## 2018 ST. JOHN'S COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES December 10, 2018

**Meeting called to order by**: Vice President Jerry Crites **Members present:** Pastor Matt, Darrell Propst, Shane Wagoner, Linda Payne, Diane Shewbridge, Jerry Crites, Jane Kelley, Anne Moore, Mike Noll, Rick Losh (new), Drew Catrow (new), Bess Day (Treasurer)

**Members Absent:** Mindi Esswein, Ray Bentz, Austin Propst, Blaine Wilson

**Devotions:** Pastor Matt opened the meeting with prayer. **Minutes:** November 2018 meeting minutes approved. (M/S/P: **Pastor Matt:Darrell Propst**)

**Financial Report**: Finance Committee and Trustees met on November 19, 2018. Treasurer Bess Day reported that Endowment accounts were reviewed, cashflow projection for the coming quarter reviewed, additional authorized check signers were identified and the procedures for counting the offering were discussed to determine whether simplification is warranted. Priscilla Horner, Blaine Wilson and Rick Losh will be designated signers on the checking account. A follow up meeting will be scheduled.

**Pastor's Report**: As a follow up from the November meeting, Pastor presented a mock-up for a brochure and several suggestions and approximate costs for Evangelism Bags containing gifts for potential members/visitors. Council discussed various items that might be included: our brochure, cups, refrigerator magnets, pens, key chains, coloring pages, crayons, etc. Motion to go forward with purchasing tote bags and items to include in the bags for a per-filled bag at a total cost of \$10. (M/S/P: Darrell Propst:Linda Payne). Pastor discussed with council the preparations for Christmas Eve. Temporary lighting will be installed again in the parking lot for safety. Advertising will be considered in the Journal Weekender and also on Facebook. Supplies will be ordered as needed.

#### Pastor had one proposal.

•Our constitution needs to be updated. Bishop Riegel has offered to meet at St. Johns with a group from our congregation to make revisions. A committee consisting of two council members, two members of the congregation as well as council president and Pastor Matt will be formed. After meeting with the Bishop revision recommendations will be presented to council. A 2/3 majority vote is required at each level. Council members who volunteered for the committee are Darrell Propst, Mike Noll and Drew Catrow. Congregation members will be recruited.

After discussion, council decided to use continuous communion for 3 months beginning in January 2019. At that time council will evaluate feedback from the congregation. Communion will remain on the current schedule – 1<sup>st</sup> and 3<sup>st</sup> Sundays and church holidays. (M/S/P: Linda Payne:Diane Shewbridge). There is a Town Hall scheduled for Sunday, February 3<sup>st</sup> following the service. This will be an opportunity to get feedback on Communion.

## MILEAGE

My brothers and sisters in Christ,

Back in 2016, my wife and I went to Disney World. In February, we will be going again, only this time we will have Thomas, my brother, and

my parents coming along too. I am not someone who enjoys amusement parks and was not looking forward to going but I quicky learned Disney is different. After I got back, I wrote a newsletter article sharing my experience and what we, as a church, can learn from Disney. I thought it was appropriate to share that newsletter article with you all. So enjoy!

In February, my wife and I had the chance to take a week off and travel down to Disney World. Diane has wanted to go for some time so we saved our pennies for a while and decided to go. I was not to thrilled with the idea of going to Disney World but it grew on me and by the end of the week, I was already thinking about our next trip.

I was incredibly impressed with the entire experience. From the time we got off our plane, every one of our needs was met with a smiling face, willing to do whatever they could to make our stay magical. As we was watching the fireworks one evening, I jotted down some notes about our Disney experience that I think we as parish and individual congregations.

**There was a serious concentration on excellence.** Nothing Disney does is every simple or ordinary. From the movies, to the rides, to the robotic animation everything was excellent. Remember, I am not a big fan of amusement parks, but Disney World strives to be more than just an amusement park - they strive to be a destination that people want to come back to over and over. How can we become a place where people, disciples want to come back to over and over again not out obligation but because they enjoy our congregation?

#### The Music and food was amazing.

I ate some of the best food of my life at Disney World. We never went hungry and there was always more than enough to eat. I think we as congregations do pretty good at making food. I am always amazed at how elaborate our Lent Soup Suppers are especially when we compare them to other churches. We take food seriously (maybe as serious as Disney) and that is a good thing. The music at Disney was also top notch. I loved going to the fireworks shows not so much for the explosions (though I do enjoy explosions) but to the listen to the high caliber of music. Those firework shows were a pain because of all the people trying to exit the park at the same time, but the music made it worth staying. How can we strive to make our hospitality and music experience the best that it can be?

**They make every person's experience magical and special.** I am a foodie and really into the educational exhibits , and not so much into rides. Disney made sure there was something for me. My wife loves the roller coasters and they did not disappoint on that either (or so I am told). When we arrived to Orlando, we never touched our bags. In fact, they were brought up to our room the next morning by a Disney staff member. That alone was worth the trip for me, but they continued to go above and beyond to make everything magical.

## If a child is crying, it is the job of the cast members to make that child happy, no matter the cost.

On our day in Magic Kingdom, there was a child who had a little bit of a meltdown in a store. His mom took him outside to work it all out and staff member followed. That staff member got down on that child's level and did everything he could to make that little boy happy. Disney has learned something - make the children happy will also the make the parents even more happy and more likely to want to come back in the future. How are we making our children happy and comfortable when they come worship? What can we do to make worship a magical experience?

#### The parks were very clean.

Staff members walk around all day long picking up litter and making sure everything is as it should be. There was nothing junkie left around and in the places where they were doing construction, they did everything they could to hide it. I like it when somebody or an organization pays that much attention to the details and cleanliness. So often we get use to seeing clutter in our places of worship because it is always there. Maybe we walk by a piece of trash on our church campus. If we were to pay attention to the small details like clutter and trash, imagine all big details we will start to notice. Every single employee was held to very high expectations. Whether you were a trash collector or a singer in a performance, every employee was held to very high expectations that made them strive to be better in their work each day. In the church, we do not really have employees but leaders and members. We are all in this together. We need to hold ourselves to very high expectations and when one fails, we pick them up and help them to better themselves. The world calls this improvement, the church calls it repentance - a radical reorientation of one's life. How can we better ourselves and become better servants of Christ?

## Every day begins with a celebration and every night concludes with fireworks.

Worship is where this happens, or can happen. How do we make the worship a celebration for God coming into our world? And we are a little bit different than Disney; our main character has been crucified and resurrected. That means we cannot just focus on making worship a motivational speech and the pastor cannot just be a motivational speaker. We need to be willing to preach and accept both the bad and the good - the crucifixion and the resurrection. Worship will not always leave you feeling happy, but it should and needs to remind us that when we are in the pit of the most deepest of despair, we follow a man who knows what despair looks like and what happiness looks like as well.

And don't get me wrong, Disney World was not perfect. Everything was a far walk. The first day we were there, I walked 26,000 steps (I normally walk 5,000 steps a day). It was great for my body but my feet hurt for a good week after we got back. I also did not enjoy the inner-park transportation of buses. On our last night, we decided to take an Uber back to our room and save ourselves the hour long bus ride (it only took 10 minutes via the Uber ride). But I can guarantee you, Disney won't stop improving and neither should we become complacent with how things have become. We must strive to be better than ourselves and make our worship experience something people want to come back to, week after week.
