o one has good things to say about air travel these days. The planes are cramped, every seat is taken, and there is no space for all the carry-on luggage. Two weeks ago, the routine inconvenience was acerbated by long flight delays caused by the sequester of air traffic controllers. This apparently outraged the influential "Business Pro" who hops off the plane and races to the Hertz counter for his rental car to dash off to his meeting. They complained. Their opinion matters. Congress acted quickly to restore funding to the FAA. We live, it seems, at the speed of sound. Air travel is just one of the things that facilitates this pace of life.

My wife, Andrea, shared with me an article written by David Hochman titled "Not So Fast" that appeared in the April edition of the Southwest Airlines magazine. Hochman noticed he was requently saying, "If I only had the time." He was behaving like a stressed-out jerk. He knew he could not afford to ditch the rat race, but what about taking more time to enjoy life? So, taking a page out the "Happiness Project" playbook, David and his wife, Ruth, decided to put the brakes on everything for 30 days by taking what he dubbed a "Slowvember." During this period the family would focus on doing things well rather than fast, on making human connections instead of electronic ones, and on getting more out of life by doing less. In all their endeavors the family would follow S-L-O-W principles.

S stands for "Savor." He gave the example of starting to freak out over his son splashing water over the bathroom floor while taking his bath. He stopped and imagined himself looking back over the incident 10 years in the future. By reframing it, the drippy bubble bath became entertaining and even poignant.

L stands for "Listen to your inner clock." Learn your ideal speed. Some moments demand quick action, but most don't. When he caught himself pushing too hard on the gas pedal, he learned to slow down by reciting the alphabet. Take one thing at a time.

O stands for "Others before technology." Do we really need to spend so much time getting silly updates on everything from your best friend's shopping trip to the Bryce Harper at bat in a blow out? No texting during meals, no checking e-mail before breakfast, and turn off the TV when you should be talking.

W was the ultimate test of every activity and experience: "Will it matter a year from now?"

Two things stuck out here. One, find time for the important things that you will remember and value later. The great Boswell journal entry comes to mind. The famous writer recorded in his daily journal the short entry, "Spent the whole day fishing with my son. A complete day wasted." In contrast the author's son's journal in great detail recalls the glorious day spent fishing with his usually very busy father, calling it "the best day of my life." Second, don't get worked up about the everyday annoyances in life that you cannot do much about. Ask yourself, "Will it matter a year from now?"

I admit that it probably gets harder to slow down and catch your breath. If you think it is hard to slow things down, you are not the only one. You do have a choice.



Living Waters for the World Celebrates!

Twenty years ago, in September 1993, the Synod of Living Waters charged the just-formed Living Waters for the World Team to develop a plan to address the massive world clean water crisis. In 1996, they managed to install the first system, but by 2003, this small group had only managed to install 15 systems. Then they had an "epiphany," and realized that the program had to be expanded. Just 10 months later, in March 2004, the first Clean Water U class was held at Camp Hopewell near Oxford, Mississipi, and as they say, the rest is history. Through the wise and steady leadership of its Executive Director Rev. Wil Howie, Clean Water U has evolved into a place where volunteers are fully equipped to work in partnership with groups in countries where clean water is not the norm, as it is in the US. Teams of volunteers under the sponsorship of churches and other benevolent organizations work to provide a filtration system which can be operated and maintained by the local groups, and which will be self sustaining through the small fee charged for a 5-gallon bottle of the clean water. Last month, the Clean Water U completed their 39th training session, and CCPC was fortunate to have Judyann Feinstein in attendance, as she becomes the fifth CCPC member trained at CWU. In the past 9 years, over 1500 persons have been trained at CWU, and sometime this year, the 500th water system will be installed somewhere in one of the 24 countries in which LWW volunteers work.

To help mark this 20th anniversary year, a special event will take place this month in Honduras. LWW employs two Hondurans to help facilitate the LWW installations in Honduras, and to help maintain the 47 systems which have been installed there. One of these employees, Melvin Flores, has been CCPC's main liaison in Honduras, and has in fact visited CCPC in July 2010. Melvin and his wife Mary, and his technician assistant Olvin have all been trained at CWU, and have accepted a challenge to install the first system in Honduras which will be entirely funded and installed by Hondurans. In conjunction with this installation, Melvin has organized an operator conference, and invited two operators from each of the 47 installations to come together to share information, learn new skills, and help celebrate the new all-Honduran installation. And since three of these Honduran systems were initiated by CCPC, we are participating by contributing \$120 toward the costs of 6 operators to attend this conference. The entire event will also celebrate the 20th anniversary of LWW, and each operator attending will carry home with him/her a backpack with a special 20th anniversary logo on it.

The CCPC LWW team is looking forward to installing more systems in Honduras, and our next installation will be in the small village of La Union Suyapa, either this fall or early next year. Your team appreciates all the interest and support we receive from CCPC, and we invite you to continue to pray for us and for CCPC's mission of providing clean water in Honduras, as we all celebrate the 20 year anniversary of LWW, and the 10 year anniversary of CWU!
