From Suffering to *Presence*

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

Dr. Overman, my college theology professor, helped me realize that a person didn't have to check their brain at the door of the church; I could bring my mind to faith; I could – and *should* – think carefully, critically, and still be Christian. Overman's foundational course for us was "History of Christian Thought." One tool we picked up from him was the distinction between *"that-ness"* and *"what-ness."* To say *that* this letter exists, is a different matter than explaining *what* it is, or how it came to be. To say *that* God exists is a different matter than explaining *what* (who, how, why) God is. To say *that* in Christ the world is reconciled to God is different from explaining *what* that reconciliation is, how it works, why.

My second-cousin Rebecca Parker (Katherine Parker's aunt!) has written a couple books. With Rita Nakashima Brock, she wrote *Proverbs of Ashes: Violence, Redemptive Suffering, and the Search for What Saves Us* (Beacon Press, 2001). With Rita she also wrote the tremendous *Saving Paradise: How Christianity Traded Love of This World for Crucifixion and Empire* (Beacon Press, 2008). Rebecca and Rita write with a passion and clarity that might make you forget they're among the best of scholars. If you are divinely dissatisfied with the too-simple message that you will find salvation by suffering and self-sacrifice, as Jesus suffered and died on our behalf, then *perhaps* this book is for you. Or perhaps not.

I need to use a little care in how I recommend the first book, because it carries so much pain, so much damage, in the authors' stories, and it brings us in contact with so much pain and damage in some of our own stories, that I wonder whether some readers might be too fragile to follow it through to the hopeful conclusion.

I need to use a little care in how I recommend the works, too, because some will take great offense at their challenge to a near-foundational idea in the Christian faith, the Christian doctrine we have come to call "the atonement." Our doctrine says *that* atonement happens. We believe *that* we are made one with God in Christ. (At One. At-one. Atone.) But over the centuries, we have gotten tangled in the many ways we have come to imagine *how*. The books' challenge is not to the "*that-ness*" of atonement – the authors rejoice in God's Presence with us. The challenge relates to the "*what-ness*" we assign to it. There are several "theories of the atonement," attempting to explain *what* it is, but the "*that-ness*" is not in question.

Rebecca and Rita tell their stories ... stories that parallel in a terrible way the sufferings of so many people, so many of us ... and even the suffering of Jesus as he was tortured and murdered. They tell of the tendency and instruction in Christian culture, for them to bear suffering as a God-given duty, or as a means toward their salvation, as the suffering and death of Jesus was God's intention for him. They tell of this; but they do not accept the suffering as good, as redemptive, as saving. Yet ... and this is the key ... salvation comes. At-one-ment is discovered. The Presence ... the divine Presence is revealed to have been with us all along.

"Salvation begins with the courage of witnesses whose gaze is steady. Steady witnesses neither flee in horror to hide their eyes, nor console with sweet words. ... They help to restore souls fragmented by violence. They accompany the journey to healing. ... Nothing can separate us from the love of God." (*Proverbs of Ashes*, p. 250f)

Palm Sunday is March 24. Easter is March 31. During this Holy Week, as I follow the track of Jesus through betrayal and rigged trial, torture and death, I will be thinking of Rebecca's story and Rita's – and your stories of damage at the hands of others as well. I pray I will be for Jesus, and for you, a steady witness, who will not shrink back from the harm, or make excuses, or look for too-facile "silver linings," or give up.

And this Easter, I will join with you, and with Christians across the world, in giving thanks that nothing, not even death, can separate us from the love of God.
