Drowning discriminates. While no one is immune, statistics indicate that race, income, and parental swimming know-how put certain groups of people at a greater risk of accidental death or injury than others.

- Over 4,000 people drown each year. That's an average of 11 fatal drownings per day. Nearly 80% are male.
- There are over 8,080 nonfatal drownings annually which can lead to brain damage or long-term disabilities.
- 23% of child drownings happen during a family gathering near a pool.
- Children younger than one-year-old are more likely to drown at home.
- 87% of drowning fatalities happen in home pools or hot tubs for children younger than 5. Most take place in pools owned by family or friends.
- 64% of black, 45% of Hispanic/Latino, and 40% of white children have few to no swimming skills.
- When parents have no/low swimming skills, their children are unlikely to have proficient swimming skills.
- Black children ages 5-19 drown in swimming pools at rates 5.5 times higher than white children in the same age range.
- 79% of children in households with incomes less than \$50,000 have few-to-no swimming skills.

The city of Portage, Indiana has a problem: there is a lake in our backyard. We are located on the southern shore of Lake Michigan and enjoy access to several recreational beaches, many of which are not guarded, just a few minutes away from any home in the city. Satellite images from Google Earth reveal that countless homes, trailer parks, and apartment complexes have private pools. It is ironic that one of the only places in the city that does not have a pool is our local YMCA.

YMCA's are renown for aquatic programming. In over 10,000 neighborhoods nationwide,YMCA's teach a drowning prevention program called Safety Around Water ("SAW") to over 9 million children and offer traditional swim lessons to another 1 million people each year. The Portage YMCA leverages the strength and expertise of

the national network of Y's to deliver its own high-quality aquatics programs to the community.

The Portage YMCA has offered swim lessons for decades despite its lack of a pool. The organization has rented time at local private pools including the high school and nearby hotels, but each offsite location severely limits the program's capacity by restricting hours of operation and number of participants allowed in the small pools.

Building a pool on the YMCA's property located in the center of the city will expand the community's ability to offer SAW, swim lessons, aquatic aerobic cardio classes, and lap-swimming. People of every age and fitness level will benefit from the pool which promises to deliver the Y's mission to build a healthy spirit, mind, and body for all.

DROWNING IS PREVENTABLE

IMPACT & OUTCOMES

SAVING LIVES. There is no higher purpose to building a pool than to prevent drowning deaths through educational water safety programming available to the whole community.

Building the Portage Pool will **improve the quality of life** in Portage and the surrounding area in the following ways:

- Increase the Portage Y's capacity to provide swim lessons to hundreds more children and adults every year, building strong swimmers and confident kids
- Increase public safety through SAW and swim lessons and general awareness of drowning risks
- Improve community bonds by bringing people into close contact with each other in a fun environment that fosters friendships and engagement
- Add to community's recreational and property values
- Encourage fitness for the whole family
- Provide access to fitness for those who cannot participate in strenuous or high impact workouts including the elderly, pregnant, and those with knee, ankle, and back conditions
- Increase access to fitness classes
- Combat childhood obesity as swimming is one of the best ways to maintain physical fitness
- Create jobs and financial health for teens and young adults as lifeguards plus other staff ranging from swim instructors to administrative support
- Introduce young swimmers to the world of competitive athletics
- Provide a controlled environment for first responders to train and conduct water rescue drills

Decades of development by leading experts in drowning prevention has produced robust resources for independent Y's to deliver the highest quality, consistent water experiences for its participants. From facilities maintenance to pool deck safety procedures to progressive swim curriculum for all ages to assessment reporting to staff development, the YMCA has a well-written and polished best practice to accompany every aspect of aquatics programming.

There is no other organization better equipped or more experienced to teach life-saving skills in the safest environment possible than the YMCA. The Portage Y has been utilizing these resources for decades in its own aquatics program that has been held off-site at rented venues like hotels and a school. The Portage Y is poised to easily level-up its aquatics program when the new pool is delivered, backed by the strength and confidence of the national YMCA's expertise.




