

Romans Chapter 15

Romans 15: 1-7 are actually the concluding verses of the previous chapter. Romans 15:1-7 address the issue of when Christians disagree. In Romans 14 the great apostle gives us remedies for Christian disagreements.

- Receive one another. (vvs. 1-12)
- Edify one another. (vvs. 13-23)

In Romans 15: 17 Paul instructs the believers to:

- Attempt to please one another. (15:1-7)

V1. What is the difference between a strong and a weak Christian?

V2. List some practical ways we can edify/strengthen one another.

V3. What is the problem when we please ourselves? Discuss Jesus' example.

V4. Discuss the importance of studying the bible.

V5. Jesus is our example in all things. What aspect of Jesus' life is Paul asking Christians to model? What is Paul's petition in prayer for believers?

V6. The result of Paul's petition was, both the strong and weak Christian glorify God.

V7. Christians can disagree without being disagreeable and God still get the glory

Romans 15: 8-16:27

In verses 8-13 Paul continues to instruct concerning the ministry of Christ to the Gentiles.

V9. What reason do the Gentiles have to glorify God?

V12. Who is the root of Jesse?

V13. What is the encouragement for the Gentiles?

V15. Paul was writing because God's grace had been extended to him.

V16. God's grace allowed Paul to minister to the Gentiles.

V17. Paul was certain to give God glory in everything he did. Paul could have bragged but he gave the glory to God.

V18. What role did/do miracles play in ministry?

V19. What did Paul attribute his preaching to from Jerusalem to Illyricum?

V20. Why didn't Paul preach the gospel where the name of Jesus had been established?

V21. Paul explains the purpose of both a missionary and a preacher what are they?

V22. Because of Paul's ministry of missions and preaching he was delayed from coming to Rome.

V24. Paul announces more travel plans.

V25. He's going to Jerusalem to minister to the saints.

V26. Let us know that the Gentiles were loving towards the Jews.
