Quietly, subtly, and unobtrusively Jesus made his way into the world in a stable out back because there was no room in the Bethlehem hotel. This narrative has become such a familiar story that we don't always catch the nuances as this scene is played out. Long before the labor pains and contractions, the prophet Isaiah gives a hint that something special is coming. "For unto us a child is born, for to us a son is given and the government will be upon his shoulders. He will be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace" (Isaiah 9:6). Other Old Testament prophets like Zachariah and Micah drop hints as well that God will do something special to bring redemption and restoration to God's people, in an unexpected and unforeseen manner.

The people of God certainly had their expectations of what the Messiah would be...of a warrior like figure who would come with power and might to push back the oppressive Roman forces; of a new king who would reign over King Herod and his tyrannical tactics; of a new priest who would restore the religious importance of Jerusalem and its temple. They were expecting, even hoping for one who would come to right the wrongs and to bring not only redemption, but also retribution for years and years of oppression and persecution.

But the one who arrived in Bethlehem was much different than the one expected: born in a stable, not in a palace; born among shepherds, not among princes; born into a dysfunctional family, not among those with silver spoons and name recognition. All of this for us! No one can't say that Jesus doesn't relate to them. To paraphrase G.K. Chesterton, Jesus was born under us in order that all might be lifted up.

Within this incredible story we see the hand of God orchestrating and choreographing the details of this story. And at the root of this story are the virtues of humility, peace, and redemption. Amid the strife and toil that we face in our nation and world today, may we find in this story the One who still lives and reigns, the One who can make all things new, the One who can bring hope out of chaos and peace out of despair; the One who can bring resurrection from the grave and redemption to the lost.

It is a story that does not grow old. I would like to invite you back to this story once again this year and to see it with fresh eyes. Join us for our special Christmas Eve services on Sunday, December 24 at 5 PM and 10 PM.

For unto us a child is born and this child is names Jesus, the one who saves us and redeems us. Happy Advent and merry Christmas to you and your families! -Pastor Dave


