We seem to have more feasting than fasting, making merry than mourning over the lost, we have lots of applause with little reverence, many services but few converts. There seems to be a persistent clamor that the gospel shall adapt itself to the spirit of the age, and not that the people of the age shall repent and believe the gospel truths. We are not lacking in eloquent preachers in many pulpits, nor artistic singers in the choirs, but the appeal of the soul winner is lacking. We talk charmingly about goodness and sing seraphically about Heaven,

Christ. And the new birth is just as necessary as when our Lord preached to Nicodemus in the shadows of the Judean night. The trouble is just as in the days of the weeping prophet. "My people have committed two evils; they have forsaken me, the fountain of living water, and hewed them out cisterns, broken cisterns, that hold no water."(Jer. 2: 13) Don't you think that it is high time we learn the futility of our human endeavor, the folly of fighting in our own strength, in the armor of our own invention? We need the Spirit who came at Pentecost. Let us not perish for lack of the breath of God.

SOME THINGS ARE NOT EASY

Scientific developments and economic prosperity through the years have created for most a soft life. The onerous task of shoveling snow has been relieved by the snow blower. Or perhaps we have managed to escape snow altogether by moving to areas where winter's discomforts are seldom or never a problem. Increasing numbers of us live in housing arrangements under which all our yard work and major maintenance jobs are done by others. And our homes, these days, are filled with a plethora of labor saving appliances and comfort enhancing devices. We move from place to place in efficient and comfortable cars that have power steering, power brakes and automatic transmissions that have made driving a pleasure. Sitting through a church service is made easier by padded pews and carefully controlled temperatures in both winter and summer. And should we be called upon to kneel, it is sure to be upon a carpeted floor if not upon a wellpadded kneeler.

Some aspects of Christian living and the Lord's work will never be easy. This is especially true of effective intercessory prayer. Clearly the New Testament teaches there are important things that cannot be accomplished apart from fasting and long periods of waiting on God. Some praying brings the believer into conflict with demonic forces. Jesus emphasized in (Luke 11) and again in (Luke 18) the importance of persistence in prayer. There is still need for extended seasons and earnest effort in intercession. Intercessory prayer is work. It is the product of discipline more often than delight. It fights sleepiness, pushes back distractions, perseveres despite discouragements and asks not for recognition or praise. It does not stop when the knees get sore and the body is tired. It does not hurry away after 15 minutes to return to other things. It is not relegated to spare minutes but is the first concern and priority. Indeed, in order to learn how to pray or to increase our effectiveness we end up spending more time reading books, attending week-end seminars or listening to inspiring speakers than we spend in actual prayer. To become true prayer warriors we must practice forcing ourselves, when it may become sometimes painful, to do so until we establish habits of protracted and travailing praying. Let us be honest. Few of us are paying the price of effective intercession. But that could change.

Every morning and evening I see people jogging. Some reflect pain on their faces and soaked with perspiration. Recently I have seen people who have braved bitter cold temperatures and biting wind to get their exercise. To whip their bodies into shape they expend this time and push their bodies to exhaustion. Persevering despite discomforts. Surely there are those of us who are willing to so as much in the ministry of intercessory prayer. The whole jogging craze started when many people finally were convinced that soft living was leading North America to ruin. Perhaps real intercessory prayer will become more common again when enough Christians recognize that softness could lead the church to ruin.
