We use a consent agenda and committee chairs approve spending through a voucher system. The Session elected Jim Woods to serve as Clerk.

Cyd Radden-Le Sage will again serve as chair of the Finance Council and as the President of the Corporation. Cyd presented a proposal that will enable members to pay their pledges through their online banking accounts. We will be testing the process in late July. You can use this account to make your donations starting August 1. Details and account number will be in the next newsletter. Several members have requested this service. For you old fashioned folks like me, we can still make our contributions by cash or check during the offering.

In advance of the fall officers retreat to be held on September 27 and 28, the Session and Board of Deacons are reading Rev. Henry Brinton's book on hospitality, "The Welcoming Congregation." Rev. Brinton will be our retreat leader.

The Board of Deacons elected Astrid Jonas to be the moderator for the next year. Astrid has previously served on both the Session and the Board of Deacons. She brings a lot of experience and energy to the post. The Deacons reelected Sue Evans as vice-moderator and Evonne Tang to serve as Board secretary. The Deacons are hosting Cluster Gatherings again this summer. Please try to make one of these fellowship events. As they say, good fun and a good time always happen when God's people get together to break bread.

In another action, the Session appointed five members to serve on a committee to explore mission initiatives to be housed and operated out of the part of the CE building that is being vacated by the Bowie Food Pantry. Yes it is true. The Pantry will be relocated to its new headquarters at the Kenhill Center (the Old City hall). The City of Bowie has made the portable trailers located behind the Kenhill Center available to

the Pantry. These portable buildings previously housed the Bowie Police Department. The Pantry will begin moving on or around August 1. We will be letting you know how you can help them move shelves and equipment.

If you would like to help us discern suitable **mission initiatives for the CE Building**, please email the Committee Chair Susan Brutout at Brutout2004@verizon.net. The Session members of the committee are John Backus and Susan Brutout from the Mission council, Mary Lou Chappell (Outreach), Cyd Radden Le Sage (Finance) and Paul Sell (Building and Grounds). Ideas for outreach ministries are already abuzz. ESL classes (English as a Second language). A service to deliver food to shut-ins and disabled folks. A ministry to offer free interior housing repairs (a hybrid Habitat for Humanity and Christmas in April program) to needy seniors that would enable them to age in place in their homes. Bring your ideas and your passion to this group. A first meeting date will be announced soon.

Finally, the Hospitality Committee, which is a part of the Outreach and Parish Life Committee, has asked that "Name Tag Sunday" be extended to every Sunday starting this coming Sunday. We would ask that you do two things. Greet each other by name AND during the passing of the peace, greet at least one person you don't know or have not spoken to in awhile.

Remember this: the Lord is good all the time.

DEACON'S CORNER

This is the 30th in a series of articles about living well by considering the host of things we can change in our lives, our homes and our surroundings that can make our lives healthier, happier, and safer. Special thanks to Joy Bible, former Moderator of the Board of Deacons, for sharing her wisdom and expertise through the Deacon's Corner. What are the qualities we look for in others? One answer that almost always comes up is "a sense of humor." "Someone who is positive." We like being around happy, optimistic and light-hearted people. One study found that children reared in an optimistic, laughter-filled home tended to be less nervous or fearful, more sociable and energetic. Also noted in the study was that experiencing joy and other positive emotions can inspire us to do wonderful things in life, such as raise a child, cooperate with one's team, or help someone in need. Research shows that "joyful, engaged individuals are better able to thrive and build positive bonds with others, especially compared to people who are dejected or depressed." Although many people believe that happiness is directly related to good health and this correlation has been confirmed as significant in lots of studies, it does not mean that happiness is the *direct cause* of good health.

Positive emotions, such as being optimistic, happy, joyful, are a choice. Just as we choose to believe in our faith, we choose optimism. How difficult is it to be around people who constantly choose the negative? It's like the news today and we begin to believe, like Chicken Little, "The sky is falling." We say: I can't. I won't. That's a problem. It's stupid. It won't work. It's too hard. I'm not good enough. We never did that before. This is a drag! The wonderful thing about choices is we can choose the positive. Choosing the positive can be very empowering: I can. It's possible. I'll give it a try. It will work. I am able to do this. This will be fun!

The Book of Hebrews talks about running the race, leaving the things behind that drag you down and encumber you. In our lives, we need to let go of negative thoughts and train ourselves to focus on positive outcomes. With the right attitude, even the stumbling blocks can become stepping stones or learning tools. One of the main ingredients in a positive life is lots of laughter. It is good medicine and stimulates our whole body. Laughter has healing qualities and exercises our facial muscles. Laugh lines are more attractive than frown lines! Helen Keller said, "Optimism is the faith that leads to achievement. Nothing can be done without hope and confidence." I have an old saying on my kitchen cabinet that I believe to this day. It says, "A good laugh is as good as a prayer sometimes." I think it is good for the soul. So smile, chuckle, giggle, laugh out loud. For as you travel through life, whatever your goal, keep your eye on the doughnut and not on the hole.
