Pastor P’s Perspective

“Prayer is a very precious medicine, one that helps and never fails.”
 Martin Luther

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Grace and peace, from God our Father and our Lord Jesus Christ!

Throughout this five-hundredth year of the Reformation, we have been including short quotes from Martin Luther in our weekly bulletins. These “Lutherisms,” as we like to call them, have given us glimpses into Luther’s theology and understanding. I hope you have found them as engaging as I have.

The quote above is an example of such a “Lutherism.” It is a simple truth about the power and efficacy of prayer in the life of a Christian. Luther likens prayer to a medicine that never fails to help—only this one doesn’t have any negative side-effects!

Since we have such a great salve, I’d like to invite you to join me in applying this medicine to specific wounds throughout the month of August. On the list below, you will see prayer intentions for each day of the month. I am asking each and every one of us to pray for healing according to God’s will for each of these specific concerns. You don’t have to write long prayers (Luther once said, “the fewer words make the better prayer”), and you don’t have to spend hours in prayer either (although Luther also said, “I am so busy today, I shall have to spend the first three hours in prayer”). No, just a few thoughtful words in raising up the petition, along with the faith that God’s will is done, is more than sufficient to put this medicine to good use!



For the last several years, Faith has sponsored a collection for The Freestore Foodbank's Back to School program. This year the collection will take place on August 13 and August 20. He saw useable household items being tossed away. He began collecting those items and distributing them to disadvantaged families. Today under the leadership of Kurt Reiber, a member of Faith Lutheran, the Freestore Foodbank is one of Ohio's largest food banks, distributing 23 million meals annually through a network of 350 community partner agencies serving 20 counties in Ohio, Kentucky and Indiana. The mission of this non-profit is to provide food and services, create stability, and further self-reliance for people in crisis. No special skills are required. Volunteers are coached and led by a "regular crew" of Habitat volunteers. Any tools needed are available on site. The typical work day begins at 8:30 AM with prayer, a lunch is provided around noon and site cleanup begins around 3:30 PM.

A message about the 2017 FLC Youth Mission Trip from Faith's Youth Director, Melissa Weickert...

Mark the 2017 FLC Youth Mission Trip to Washington D.C. as a success! As we wrap up the end of summer I would like to share with you a bit of our experiences we had during our time in D.C.

From June 18-23, 2017, four of our youth members and two volunteers packed up and drove 9 hours to the YouthWorks Washington D.C. site in Temple Hills, Maryland. We were met by enthusiastic staff members, as well other youth from churches in Minnesota, and West Virginia. Our small church group was split up and combined with members of the other churches and sent to different parts of the D.C. area to perform our service projects for the week. Melissa Weickert, Kayla Fluegeman and Hanna Schultz spent their week at various men's rehabilitation shelters, Martha's Table (similar to meals on wheels) and Food & Friends, where they delivered meals to sick individuals. Ed Umbach, Tommy Schultz and Zach Wuorinen spent their week at Food & Friends preparing food, and Central Union Mission folding towels and bedding.

Each day after our service was completed we had time for evening activities. We went to the National Archive Museum, the National Mall, had local musicians perform and a local pastor speak to us, as well as a community dinner at the local boys and girls club. After each evening activity, we had a large group gathering time, which we spent worshipping, reading scripture, and reflecting on lessons, the scripture and relevant material. We also spent time together as our small church group. We loved sharing our day with each other since we rarely got to see everyone in our church group throughout the day. We reflected on what we liked and disliked about the day, as well as what we learned and how we felt about our service to others.

On our way back to Cincinnati, we stopped at Gettysburg, where we saw many of the monuments, battle fields and the eternal flame. We also had the great pleasure of finding the home that the Schultz family lived in while Pastor attended seminary there in Gettysburg. It was a great treat for Hannah and Tommy.

