Madagascar Pastor Coming to Billings on October 3

The Rev. Lala Rasendrahasina from Madagascar is coming to Billings as an International Peacemaker with the Presbyterian Peacemaking Program. Pastor Lala has served as moderator of the Church of Jesus Christ in Madagascar since 2004. Madagascar has faced political turmoil since 1972, resulting in poverty, violence, crime and skyrocketing unemployment. Religious leaders,

including the Rev. Lala, have been called upon to mediate between the major politicians in their country to resolve the crisis. The process of reconciliation is dangerous; the Rev. Lala had to relocate to Michigan for a few years before he was able to return to Madagascar.

Pastor Lala will give a presentation on Friday, October 3 at St. Andrew Presbyterian Church 180 24th St. West, Billing. The potluck dinner, hosted by the Mission Committee, will begin at 6:30 p.m. followed by Pastor Lala's presentation. Please bring a side dish to share at dinner. Call 656-9256 for more information.

CHURCH AND SOCIETY SCHEDULE FOR OCTOBER

Our Church & Society class meets on Sunday mornings at 9:15 AM. Our guests for the month of October will be:

October 5: Brent Cromley, City Council Member, Former Montana Senator and Representative, will discuss "The Billings Non-Discrimination Ordinance." Brent will discuss the history of the proposed ordinance, going back to January of 2014 when the City Council voted 10-1 to have City legal staff draft an ordinance based upon those passed in Missoula, Butte, and Helena, and bring it to the Council for consideration. That 'directive' specified that the proposed ordinance should prohibit discrimination in Billings, based upon, among other things, a person's sexual orientation. Brent will discuss the technical parts of the ordinance, the issues, and the its opposition and support. He also will discuss the effects of the ordinance not passing and whether it will be addressed again.

October 12: Olena South, Native of Ukraine, will address "Visiting Ukraine Today." Olena will discuss the background leading up to the conflict in Ukraine. She will include the effects on the people and her family, who still reside in the western part of Ukraine. Now a U.S. citizen, Olena will also detail the process of gaining citizenship in our country.

October 19: Barb Brady, Program Director for Saint Vincent Healthcare Foster Grandparent Program, will speak on "Improving the Health of Billings through Foster Grand parenting." Under the auspices of the Federal National Service Program there are over 50 foster grandparents serving non-profits and schools in Billings and the nearby reservations. Representing cultural and religious diversity, foster grandparents work with at risk and lower income children with the mission helping solve community problems. Barb will demonstrate how the interaction between the volunteer grandparents and children has health benefits for all involved.

October 26: Shelby Long-Hammond, Associate Professor of Communication Studies at Rocky Mountain College and Director of the Debate Program, and Members of the Debate Team, will share "The Common Core Curriculum; Is it Appropriate?" Shelby will discuss the history of the debate team at RMC and its method of using British Parliamentary debate procedures. Members of the team will then demonstrate civil discourse by debating the religious and philosophical challenges facing Common Core.

Habitat for Humanity Open House: Saturday, October 4 at 12noon

Habitat for Humanity will be hosting an Open House at their ReStore located at 1617 1st Ave North on Saturday, October 4 from 12noon—1:30 PM. Join Pastor Dave and others for a time to learn more about Habitat and how they have a positive influence on our community. Ice cream will also be served.

Habitat is a nonprofit, ecumenical Christian housing ministry that seeks to eliminate poverty housing from the world and to make decent shelter a matter of

conscience and action. To accomplish this, we invite people of all backgrounds, races and religions to build houses together in partnership with families in need. Habitat builds houses with volunteer labor and community donations, and then sells the houses to pre-qualified homebuyers at \$0 profit with a 0% interest loan.

Habitat was founded in 1976 by Millard Fuller, along with his wife, Linda. The Yellowstone County affiliate, Habitat for Humanity Mid-Yellowstone Valley, was founded in 1992 and built the first house here in 1993. Locally, volunteers with the support of thousands of donors, have built 67 houses, and are currently working on houses #68 and 69. House #68 will be completed and dedicated in a ceremony on October 16th.

The program has housed over 200 children in Yellowstone County in simple, decent, affordable, safe homes thanks to the efforts of generous community members.

Please pray for adequate shelter for all, in recognition of the Habitat for Humanity International Day of Prayer, and throughout the year.
