**Pastor's Report:** December 11<sup>th</sup> is the 1-year anniversary of the shooting at Lupita's Grocery Store on Queen Street across from St. Johns. St. John's will remember Lopita and all victims of violence by holding an abbreviated Compline service outside on the corner of Martin and Queen streets. Pastor presented templates for replacing the bulletin covers and *Celebrate* inserts that we purchase. By creating our own the church can save \$1500 a year. We will fine tune the formats prior to March when our current subscription to these publications expires. **Financial Report:** We were not able to meet our projected budget for 2019. However, the interest on investments was very good in 2019 and the Mustard Seed continues to operate in the black as investment over the years from St. John's has been reduced greatly.

**Pastor's Report:** Baby Day is due March 6<sup>th</sup> or so. Baptism will be celebrated on the first Sunday after Easter with Bishop Riegel presiding. Sunday services in March (8,15,22) will be led by Pastor Nelson Strobert. On March 29<sup>th</sup> the Mustard Seed will present a program during the sermon time with Pastor Matt, here with Thomas, presiding. Wednesday worship during lent (noon and vespers) will be either Pastor Matt via recording, or volunteers reading the message written by Pastor Matt. The theme for Wednesdays in lent is *Lent – A Journey from Creation to the Tomb*. Topics from week 1 thru 5 are the following: (1) Creation, (2) Flood, (3) Deliverance at the Red Sea, (4) Salvation Freely Offered to All, and (5) Deliverance from the Fiery Furnace. Lenten Visitation to shut-ins will be

by our Eucharistic ministers. Please let Pastor know if you would consider serving in this important role as St. John's has 24 shut-ins. Pastor Christine (Arden) and Pastor Karen (Shepherdstown) will both be on-call. Pastor will be able to attend the March 9th Council meeting; we can ask another ELCA pastor to attend or cancel a March meeting. To be determined. Pastor plans to return for Palm Sunday, Holy Week and Easter. Pastor presented two new templates for replacing the Celebrate insert. After discussion, Council approved the format we would like to use.

**Christmas Review:** Both services were very nice and well attended. The special music by the choir was indeed beautiful. In the future it is suggested not to light the candles too early. The luminaries were a nice addition and we thanked Bess for that.

The greeters, with name tags, and additional signage out and around the building were helpful as well. There is definitely a need for additional handicap spaces on Martin and Queen Streets. Council or Pastor will ask the city for additional marked spaces. Forty-six attended the Christmas Day service.

Congregations hit plateaus for a variety of reasons. Sometimes, there is a shift in demographics. Other times, congregations settle into routines and lose the spirit of God empowering new ventures of witnessing.

Many of us have realized the blessing of God's presence in our lives. Some are just beginning to discover the incredible gift of God's love made known in Jesus Christ. Yet, any of us can get lazy and complacent about being a witness to the good news found in Jesus Christ. We lose a sense of urgency. We put on blinders, settle into our pews, and wait to be served. It is our consumer mentality at work.

Jesus calls us to be the light of the world. We are to share the light of Jesus Christ with others, witnessing in our office places, neighborhoods, schools, homes, and daily lives. How do we let the light of Christ shine?

### Pray

Always begin with prayer. Prayers might include:

- Confession of failure to accomplish God's mission in the world
- Thanksgiving for God's direction within the congregation
- Requests for discemment and wisdom in decision-making.
- Intercessions for the leaders of your congregation

### Ask Questions

Start asking questions about your congregation's approach to mission and ministry.

How is your congregation engaging God's mission?
What might the next steps be?

Do you grieve for those who have not heard the Good News of Jesus?

If so, what might God be calling you to do to bear witness to that Good News?

### Listen for the Answers

We do not always like the answers me hear. Maybe your congregation is in need of major transformation. Perhaps your congregation needs to renew its commitment to God's mission in your local setting. Where is God calling you?

# Change the Climate

God may be calling for change in the climate of your congregation, empowering us to bold new ventures.

> How might your congregation become joy-filled, vibrant witnesses to lesus Christ?

How might God use you as a change agent in your congregation?

Who else is God calling to partner with you to bear witness to the love of Christ?



# CHURCH ATTENDANCE IS DOWN, BUT WHY?

Recent studies have confirmed what most of us have already figured out. People aren't going to church the way they used to. Attendance and involvement are down across every denomination and in every demographic. No age group, no ethnic group, no area of our country has been immune from this new reality. We've been following this trend long enough to know it's not a temporary slump, but a full-blown decline.

While there are some mitigating factors – more people are attending community churches with no affiliation and different understanding of membership – that make getting the exact numbers difficult, the primary reason is obvious.

Fewer people are going to church.

Yes, there are reasons. For one thing, streaming services have impacted church attendance. If the weather is bad (meaning it has rained, might rain or ... well, you get the picture), I'm sure to get several screen shots of people watching the services on line while wearing their pajamas. Not long after, a lot of these people will discover they can stream the service regardless of the weather.

Organizations that used to respect Sunday morning no longer do. Children have field trips and sporting events on Sunday morning most every weekend. Travel teams take up family weekends as the entire family follows the dreams of one of their children to play hockey, football, baseball, debate or gymnastics. Stores that used to be closed on Sunday start opening at 1pm. Now, they're open all day.

Entertainment has discovered Sunday morning. The NFL kicks off at noon, but if you're going to go the game, you have to go early for the tailgate. Concerts in the park, music festivals, food festivals, book festivals, and classic car rallies now consider Sunday morning to be prime time for their events.