WHO BENEFITS

37,000 people live in the city of Portage. The Y's service area stretches out to include South Haven, Lake Station, and Gary. Prior to the pandemic, the Portage Township YMCA served over 6,000 members. One out of every 6 residents rely on the Y for a wide array of programs and services including free meals every weeknight for children under 18, preschool, youth sports, off-site swim lessons, before and after school care, summer camp, open gym/basketball, group exercise classes, access to cardio and weight equipment, and social engagement and volunteer opportunities.

The Y strives to meet the needs of its community and fill the gaps in service to improve the quality of life in Portage. Examples include delivering meals to families in need who lack transportation, offering a virtual platform for health seekers to exercise at home at their convenience, and offering scholarships to make programming more affordable.

The Y fields dozens of phone calls daily and the #1 question asked is, "Do you have a pool?" The Portage Y is ready to respond to this unmet need with your support.





JUST ADD WATER

On the east side of the Portage Township YMCA's building is an expanse of land that extends to Willowcreek Rd. Currently, it's nothing more than a lawn under which there are no utility lines. It was meant to be the location of a pool in 2007 when the building more than doubled its footprint from 25,000 sq. ft. to 58,000 sq. ft. with an expansion project that cost \$5.5 million. Lack of fundraising support caused by the Great Recession scaled back the project's scope and the pool was not installed.

The Portage Pool will be built on this site and covered with a low-maintenance and economical retractable roof that will allow for year-round programming.

SUSTAINABILITY

The cost of managing, programming, and maintaining a pool is exorbitant causing many community pools to close indefinitely every year. The fatal mistake is in assuming that "if we build it they will come." Historically, installing a pool only increases membership by a small percentage after an

initial spike. Since many aquatics programs are free or low cost, the fees collected for swim lessons, etc., are so low that they hardly cover the instructor and life guard salaries.

Education and services centered around a pool are known as a missional program: one that is essential to the community but operates at a deficit. So then, how can the Portage Y sustain a pool?


REVENUE PROJECTIONS

The Portage Township YMCA will sustain the cost of a new pool by relying on a mix of program fees, 50% of increased membership revenue, and annual distributions from the Portage Pool Endowment managed by the Porter County Community Foundation. While the endowment funds are not absolutely necessary to operate the pool, it will ensure that that the Portage Y will have a steady stream of funding not dependent on external factors that affect membership trends and correlating revenue. That's why the Portage Y is fundraising to construct the pool <u>and</u> invest in its endowment fund.

DONOR RECOGNITION

WILL YOU HELP DIG THE PORTAGE POOL?

It's going to take financial support from the whole community to raise the capital needed to install the pool. The Portage Township YMCA will launch its capital campaign in three phases.


The first step is to identify the lead donor (the Aqua Hero) who will kickoff the fundraising with the largest donation. The lead donor will be given the right to name the pool and be included in all media releases.

Next, the campaign will need two major donors (Life Savers) to commit to funding the next largest donation amounts.

The final phase will ask the community--individuals and businesses--to make meaningful contributions to the project. Their gifts will be recognized in a number of ways defined by their levels.

Raising \$3-5 million will require more than 600 donors to invest in the community at amounts never before seen in Portage.

This is an unprecendented rally cry for help. It's up to the people to respond.

PROJECT STOPPERS

While the Portage Township YMCA leaders and staff have been anticipating the addition of a pool since the building expansion project in 2007 (just before the Great Recession), there are two key factors that are needed before the first shovel pierces the soil.

- 1. Firm financial commitments to cover the cost of construction and initial operations:
 - City of Portage
 - · Lead donor
 - · Other municipal sources of funding including gifts and grants
 - Community support resulting in meaningful donations from businesses and individuals
- 2. 100% cash in-hand. The Portage Y will not finance any portion of this project.