As a congregation, we should be extremely proud of our youth that attended the mission trip. They worked hard, went outside of their comfort zones, made new friends, and made memories that I know will last them a lifetime. Our youth helped serve with happy hearts and they were able to grow deeper in their relationships with God, all the while growing relationships with new people from different churches and within their own church. Spotlight on...Volunteering with Habitat for Humanity

Ken Clark has an infectious passion for helping others. That is the only way I can explain how two people, with no building experience, were convinced to volunteer for Habitat for Humanity's building projects in Lockland. Three houses in different stages of construction are currently underway on Mulberry Street. Faith Lutheran Church has been invited to join a coalition of 11 other churches building houses for people in need of decent, affordable housing. Habitat volunteers build more than homes. They lay a foundation of self-reliance for our neighbors. Pastor Paul noted that 12 is a wonderful number and this is a wonderful opportunity for Faith.

The day started with prayer and we went to different houses with experienced supervisors to direct our tasks. Greg and I are not handy. We were involved with a drywall project in one of Robin's bedrooms. It was challenging and frustrating (drywall screws don't always go in straight). I see no future for us in drywall installation, and I pray that the finishers are forgiving, Godly people. Everyone's experience is different, depending on the stage of construction, so it is difficult to tell you what your experience may be. I do know this: It is a humbling experience that I recommend to anyone physically able to help. The volunteer leaders we met are amazing, faithful men, with knowledge, energy, and enthusiasm. You will meet and work with volunteers that will touch your life in meaningful ways, all in service to our Lord. -

A look back at...Faith discovers the Cincinnati Observatory

In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth. (Genesis 1.1 New American Standard Bible).

A group from Faith toured the facility on Sunday, July 9th and they sure learned a lot! They learned that the Cincinnati Observatory Center is known as “The Birthplace of American Astronomy.” Recently restored to its original beauty, the observatory is a fully functioning 19th century observatory used daily by the public and amateur astronomers. It played a fascinating role in the history and development of Cincinnati. Here’s a fun fact: Mt. Adams was named after President John Quincy Adams who was passionate about astronomy and played an important role in the establishment of the observatory.

Enjoy these photos from their afternoon adventure. Interested in learning more? The observatory, located at 3489 Observatory Place, is open Monday through Friday 12-4 PM for self-guided tours, the 2nd and 4th Sundays 1-4 PM for guided tours, most Thursday and Friday evenings for stargazing and other times for special events throughout the year. www.cincinnatiobservatory.org. We are a fully functioning 19th century observatory used daily by the public and amateur astronomers, civic organizations, teachers and students, scouts and history buffs.

One of the two buildings on the beautiful 14 acre site at the top of Mt. Lookout. Both buildings house working telescopes and are designated as National Historic Landmarks. In the 1990’s the owners considered selling the land to developers to build high rise condominiums, but a coalition of neighbors, historian, preservationist and amateur and professional astronomers took action to save the observatory as a center for astronomy education.



In the early days a teenager was paid 25 cents a night to operate the moving parts to position the telescope for the astronomer. During the tour, he had Adelaide demonstrate the work that had to be done.

A look back at...Faith tours Cincinnati's Murals

We are fortunate as Cincinnatians to support and celebrate the arts in our downtown with awesome murals. On June 11, 2017, Kurt and Karen Reiber led the youth group and some other congregation members for a walking tour of about 22 of the 35 murals in downtown Cincinnati and Over the Rhine. Artworks is a non-profit organization that has worked with over 3,000 youth and over 2500 local professional artists to create 132 murals to date, (several more murals are currently under construction). Artworks' goal is to have one mural in every neighborhood in the Cincinnati area. A group favorite was the *Cincinnati Toy Heritage* it featured some great toys like the Etch-a-sketch, Care Bears, Yoda, Mr. Potato Head and many toy memories past and present. Each mural has some connection to Cincinnati and it's rich history like Cincinnati strong man—Henry Holtgrewe who was said to have been able to lift the Cincinnati Reds Team up on his back and Elizabeth Norse, a Mount Healthy resident who studied art both here in Cincinnati and Paris. We capped off the day with a ride on the *Cincinnati Connector*, the new streetcar as we viewed the final couple of murals before heading for home. A relaxing day enjoying the arts was had by all!
