with their small group time and immediately gained several new Instagram followers to show for their week of relationship building.

The biggest difference at this year's conference was the music. What was once the highlight of the trip for many of the teens left them found wanting. This was largely due to the fact that our contemporary service at CCPC is now ahead of the curve in terms of reaching students and encouraging them in a way that combines their current culture with a love for Jesus. A big thanks goes out Sam and Rick for spoiling our students with excellent music that fills that need for them.

Another difference that was reflected both in the music and the conference was the diversity within the conference. The conference was both multicultural and multidenominational; they played global music and Zion Baptist church was one of the participating denominations. This was a welcome sight for our diverse group of students.

Lastly I want to mention the highlight of everyone's night, our conference preacher Rev. Amos Disasa. From a small village in Ethiopia, Rev. Disasa was able to weave personal experiences into individual stories and connect them in a way we had never heard before. Two of his most memorable concepts was how he introduced a 4th character in prodigal son story – home and how the concept of home is what makes this story so relatable. Rev. Amos was also adamant that we can't begin to say we love God without being able to show love to one another. He challenged us to make sure that everyone knew that following Jesus meant having a "seat at the table" for everyone; not just for those that are popular or wealthy. If you're ever in Dallas be sure and check out his home church.

This year's Montreat Youth Conference was a fulfilling and worthwhile experience for all 13 of our students and our adults. I want to thank our incredible volunteers Skip Oates and Kristen McDermott for all of their hard work throughout the week and the congregation for its continued support of this wonderful event.



Contribution Statements


Due to a lack of interest in our midyear contribution statements we will not be printing them this year. A lot of time and effort goes into producing them and giving them out.
