

always have mixed emotions when the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church convenes.

First of all, I am proud that 500 elders and an equal number of pastors come together to discuss important issues. The twice daily worship services are inspiring. The singing of hymns alone is worth the trip. (I love the music of Motown. I wonder if the Presbyterian delegates would be able to clap on the right beat.)

Where some other churches shun all matters political, Presbyterians read the biblical commands both to love neighbors and to break the chains of injustice as requirements to engage in public debate. This of course causes me to cringe, because engaging in serious conversations over controversial topics can and will produce backlash. I have come to expect that the only news reported from these gatherings will be controversial.

Who reports news that is not a story about conflict? The items on this year's agenda are all hot buttons: the death penalty, gun violence, drones, sexual violence in the U.S. Military and the Palestinian/Israeli conflict. Then, of course, the church must decide about whether pastors and congregations will be permitted to officiate at same gender marriage ceremonies in states that recognize such unions. Pray for wisdom and discernment.

The Assembly will be meeting in Detroit starting Saturday. Detroit has been in the news lately. Most of the news has been negative. The city is making a slow but steady rise from decay and depopulation. In the first decade of this new century, the city population shrunk by 30%. A shrinking tax base produces all sorts of service cuts and tough funding decisions. Thanks to the generous contributions of Americans around the country, the city will not have to sell its fabulous art collection at its premier art museum in order to pay its debt. The good news is that the American automakers are selling lots of cars these days. The bad news is that making these cars takes many fewer workers than it did even 20 years ago. If you want to watch a good movie out of contemporary Detroit, I recommend Clint Eastwood's "Gran Torino."

This year, CCPC Elder Chuck Tanner will be an elder delegate. Chuck has long been active in National Capital Presbytery. Chuck and his wife Marjorie have participated in numerous mission trips with Living Waters for the World. They have also accompanied the Gaithersburg Church to several clean up projects related to the devastation from Hurricane Katrina. Chuck gave a briefing to the Paper Tigers about the process at General Assembly and the topics that will be addressed. Pray for Chuck as he represents us.

BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS News

The Buildings and Grounds Committee is working to execute several major projects that are funded by the Capital Campaign. B&G Committee members are serving as managers for specific projects. Below is the status of each project:

- ♦ **Sanctuary Roofs**: Project Manager, Paul Sell: The roof project is completed. All of the shingles on the sanctuary roof were replaced with new underlayment and 40-year shingles. Problems with the flat roofs on Dodds Hall and the sanctuary building were also repaired.
- ◆ Exterior Painting: Project Manager, Paul Sell: This project is completed. The exterior of Dodds Hall and the sanctuary building were painted, vinyl soffit covers installed, and the fascia boards were capped in vinyl to reduce our long-term maintenance requirements.
- ◆ HVAC System Replacement: Project Manager, Lou Aquilina: The HVAC system that provides heating and cooling to the sanctuary will be replaced. We anticipate installation to occur in early-to-mid September.
- ♦ Pew & Chair Reupholstering/Carpet Replacement: Project Managers, Miriam Salsbury and Marjorie Tanner: The pews and chairs in the sanctuary will be reupholstered and the carpeting replaced. The congregation helped to select the fabric and carpeting. The reupholstering and carpet installation is planned to take place in late July or early August.
- ♦ **Kitchen Renovations**: Project Manager, Skip Oates: The plan is to upgrade the electrical system in the kitchen, install new flooring, and service the stove/oven. The electrical work will include upgrading the electrical outlets, installing additional lights and replacing the 1960s-vintage electrical panel thereby bringing the electrical system up to current codes. After the electrical work is completed, installation of new flooring in the kitchen and pantry will follow.
- ◆ **Parking Lot Repairs**: Project Manager, Al Wimbish: This project is anticipated for next spring and will include repaying the parking lots and replacing the existing concrete bumpers with low-profile rubber bumpers. In the interim, we will seek volunteers to help repaint the parking space lines this summer.
- ♦ CE Building Renovations: Project Manager, Al Wimbish: Space in the Christian Education Building that had been occupied by the Bowie Interfaith Pantry is being renovated for expanded occupancy by the Belair Co-op Nursery. The work includes painting, new flooring in two rooms and carpeting in another, replacing the sink in one room and installing countertops and cabinet bases in two rooms. The 1960s-vintage kitchenette will be modernized. Other renovations that are pending approval from county and state officials include reconfiguring the bathrooms for handicapaccessibility and installing an entrance wall and doors to provide added security for the nursery.

This is my last report as the B&G Committee Chair as I turn the chairmanship over to the very capable Bill Radden-Lesage.
