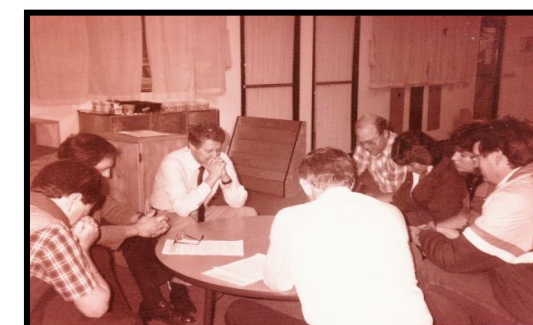
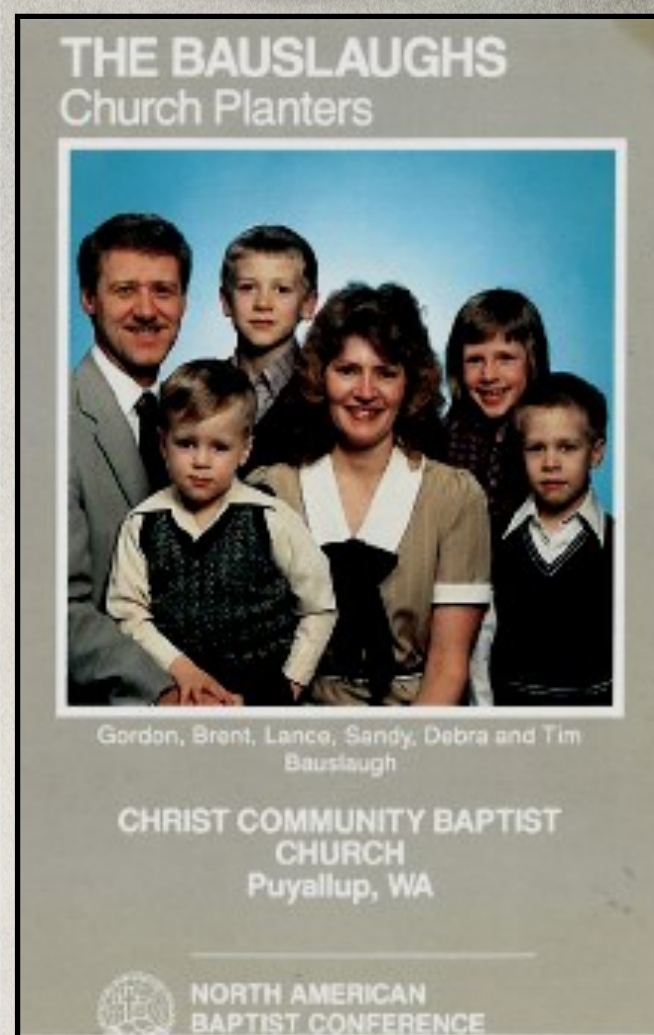
Introduction:

Christ Community Baptist Church began in 1986 based on a demographic study that determined the area of South Hill was ripe for a new church to be planted.

Families primarily from Calvary Baptist, Tacoma, met for prayer, Bible studies and going door-to-door calling.

In December of that same year Pastor Gordon Bauslaugh was called to be the planter/pastor of this project.

From 1986, and for the next 30 years history of our church, it is amazing and encouraging how God has blessed this ministry whenever we reached out to those in our community.





1986:

The first meetings were in homes. Here are some from the Dickau's former house. The Dickau's are still members today.

1986 – Demographics are conducted by PNW Association for new church project on South Hill, Puyallup.

Families primarily from Calvary Baptist meet for prayer, Bible Studies and door-to-door calling in the community

