am excited about the Golden Weekend here at CCPC as we celebrate 50 years of ministry. We have a great worship service planned for September 9th at 10AM. Former pastors will be here along with many returning out of town members. I just read the wonderful history of CCPC that Doris Kobe and Mary Brock wrote and is on its way to the printer. It is an inspiring story that is well told.

The 1960's were exciting times and Bowie attracted many of the people that Robert McNamara called the "Best and the Brightest." But, the Bowie experience of Camelot was not free from the struggles for justice that was raging in America at the time. The hot button issues of the 60's were Open Housing (Levitt never sold a home to an African American), busing to desegregate schools, and the sexual revolution made possible by the pill.

During the 1960's, Seminary professor James Gustafson defined the church as "a community of moral discourse." The church was that place set apart to debate the big questions and to discuss the tough issues. My pastoral experience shows that many people do long for a church that will foster their ability to discuss, question, and grow in their faith. Unfortunately, many Christians get uncomfortable when the church openly discusses controversial issues because they fear that discussing tough issues will divide people. This is understandable given the nature of "debate" on cable television.

Today, we have several more hot button social issues to consider. Increasingly, the debates are played out in the courts or appear on the ballot as citizen referendum. I am not a fan of referendums. They don't produce open and intelligent discussions, but become heavily funded advertising campaigns that are backed by noble sounding groups whose identity and motive are often clouded in secrecy. For example: Who is funding the anti-gambling ads on TV? It is not citizens who know the harm gambling causes in families and the corruption it brings to politics. It is competing gambling interests.

CCPC will offer two forums in September to discuss

referendums that will be on the November ballot. The most controversial is the "Marriage Equality" initiative. Eight states have passed laws that permit same gender couples to get married. The Presbyterian Church at the June General Assembly meeting in Pittsburgh narrowly defeated a motion to amend the Book of Order to change the definition of marriage from "a man and a woman" to "two people." Along the way, the Assembly declined to issue an authoritative interpretation of church law that would have allowed ministers at their own discretion to perform same gender marriages in states where those marriages are legal.

Soon after these votes, the Assembly, in a desire to "promote the peace, unity, and purity of the church" overwhelmingly voted to have Presbyterian churches engage in a series of discernment and study concerning the meaning of Christian marriage. We will begin this theological discussion at a forum here on September 23rd at 11:15AM.

On the following week, September 30th we will hold a forum on the "Dream Act." It will be an event filled month.

DEACON'S CORNER

This is the nineteenth in a series of articles about living well by considering the host of things we can change in our lives, our homes, and our surroundings that can make our lives healthier, happier, and safer. Do you suffer from a condition known as paper piles? Do you have trouble finding important papers when you need them? We have talked about clutter in all areas of our houses, but one of the most difficult and endless areas of clutter, is paper. Whether the papers are important bills, letters, or junk mail the piles never seem to go away. How can we make things easy for our families in times of crisis or severe illness, or death if they cannot find the important papers when they need them?

Organizing and setting up a file system to house all your important information is one of the best gifts you can give yourself and your family. I have known many families who have spent months, even years, trying to sort through a loved one's

personal papers trying to find out what needs to be done or who to contact. The best thing about setting up a good filing system is once done it is easier to put papers away and keep the piles from growing!

Many people say," I know exactly which pile my insurance papers are in." Great for you, but does someone else in the family know? There are so many ways to file your papers. Learn to prioritize your papers by urgency, importance, and accessibility. Let some family members know where they are. Make copies of your most important documents, including birth certificates, social security cards, passports, immigration papers, marriage licenses and divorce certificates, real

estate documents, current insurance policies, and wills. Grown children are sometimes resistant to learning this

information. The response is, "Mom, you're not going anywhere."

Keep a list of where your family can find the important papers. A "what you need to know about my belongings, business affairs, and debts" list, if you will. There are record books you can buy that are easy to follow and fill out. Relieve your

family by recording your wishes, in as much detail as possible, in case of death. Update your information regularly. Keep your information in a secure, fireproof place and be sure to tell a family member or executor of your estate where it is. The time **is now**, and the time **is right** to take care of these matters. This is one of the most important areas of your life that <u>needs</u>, <u>must</u>, and <u>should</u> be organized. You'll have peace of mind, and your loved ones will surely feel appreciative.

Go forth and FILE! It is NEVER TOO EARLY to start!

Do note time changes for Worship Services beginning September 16th

The Sunday Morning Task Force Committee members were invited guests at the June 11th Session meeting by Rev. Brassard and the Worship Council Chairperson Sharon Youngdahl to answer questions about the carefully studied proposal for the Sunday Morning Schedule beginning September 16th. Anita Pesses

presented the findings of the Congregational Questionnaire which were helpful in the planning process.

Session approved the following schedule.

<u>8:30 AM - 9:15 AM</u>: A Chapel Service, (quiet and reflective) in the Sanctuary to include sermon, traditional hymns, a possible weekly communion, piano accompaniment, possible solos or special

music, but would not include choirs. This service would allow any members who like to worship early or who need to worship early due to other scheduled activities to do so.

<u>9:15 AM to 10 AM</u>: Fellowship and choir warm ups

10 AM -11 AM: Full worship to include all choirs and styles of

music, children's message, baptisms, communion, other special programs, all other regular worship components, sermons, prayers, etc. This service would allow most of CCPC's worshipers to enjoy all elements of the service and all special celebrations and sacraments offered as well as allowing CCPC to come together and

worship as one congregation. It will also allow children and youth to participate in their secular activities scheduled on Sundays.

11 AM: Fellowship

<u>11:15 AM</u>: Adult education, special forums, new member classes, special brunches, and group gatherings. This component will allow for many opportunities for education and fellowship that our current program does not.
