Dual-credit class prepares students for future

Mount Carmel students have a unique opportunity this year to earn college credit, and get a headstart on their future careers. A new medical terminology class was introduced for high-school students.

A former school nurse and teacher, Teresa Cowan runs this class. Cowan said the class was added to the schedule because of student interest, and many of them hope to work in the medical profession someday. It is a dual-credit class with Bluegrass Technical Community and College, so students will be earning college credits before they graduate high school.

Freshman Jaycob Faughn said he was encouraged to take the class by his mother, a practicing physician. After being in the class for several weeks, Faughn said it has been interesting and he is learning a lot about why certain terminology is used.

Cowan said Mount Carmel Principal Eric Osborn asked her to teach a medical class because of her previous experience teaching similar classes, and she was excited about the opportunity to share her knowledge with students.

Cowan has previously taught at BCTC, but worked as a school nurse for the majority of her career. She has also worked at the Clark County Health Department, Some other medical based jobs she has worked are things such as at Clark County health department.

"This class prepares them (students) to speak the language of healthcare," Cowan said. "It prepares them so if they go into the healthcare field they will understand what different terminology means so that they can take the necessary steps for whatever is required of them while in that field."

There are seven students in the class this year, with varying interests and future plans. The response to the course has been overwhelmingly positive, and students said they are appreciative of the opportunity.


50 Years Ago October 1974





The bamboo is native to China, and is considered one of the fastest growing plants in the world, as well as one of the strongest.

The plant is currently five inches tall a week after being transplanted from a pot to the ground. Messer said he expects it to reach 55 or 60 feet.



News team is one of a variety of electives offered to students, along with sports and journalism.