- Provide more educational-disciple making rooms for children and LIFE groups

\$600,000 will come from our "Building Upon Our Vision" Capital Campaign

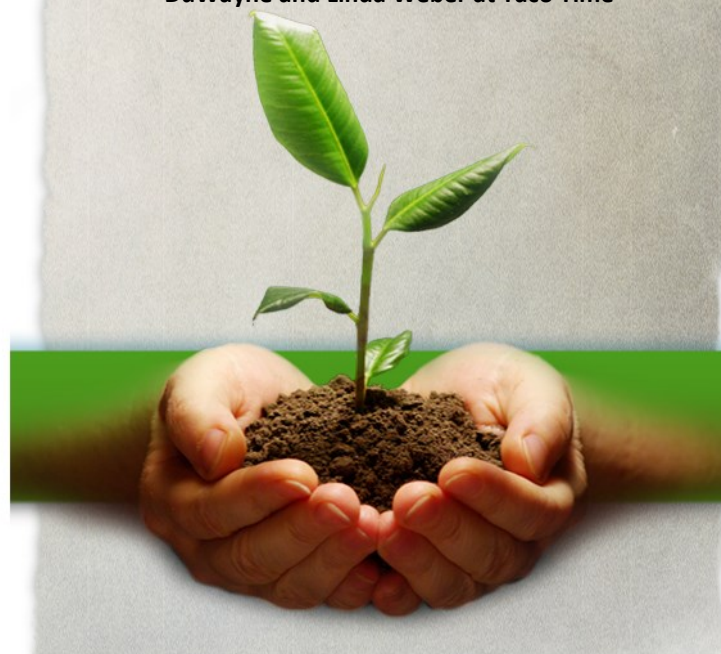

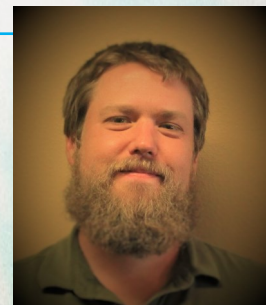
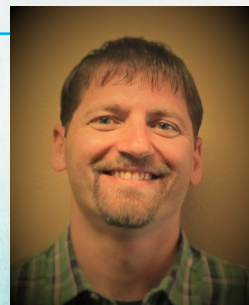

Melissa Amberg & Tami Lindgren become our two, part-time Church Ministry Assistants in a ministry job share
Mike Morrison no longer Youth Director

In just over 29 years of CCBC we have interviewed 883 individuals for church membership (1/3 of these were also baptized at CCBC). Yearly we remove individuals who have either moved away or chosen to not to continue to worship at CCBC. We have a strong military presence and students growing up at CCBC yet moving away to go to school and then often times not returning back locally to live. As a result of yearly purging the inactive members, our church membership is lean, and I believe, quite healthy.



1987 – 42 average attendance for final seven months of the year that we held public services

27 CCBC members at end of year

May – First public services are held at “Children Garden’s Day Care” on Meridian Ave.

October – Church Project’s name and constitution are recognized by the association and the Puyallup church project is recognized as a new church and accepted into the PNW Association.

1988 – 58 average attendance

38 CCBC members at end of year

Public meetings move to a new location, “La Petite Day Care” on Gem Heights Drive due to overcrowding.

Purchased nearly five acres on 176th Street (a main road artery)



Cindy Junkert began as our church Ministry Assistant, first voluntarily and then eventually paid

1989 – 88 average attendance

55 CCBC members at end of year

September – Sunday School for all ages begins.

1990 – 111 average attendance

73 CCBC members at end of year

September – For 5 Sundays public meetings moved to the outdoors (due to a lack of meeting place) in Mountain Park development. (A local newspaper called us the “Gypsy Baptists”).

October – public meetings began at Brouillet Elementary School.

1991 – 132 average attendance

101 CCBC members at end of year

1992 – 141 average attendance

119 CCBC members at end of year

September – Building Fund Goal, “Team your Mite with His Might” of \$90,000 “over and above giving” is reached.

October 11 – Ground Breaking service for new 10,869 sq. ft. multi-purpose, educational and office building (eventually an approximate 13,000 sq. ft. building was built, including two modulars). A personal gift made of \$50,000 by a couple encouraged us to build more educational rooms.

Additional titles and responsibilities are given to John Golling (Children’s Ministries) and P.J. Tangedahl (Adult Ministries).

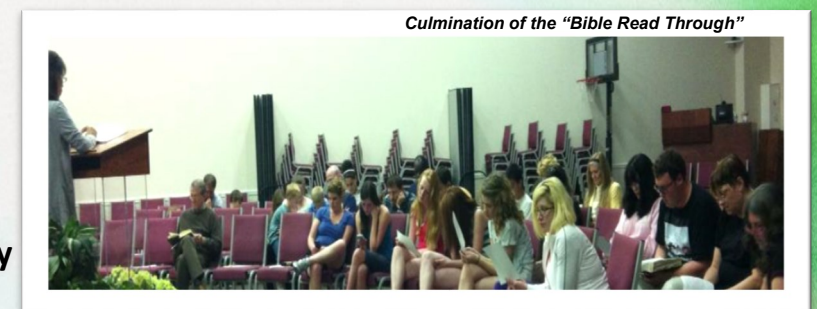

Congregation gave approximately \$70,000 in a “no name”, over and above, giving campaign allowing us to build an appropriate platform, have a permanent power point screen and most of all, our own baptistry.

2004 – 296 average attendance

245 CCBC members at end of year

Began second morning service. Church committed to a three-year, over and above giving program called “The Experience Faith Project,” pledging \$543,475. (Initial goal was \$600,000 with advance gift goal of \$150,000 = \$750,000). This campaign was to address as much of the following as would allow: 1) Storm water run-off field required by the county,

2) Connect to county sewer system, 3) Add paved parking which would then allow us to: 4) Add needed educational space, 5) Reduce our debt on existing building, and 6) Look into purchasing one of the adjacent properties.