I guess this is to be expected. Churches should not expect any

culture to support the practices of their faith. Yet, there's more.

For one thing, everyone is in a time crunch. Families are facing multiple demands from careers, schools and social obligations. The work/life balance has been compromised to the point many Americans can't tell you when their work day actually ends and their home life begins. Most people are working longer hours than before, and social media demands more and more of our attention. Because of these growing demands on our time, most of us aren't getting enough sleep.

When the weekend gets here, if we can catch up on some sleep we do.

All of this means when a person or family decides how they are going to spend their time, every investment of time has to be worth the time required. That is, more and more people are spending their time like they spend their money.

Every investment has to have a significant ROI – return on investment – or they won't do it.

This brings me to a very hard question for those of us in church leadership. Is going to church worth it?

Why would anyone go to church?

OK, I know the usual answers. The Bible says we should go. There's exciting worship and the sermon usually isn't too bad. We get to see our friends and work together to do some good in the world.

All of that is true, but I don't have to go to a church building for all of the above to happen. I can stream any number of worship services. I can hear sermons by some to of the best preachers in the world. My family and I can find any number of non-profits that need volunteers to make a difference in the world.

So, why should any of us go to church?

To find at least part of the answer, let's go back and find out why people went to find Jesus in the first place. Some went to find healing. Some to have demons driven out of them which, when you think about it, is just another form of healing.

Yet, when asked, Peter said he and the rest of the disciples wouldn't leave Jesus because they knew "Jesus alone had the words of

life." In other words, people sought Jesus because they found in Him what they couldn't find anywhere else.

We as church leaders seem to forget this. Jesus offers the world what they can't find anywhere else. Whenever we go to conferences on church growth, we're told about worship services and visual effects, dramatic preaching and comfortable pew cushions.

No one ever says, "What people need is Jesus. So, when people come to church make sure they get Jesus." I know, no one would ever come to a conference where the message is that blunt and basic. A message like that certainly won't drive conference ticket sales.

I know I may sound cynical, but I'm not. I'm just tired. In my ministerial career I've jumped through every church growth hoop I could find. I have worn myself out. I've worn out my people as well.

And you know what? We're no better off. Our marriages get divorced at the same rate as unbelievers. We become addicts at the same rate as unbelievers.

Why? Because we went to church and we were entertained and impressed, but we never met Jesus. Now, when the world comes to our churches, we don't have anything that matters because, well, we don't know Jesus either.

Perhaps instead of focusing on saving the world, the church should focus on finding its own salvation first. I'm convinced when we find Jesus again the community will find the church again.

# NEED IDEAS FOR A SPIRITUAL DISCIPLINE THIS LENT?

For many people, Lent is a time when we give things up, but there is so much more to Lent than just giving up cake or coffee. Instead of giving something up for Lent, try doing something instead:

Reading a book, waking up in the morning and praying, reading a chapter from the Bible a night; working at a soup kitchen; walking to work, walking once a night with your family, playing a game with your family once a week, turn off your phone one day a week and spend that time with your family, volunteer to help around church, volunteer to ride around with Pastor Matt as he goes and visits shut-ins, do some manual labor, or simply clean the the garage. These are a few ideas, but really all you need to do is look at your life and see the places that are lacking your presence. The possibilities are endless.

**Come to both the Maundy Thursday and Good Friday Services.** These are very important worship times in the church for we will hear how Jesus won our salvation. These services remind us of our salvation and the story we so love to tell. Without these two services, Easter makes no sense. So come and learn why we gather on Easter.

Give up a meal once a day and use the money for that meal to help the needy. This has been a tradition in the Roman Catholic Church for years. You simply skip a meal and place that money that you normally would have spent on that meal and give it to the poor. Put that money aside that you would have spent and donate it ELCA World Hunger or another cause close to your heart.

**Do not eat meat on Fridays or maybe Monday (meatless-Monday).** This has been a tradition in the Catholic Church for years, but it is another way you might find some spiritual growth. Sometimes, failing at this discipline teaches more than actually keeping the discipline. For in failing, you will see just how dependent we are on meat in our diet where many in the world are lucky to have meat once a month.

Come on Wednesday for food and prayer. This is not just self promotion. Come and fellowship with other Christians and deepen your faith. Martin Luther once said, "Anyone who is to find Christ must first find the church. How could anyone know where Christ is and what faith is in him unless he knew where his believers are?" So come find Christ and see Christ in the face of your brothers and sisters.

Turn off all notifications on your cell phone. Sounds simple right? These notifications help us stay connected but they can interrupt family time and sabbath time. Consider turning off your notifications this Lent and get to the emails and text messages later. Read the Entire New Testament. Martin Luther use to read the whole Bible once a year. Not to many of us have ever done this so start small. You can read the whole Bible in 40 days but if that seems to large, try the New Testament. Remember that the Bible is not just available in print but there are audio copies of this book available. There are even free versions available as a podcast. Just be careful with the translation. Instead of listening to the music or the news, use your commute time to read/listen the Bible.

**SPEND TIME WITH YOUR FAMILY.** I don't think I can stress this enough. Spending time with your family is so important these days. In the blink of an eye, tragedies can strike. Take as much time as you can to be the people you love and who love you the most.

The most important thing to remember this Lent with whatever discipline you might pick is to not be afraid to fail at it. Failure teaches us what we did wrong so that we can fix it for the future. Don't be afraid to fail but come and bring your failures to worship where they can be forgiven. And do tell others about what you are doing this Lent. Don't hide what you are doing. Telling others will help hold you accountable and will help you succeed.
