am reading the best seller by Gretchen Rubin, "The Happiness Project." The author devotes a year trying to change her life to become happier by making resolutions and following them. She has many good ideas. It is a very helpful book and I would recommend it. Rubin has obviously read the best material on the topics of her twelve chapters. Here are a few tidbits. "To feel good: be good." "There is an 'I' in 'happiness'" (as opposed to the Pat Riley's famous "There is no 'I' in 'team.'"). So, "by being happy myself, I am better able to try to make others happy."

The month of February is devoted to love. Valentine's Day? I want to pick up on two of her comments. First, Rubin says: "The more readily you respond to a spouse's bid for attention, the stronger your marriage." Underlying every marital exchange and every marital challenge is some version of the basic question: Are you there for me? There are several versions to the question: Do you approve of me? Do you have my back? Will you come when I call?

When spouses behave in ways that sound like yes to these core questions, they stand shoulder to shoulder, hand in hand, and are better able to handle the stresses of life, including the inevitable challenges that being in relationship brings. But, when the answers to those core questions sounds like a no — unease, suspicion, and uncertainty set in.

I think this applies to other close relationships. Singles, widows, or divorced folks can also enjoy lives that are happy and fulfilling if they build secure and reliable connections with others including family and friends. If you want strong bonds, you must pay attention.


Secondly, Rubin says she has always followed the biblical adage, "Don't let the sun go down on your anger," in such a way that she always scrupulously aired every annoyance as soon as possible, to make sure she had her chance to vent her bad feelings before bedtime. Rubin's says she was surprised to learn from her research that this well known notion of anger catharsis is poppycock. There is no evidence for the belief that letting off emotional steam is healthy or constructive. Aggressively expressing anger doesn't relieve it, but amplifies it. On the other hand, not expressing anger often allows it to disappear without leaving ugly traces.

Rubin concludes the chapter with this piece of wisdom. "When thinking about happiness in marriage, you may have an almost irresistible impulse to focus on your spouse, to emphasize how he or she should change to boast your happiness. But the fact is you can't change anyone but yourself."

Good stuff to think about.

The Belair Cooperative Nursery School (BCNS) is now enrolling for the 2013-2014 school year. BCNS is a cooperative program where families become actively involved in their child's education and do small jobs for the school in exchange for a low monthly tuition.

BCNS offers classes for 3, 4, and 5 year olds, and boasts low monthly tuitions of \$105 for the 3's class (T/TH from 9 am to Noon) and \$125 for the 4's & 4/5's classes (M/W/F 9 am to Noon). We are also offering a five morning a week program for 4 and 5 year olds.

Our school offers an enjoyable age appropriate curriculum as well as instruction in music, Spanish, and even yoga. An enrichment program that focuses on science and math is also available for students in the 4's & 4/5's classes on Tuesday and Thursday morning.

Right now, the 4s, 4/5s, and Enrichment classes are accepting applications for the school year beginning in the fall of 2013. The 3's class is accepting wait list applications only.

Gun Violence Prevention

Vincent DeMarco, a renowned advocate for public health causes like reducing teen smoking, restraining gun violence, and expanding health care access will speak about preventing Gun Violence as it relates to public health on Sunday, April 7th at 11:30 AM in Dodds Hall.

As National Coordinator of Faith United Against Tobacco, he is working to mobilize faith leaders in the country to help reduce smoking. As president of the Maryland Citizens' Health Initiative, he is working to guarantee quality, affordable health care for all Marylanders.

And, as an Adjunct Assistant Professor at the Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health, he is working to educate public health students from around the world on effective methods of advocating for public health policies.

Vincent DeMarco has been recognized for his work by organizations such as the Baltimore Sun, which declared him "Marylander of the Year" in 1988 and the Central Maryland Ecumenical Council, which awarded him its 2002 "Ecumenical Leadership Award". Families USA also recognized DeMarco at the 2007 Health Action forum as "Health Advocate of the Year."

"Vinny" DeMarco is also the subject of Michael Pertschuk's 2010 book entitled, "The DeMarco Factor: Turning Public Will into Political Power."

Human Trafficking

On April 14th at 11:30 AM in Dodds Hall, following the 10:00 AM worship service and coffee, we will be conducting a forum on the topic of Human Trafficking which has been covered more and more by the press recently. This is a growing social problem that we know very little about.

Melissa Snow will be our speaker. She is Director of the Anti-Human Trafficking Program at TurnAround, Inc., a domestic violence and sexual assault center in Baltimore that helps women, children, and families who are victims of abuse. Among other accomplishments, she has worked to rescue and restore survivors of sex trafficking in India, Nepal, Fiji, South Africa, Kenya, Jamaica and the United States. Join us to learn more about this international problem.
