



A warm, socially distanced greeting from my office at CCPC. I pray you are all finding ways to stay connected to each other and to our church community in this scary time of the Covid-19 pandemic. I hope you have been watching our worship services and catching Justin's Bible study and Charles Tanners Daily Lectionary reading on Facebook.

The Session had our first on-line meeting using ZOOM on Monday. The connection was excellent. We had four members in the conference room (all more than 6 feet apart) and an additional eight connected online. With everyone's face projected on the screen in front of you, and being able to hear his or her voices, I soon felt the sense of isolation melt away. Soon folks were smiling and telling stories. We were again the body of Christ.

I encourage you to use this forced isolation to pick up the phone and call friends. Give particular attention to those who are alone and those who are especially vulnerable to the virus. I appreciated Sue Evans recording and posting film of our members at Collington. When I make phone calls, I find people eager to talk. The seriousness of the moment has created a willingness to dispense with the trivial and to connect over deeper things. The author of *I John 4:18* said it well, "There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear."

I was touched by the comments New York Governor Andrew Cuomo shared on television when asked about his daughter who was in insolation with the virus. "To tell you the truth, I had some of the best conversations I've ever had. We talked about things in depth that we didn't have time to talk about in the past — or didn't have the courage or the strength to talk about in the past. I shared feeling I had about mistakes I had made along the way that I wanted to express — but never got around to saying."

These serious and somber tones are appropriate for Holy Week. As I prepare my Holy Week sermons this year, I do not have to manufacture the anxiety Jesus felt as he made his way to the cross. The somber life and death fears we find in the Passion narrative can be ripped from the headlines. Besides fears for those who might die, there are real worries about people losing their jobs or their businesses. We have already heard from members who have been laid off or were forced to shut down their businesses. Our prayers are with you and together we will get through this time.

As Jesus headed to the cross, he focused his attention on his disciples. He listened to their fears and directly addressed their questions. He had at least one moment when he was worried if he could stay the course. In the garden of Gethsemane he momentarily wavered but then said, "Not my will, but thy will be done."

Maybe we can follow Jesus' example in these perilous times. Talk to those you love. Listen to their concerns. When you say your prayers each night, remember Jesus' promise to us, "Lo I will be with you always."


