On September 28th, CCPC will celebrate the 20th anniversary of the dedication of our Sanctuary. What we call the sanctuary is more than just the beautiful space where we worship God. The project also included the attractive atrium, the covered walkway that connects the atrium to the Christian Education building, the offices, meeting rooms, and the choir room. The Lord has blessed us with an attractive and very functional space. We are also celebrating the refurbishment of the pews and carpet (we hope it is done on time!), the new heating/air conditioning system (installation the week of October 6th), and the re-shingled roof. So far we have received in excess of \$220,000 in gifts for the capital improvements. You are all very generous. The Lord is indeed good.

Pastor/writer Lillian Daniels in her book, "When 'Spiritual But Not Religious' is Not Enough," writes about the pleasure she had in leading her historic congregational church in New England though a big anniversary celebration of laying the cornerstone of their sanctuary. The church had gone through some rough times, two church splits, some angry and painful departures of ministers, but things had been looking up and the church was ready to celebrate.

The congregation spent two years gearing up for the big day and everyone in the church was participating. It was going to be great. And then just about a month before the big day, it came to the volunteer church historians' attention that there had been a mistake. In calculating the date, they had the wrong year. The buildings 75th anniversary had been the year before. Well, even though it was a small church the word got out in town. "Really? Your church missed its own anniversary?" In New England that is pastoral misconduct.

No one overacted. When the Board met to discuss the plans for the celebration someone brought up the embarrassing fact of the date. One member said, "Well I've done some checking. The building took a year to complete. Then, the actual first worship service didn't happen for another six months. (Maybe they too had to wait for the pew company to get its work done). I mean who celebrates the anniversary of a building? It's all about the people."

I laughed reading Daniels story. The building committee at CCPC was together for over 10 years. The church had many stops and starts. Twice the plan went out for bid. Money was tight. Not everyone thought it was a good idea, including the Presbytery who didn't co-sign on the mortgage. Yet, thanks to the patience and perseverance of many people, and the grace of a powerful God, we are celebrating 20 years since the first worship service was held on October 2, 1994. So we will celebrate! The service will have plenty of special music. We will eat a free, catered meal after the 10AM special service. Hospitality chair Mary Lou Chappell needs a count to order the food. You will have a chance to fill out an RSVP in worship on Sunday, September 21. In this world of political correctness, it can be frustrating to think that I want to say one thing, but my conscious tells me "wrong." Remember that childhood saying, "Sticks and stones may break my bones, but words will never hurt me?" WRONG! Guess what, words can be very harmful, hurtful, and destructive. The earliest citation I found of this saying comes from an American periodical with a largely black audience, "The Christian Recorder," March 1862:

Remember the old adage, "Sticks and Stones will break my bones, but words will never harm me."

True courage consists in doing what is right, despite the jeers and sneers of our companions.

Since it was labeled as an old adage, it suggests an earlier coinage. Early on people realized the power of the tongue. When you make a conscious decision to be an encourager, you become God's helping hand of support inspiring courage, hope, and confidence in the midst of a weary world. Just think what a more civil world we could have if we would offer suggestions, not advice. Honor the other person's ability to chart a course, instead of name-calling or criticizing. Almost Heaven Habitat Camp Wood

AUGUST 3-9, 2014 REPORT

Our mission project for 2014 was to work at Camp Wood, a former CCC Camp, used by WVU students in their forestry and geology programs, as well as a 4-H Camp near White Sulphur Springs, West Virginia. Almost Heaven Habitat received a special use permit for the land these buildings are on from the Forestry Service. It is their vision to create a volunteer center for Habitat volunteers to stay in when they come to work.

Several people stopped by to see what was happening. People were glad to see that the camp was being restored since some of the buildings were in very bad condition. One man had stayed there as a WVU student and had his picture taken where his bed was in his dorm. Jackie Lindbeck did some research and found a man who wrote a book about Camp Wood and 4-H. It turned out that she knew him. He came to the site and gave us a verbal history of the camp when it was a 4-H camp and some of his personal experiences as a camper. Jackie purchased a copy of his book for the camp museum.

CCPC had 29 workers volunteer to work. There were 11 young adults and 18 adults. Some stayed all week; some came for a few days. We winterized the former bath house, which will be the office and museum, and Hope Cottage, which will eventually be the caretaker's cottage. Siding was scraped, many coats of primer and paint applied, broken window glass removed or windows replaced, a new roof put on the bath house, chimneys repaired with flashing, and large areas of overgrowth of poison ivy and weeds cut down. We got to meet a family that is working to earn their sweat equity to move into a Habitat house. They are a young couple – Josh, Francesca, and 8 month old Elizabeth Berry. They are working to-wards moving into one of the houses CCPC built on our 2012 trip.

We stayed at the Civic Center in White Sulphur Springs. It is in an old middle school. Men and women had different rooms where we slept on army cots or inflatable mattresses. Bathrooms were in the basement locker room. There was a full kitchen with pots and pans but we were asked not to use their dishes or silverware and to bring all our own paper products and cleaning products. The gym had basketball hoops so Julia Leaman brought a basketball.

Menus were created by Tracy Backus. Tracy and Susan Brutout shopped at BJ's for nonperishables and shopped in White Sulphur Springs at the local Food Lion for the rest of the food. Some items not used were donated to the church, some to the family that will move into one of the houses we built on the 2012 trip, silverware and clothes line was saved for the next trip, some toilet paper and paper towels were left at the Civic Center, and some given to the Habitat director for a picnic for the workers.

The cost to participate with Habitat was \$25,000, their price for a full build.
