July 30, 2018

Meeting called to order by: President Mindi Esswein

Minutes: June 2018 council minutes were corrected and approved. (M/S/P Pastor Matt

Day: Jerry Crites)

Financial Report: Financial reports were presented by Bess Day. Luther Hall water and

electric bills were lower.

The Mustard Seed is doing well. They received a \$10,000 grant for new playground equipment. The pancake dinner proceeds will go toward playground bedding.

Pastor's Report: The following proposals by Pastor Day were addressed by council

- •Vacation Bible School was good; all activities were centered in Luther Hall
- Pastor has at 2 new individuals seeking membership and possibly 5 others interested in membership.
- •Blaine Wilson has volunteered to represent St. John's congregation at the Conference Leaders Gathering on Sunday, August 5th at the Martinsburg Holiday Inn.
- •\$890 remained in the Conference funds raised for the Gathering in Houston. The cost per person was \$1265.16. The remainder will be held for the next Gathering to be held in Minneapolis. For the next Gathering, fundraising for the event will take place at least a year before the 2021.
- •Pastor presented several proposals:
- 1) As a part of the devotion, Council members will read two chapters each month from Leading Beyond the Walls: Developing Congregations with a Heart for the Unchurched by Adam Hamilton, available from Amazon for about \$15.
- 2) Pastor would like to expand our confirmation preparation to include a youth group for 6th & 7th grader. The educational materials we will use for the the middle school youth group is *Echo the Story*, from Augsburg Fortress, a 12 session series. The focus will be on building relationships and building a biblical foundation so that more can be done with the youth once they reach confirmation. Once a month this younger group with have lunch with the confirmands and then break off to the youth group room for games and bible study for an hour or so. We will also be moving our confirmation program to the conference level. We will keep the same focus and curriculum that we have been using for the past few years, but will add the good practices from other congregations to make sure we can offer the best, possible program.

3) A day of service projects for the conference called, "God's Work. Our Hands." will be scheduled on September 8th from 10-2pm with St. John's as the hub for the activities of the day. A bag lunch will be provided t was suggested we contacting the United Way for project ideas.

•New Business:

- •Luther Hall Request: Saturday, 11/3/18, noon to 9pm for a Wedding Anniversary celebration requested by Melissa Shoemaker. (M/S/P Jerry Crites/Diane Shewbridge)
- •We reviewed our One Year Goal (For a more detailed summary of this discussion, please see the recap article in the newsletter).
 - •Help people feel safe and welcome: improve and increase lighting inside and outside of the church. Darrell will ask Trenary how much it would cost to put a dusk/dawn or timer light pole in our parking lot to address safety concerns.
 - •Hold at least one social gathering per month: family films, Table Talks@Daily Grind, etc.
 - •Involve FLYTE kids in service at least once per month: providing music, readings, visit to Holocaust Museum/Washington DC.
 - •Develop a marketing/evangelism plan for the congregation: Banners, post cards, special theme Sundays

We will look at 3 year goals at the next meeting (9/17/18)

Unfinished Business:

•Interim Choir Director – there are currently 2 applicants. Pastor and the committee request more time. Action was tabled.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Christian Education: Vacation Bible School had 60 attendees. The schedule changes made for this year were good. The program kicked off on Sunday evening and ran through Thursday. A big activity was planned for Friday – a baseball game at Hagerstown Suns Stadium - 110 people attended. A good time was had by all. Sunday School Surveys are in progress. Betty Lou Boyton is working with Christian Ed on the Rally Day picnic.

Social Ministry: Attendance at the Friends Feeding Friends served 80 meals to 62 Friends; some new faces attended. The next Friends Feeding Friends will be on August 25th. A movie, *I Can Only Imagine*, with a light lunch after church is planned.

Evangelism: Pastor said that he really enjoyed preaching on evangelism over the past few weeks and said that he planned on doing more of this in the future.

Worship and Music: Piano tuning has been scheduled. The sound system replacement fund is lacking \$500. We need to try to have the project completed as soon as possible. An appeal for donations to get the work done will be made. There is a need for adult size worship assistant robes.

FLYTE: See the Pastor's proposal for the new pre-confirmation program for youth in the 6th and 7th grades.

Property/Tech: Trenary is replacing lights in the choir loft. A piece of the railing will be made removable. Darrell will get a quote to retrofit the lights with LED lighting. The control panel at the rear of the choir loft on the right needs to be made more user-friendly for safety and energy efficiency. As mentioned, installing a pole light in the parking lot will be explored to provide lighting and safety for evening events at church. The steeple repair has been started with the removal of old pieces and materials. Repair will continue as the contractor is able. Darrell reported on the A/C estimates from Griffith Energy Services and Shenandoah Heating and Air. Griffith's estimate (\$65,000 plus \$9,000 for the kitchen) was higher than Shenandoah's (\$56,000) but Griffith included expenses for all associated costs where Shenandoah omitted some costs from the estimate that would be crucial to the properly completed job. A motion was made to go forward with Griffith Energy and create two separate proposals: One for for the \$60,000 already approved by the congregation and another proposal for the remainder of the work which will need congregational approval at a latter date. (M/S/P Pastor Matt:Mike Noll). Darrell abstained from voting.

