the biblical perspective social issues are always framed as questions of our obligations, not our rights. Instead of insisting on absolute freedoms, we consider our obligations to our neighbor. The Bible assumes that loving one's neighbor will entail some conditions on one's actions.

In Deuteronomy chapters 20 through 23, we find numerous practical directions on how we balance our rights and the welfare of others. If the things you build or possess present a life threatening hazard to your neighbor, you need to take steps to reduce the danger. I have a swimming pool. I am required to have a locked fenced in back yard.

I have never understood our nation's infatuation with guns. Except for the BB gun I had as a child, I have never owned a gun. I have never hunted, but know it was a big social experience for the men in my western Pennsylvania church. I used to say the opening prayer at the annual venison dinner and enjoyed the camaraderie. But, certain coarseness has overtaken our society since those more serene days 25 years ago. I am horrified when I see the graphic violence in the video games my nephews play by the hour. I am alarmed that my 20-something kids like watching television series like "Game of Thrones." We are a society where the celebration of violence is everywhere.

We are becoming more and more aware of how those that witness violence are severely scared. Recently, it was the tragic report about the frequency of suicide among members of our military. The Pentagon reported that in 2012 more soldiers died of suicide than were killed in our never ending wars in Iraq and Afghanistan. This statistic didn't sound out of the ordinary when I read that twice as many people died of self-inflicted gunshot wounds than were murdered with guns. Something is seriously wrong! The answers are not simple, but it is not getting more

guns in circulation and arming teachers and college students.

Any reasonable effort to work at solutions is hampered by our insidious political environment. Any questioning of the disastrous status quo is deemed opportunistic. Today, "Everything is political" instead of just being an obvious moral imperative. Freedoms must be protected against any infringement! So, next year, when another horrifying mass shooting happens (we all know it's coming – it happens at least once a year), which community will be forced to bear unspeakable tragedy as somehow the price of our freedoms?

So where does the conversations start? First, by admitting that defending the status quo is indefensible. Most gun owners are calling for changes to our weak gun laws. Even Senator Manchin, who has the NRA's highest rating, is saying enough – we need to strengthen our gun laws. Why can't people recognize that the NRA is funded by gun manufacturers? They are the only people the NRA are representing. Like any lobby, they will use any fear tactic, evoke the most tortured second amendment interpretation and trot out the congressmen whose campaigns they support to make their case. The NRA wants to support the maximum sale of guns and ammunition. Period.

Second, more reasonable people of good conscience and good faith, including responsible gun owners, need to talk openly, honestly and forcefully about the need for additional, reasonable regulations. There is power in speaking up. We know the face of unfettered gun proliferation. Now it's time to see more faces of regulation and restraint.

I saw retired Gen. Stanley McChrystal a few weeks ago on TV. The General said, "I spent a career carrying typically an M16 and later an M4 carbine. And, an M4 carbine fires a .223 caliber round, which is 5.56 millimeters, at about 3,000 feet per second. When it hits a human body, the effects are devastating. It's designed to do that. And, that's what our soldiers ought to carry. I personally don't think there's any need for that kind of weaponry on the street and particularly around the schools in America. I believe that we've got

to take a serious look. I understand everybody's desire

to have whatever they want, but we've got to protect our children, we've got to protect our police, we've got to protect our population.

And, I think we've got to take a very mature look at that."

A "mature look" indeed. Like any other complicated problem we confront, we must understand that whatever we do now is not necessarily the whole of the solution but a step in the right direction on a long walk back from a precipice. We don't want to pass the point where society is so saturated with the most dangerous kinds of weaponry that people feel compelled to arm themselves or be left vulnerable. Sometimes I wonder if we haven't already passed that point.
