
I know that some of you have visited Montreat, and I hope that many more of you are able to do so. It is such a special place. The grounds of Montreat feature Lake Susan, walking and hiking trails, beautiful mountains, and trickling creeks. If you hike to the top of Lookout Mountain, you can see the home of Rev. Billy Graham!

Montreat was first imagined in 1897 by Rev. John C. Collins. He was a minister from Connecticut who joined together with other clergy and lay leaders to purchase 4,500 acres of land in the mountains of western North Carolina. That is how it all began. For all these years, Montreat has been a place set apart for those "who journey here seeking a closer relationship with their Creator."

The Creator has worked in some amazing ways throughout Montreat's history. During World War II, Montreat housed 264 Japanese and German diplomats, businessmen and their families for repatriation in exchange for allied missionaries, diplomats and families held by Axis countries. In 1945, First Lady Eleanor Roosevelt visited Montreat to address the Southern Mountain Workers organization. Montreat played an important role in the Civil Rights Movement in the 1960s. The Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. addressed the Christian Action Conference at Montreat in 1965.

Montreat continues to play a vital role in God's world today, offering retreats and conferences on worship, music, arts and crafts, social justice, spiritual formation, and so much more. I have enjoyed a time of learning and inspiration in this special place. I hope that many of you are able to do the same.

Living Waters for the World Status Report

There is probably no sphere of our lives which has not been affected by the Corona virus pandemic. And the CCPC Living Waters for the World (LWW) program is an example. CCPC has a rich history of sending LWW teams to Honduras to help build water purification systems and to teach our Honduran partners how to operate them to provide clean water to their communities. CCPC has provided nine Honduran communities with one of these systems, helping build one each year except one over a span of 10 years. But the pandemic put a sudden halt to this activity, both in Honduras and in most all of the 25 countries in which LWW systems have been built. And the reason is simple: It is very difficult for the people in Honduras and other Latin American countries to obtain vaccinations. The 15 to 20 percent of the population who are vaccinated are primarily health care workers in urban areas, and the rural areas, where LWW systems are needed, have almost no persons vaccinated. So although a United States team like ours might be fully vaccinated, making a trip to a small village to help install a system would bring an unvaccinated community together, which could easily turn into a super-spreader event. This would be bad anywhere, but the scarcity of medical care in Honduras would make this a disaster for the community. For that reason, our Honduran partners have requested that we not come this year for any purposes. The advice for next year will be determined as we approach the new year.

So although the need is still great, especially in places like Haiti, LWW teams are not traveling, and CCPC will have missed at least two installation opportunities. And as the personal situations of our CCPC LWW team members are changing, we find that although we cannot go now to Honduras to provide a clean water system, we need to renew our team so that when the occasion arises, we can once again resume our commitment to providing clean water to our Honduran brothers and sisters.

A LWW team must have properly trained people on it. The training is provided at "Clean Water U", held at a Presbyterian church camp near Oxford, Mississippi, with three "tracks" of training : the 101 track is for leadership training, the 102 track is for education training, and the 103 track is for training in how to assemble the purification system. These courses are routinely offered each Spring and each Fall, but since the beginning of the pandemic, they have been only offered virtually. However, the course will be held in person during October 5-9 2021, and April 26-30 2022.

CCPC has been blessed with team members who have made several trips to Honduras. As you might expect, CCPC and the LWW team benefit greatly when team members commit to several years of service to this ministry. Persons who are newly retired are

ideal candidates for these jobs, and if you feel called toward this ministry, please contact me (<u>a-c-</u> <u>tanner@verizon.net</u>, or 301-464-2667) for further information. There is still time to register for the October session, but that window will close in about a week.