Mutual Ministry: This committee plans to meet with Pastor Matt in the near future. **Stewardship:** No report

With no other business, the meeting adjourned with the Lord's Prayer. (M/S/P Pastor Matt:Jerry Crites)


CONFIRMATION PROGRAM OVERVIEW

After a meeting of the different participating congregations, we have drafted a new proposal for a confirmation program that is intended to reach more of our youth at an earlier age with the hopes of preparing them for a life of faith.

6th and 7th Graders: Youth Group

A youth-group style Bible Study. This would happen once a month at the same time as our confirmation program. The kids would have lunch with the confirmands and then move to the youth group room for a time of games and Bible Study. They would only be together for about an hour to an hour and a half. The goal of this group is to build relationships and prepare them for confirmation so that less attention in Confirmation has to be spent on developing a Biblical foundation so that larger, more important themes around social justice, stewardship, church polity, leadership, prayer, etc can be explored more deeply

Curriculum: Echo the Story from Augsburg Fortress





8th Grade: First year of Confirmation

Luther's Small Catechism. Class is once a month for four hours on a Sunday. Lunch starts at 1 pm to allow all congregations the chance to make it on time. Class will end at 5pm. Class time is divided into two parts: Learning and then reinforcement. During the reinforcement time, an activity will be done to help show how what they learned can be used every day in regards to faith. These actives can include a

movie with discussion, a field trip, service project, panel discussion, etc.

9th Grade: Second Year of Confirmation

Focus on Bible and how to read the Bible. The same class design laid out above in the first year class will carry over to the second year. They will also be introduced to a chart to help them learn how to read a particular passage of scripture. The chief philosophy of confirmation is to build a relationship with students so that, no matter where they might go or leave, they will know there is a church that loves them and will support them. Learning something is secondary but with adding an additional component of 6th and 7th grade youth group, we hope that we can begin to build the relationship sooner and last longer.

Location:

Classes will be held either at St. Peter's or St. John's. The goal is to make the switch mid-year.

Participating Congregations:

•St. John's Lutheran Church

•St. Peter's Lutheran Church •St Thomas Lutheran Church

•St. James Lutheran Church •Trinity Lutheran Church

Materials needed for Class

- I. A Bible (No KJV or Paraphrased translations such as the Message). We will provide one! Make sure you bring it.
- 2.**Luther's Small Catechism** (Don't worry, we will provide this too. Just make sure you bring it!)

3.A notebook.

Expectations for Parents, Students, and church members:
We do not like having requirements because it goes against our doctrine of grace. However, confirmation is not possible unless everyone involved (both parents, students, and teachers) participate in as many activities of our program as possible.

•Attend class when possible. Life happens and there will be times when you can't make it to class, just don't make it a habit. If you miss a class or have to leave more than hour early from class, there will be a

written assignment that you must complete before the next class period. They will be available on our website or by sending your pastor an email.


- •The Confirmation Retreat is important and, in my mind, a requirement for everyone. Please mark the weekend on your calendars.
- •**Sermon Notes:** Need to be done once a month and turned in at each confirmation class.
- •Bring your books!
- •Be on time.
- •Participate in class discussion.
- •Serve in Worship
- •Parents, we ask that you be open to talking to your children about what they learn. Ask questions and encourage them to share their point of view. You are their role models when it comes to faith so don't be shy in sharing your faith with you children.
- •Church members, when you see a confirmand at worship or around town, introduce yourself, talk them about their faith, make sure they feel welcomed and appreciated. We need good role models!



On this day, we will sing hymns about Angels and give thanks to God for the work of all Angels still happening today.


PET BLESSING

REVIEW OF OUR 1 YEAR GOALS

In the name of the Father, and the Son, and the Holy Spirit. Amen.

By July 31, 2018, we have accomplished:

- Help people feel more safe and welcome at our congregation by improving the lighting around the church campus (including the parking lot), having parking lot ushers to welcome people to the congregation for both day and night activities, and create a shepherding program to help new members and visitors learn about our ministry.
 - We are working with an electrical company to install a light in the back parking lot. Until that happens, we have a temporary solutions of a shop light that can be mounted on the roof the shed. We have had parking lot ushers at all large services such as Christmas and Easter but have not had any volunteers for normal Sunday mornings. The Shepherding Program has evolved into a less formal program. After some encouragement from the pastor, members were instructed to greet anyone they did not recognize, especially those new people in their particular seating section.
- Hold a least one new Social Gathering per month including but not limited to Pub Theology, a men's group or an ice cream social.
 - We were 100% successful in accomplishing this goal.
- Involve FLYTE kids in worship at least once a month.
 - We were not at all successful in completing this goal. After we created this goal, it became apparent that FLYTE was going through a change. We are hoping that because of the Gathering, we can use this momentum to help create some group cohesion.
- Develop a Marketing/Evangelism plan for the congregation.
 - We have created a plan to better use mailings, banners, and posters. However, the council does not believe this goal should ever be deemed accomplished. This goal should always be a work in progress.

3 YEAR GOALS

For St. John's

In the name of the Father, and the Son, and the Holy Spirit. Amen.

By November 30, 2020, we will:

- Increase Sunday worship attendance by 20% so that more people will be able to experience the great reward of being in a relationship with Jesus.
- Have 50% of the congregation's confirmed-membership fill out a Covenant so that we can seek out those ministry areas the Holy Spirit is leading us to do.
- Strengthen our physical involvement in community activities through participating in community organizations and schools.
