he gospels have been referred to as Passion Week with a long introduction. That is probably a reductionist position that minimizes the transformative content of Jesus' teaching ministry. However, it is true that the central claim in Christian proclamation is that Jesus was crucified and on the third day he rose again. So, the week between Palm Sunday and Easter is the core message of the gospel.

Holy Week begins with Jesus arriving triumphantly and dramatically on a donkey with his followers shouting words proclaiming the arrival of a conquering King. Many of the cheering crowds were religious pilgrims in to celebrate the festival of Passover.

Passover is another event when against great odds God triumphed over oppressive forces. Pharaoh had to let God's people go. The details of the rest of Holy Week are both intriguing and mystifying. Jesus ends up getting executed between two thieves on a day we refer to as Good Friday when it actually is better called Terrifying Friday. Then, off course the Resurrection happened and failure turns into triumph. This is the pivot that changes history.

Many of the details of Holy Week seem strangely modern. We are very familiar with death. We know too well that the promise of a new life for oppressed people often doesn't end well. Instead, military dictators ruthlessly squash the movement and publically kill the people advocating change. Are the military tribunals sentenc-

ing hundreds to death in Egypt any less ruthless than Rome? Jesus embodies the struggle of people seeking justice in the face of lethal force.


For those in despair about injustice and about human suffering, Holy Week is not an abstract or intellectual affair. It is very practical. As we follow the movements and encounters of Jesus during Holy Week, we witness the emergence of "a way out of no way." We don't see Jesus outwitting his enemies. He doesn't forcibly overthrow the brutal Roman government. The emerging "way out of no way" arrives in a way no one could have ever expected. It wasn't produced by Jesus and he didn't will it to happen.

This is simply a story the first witnesses just retold with great enthusiasm even while they struggled to understand it. That is why Robert Schuler used to conclude every service at the Crystal Cathedral with the hymn, "We've A Story to Tell to the Nations." The story itself disrupts all our intellectual abstractions and blows to pieces all cultures of despair.

So join me this Holy Week as we rehear this amazing story.

Maundy Thursday Communion Service will be Held on Thursday, April 17th at 7:30PM.


Good Friday Service is at Noon in the Sanctuary. We will read the Passion story in John. The service will include periods of silent reflection. We will sing the hymns of the cross.
