

The term "Lent" originally comes from the Anglo-Saxon word "lencten" which means "spring." This is the time, in the Northern Hemisphere, when the days are lengthening. The season began as period of fasting leading up to the Vigil of Easter. Catechumens, those preparing for baptism at Easter, would fast and spend days in intense preparation. For those that were already baptized, Lent was a period to be renewed in their faith by studying the Bible, the Creed and the Lord's Prayer.

Definition:

Lent is the forty-day season (excluding Sundays) of penitence and preparation for the Three Days of Holy Week and Easter.

A Few Notes on Current Practice

The appointed liturgical color for Lent is purple because purple has long been associated with royalty. In this case, Christ reigns from a cross.

Currently, the ancient understanding of Lent as both a time for baptismal preparation and baptismal renewal is being rediscovered in Lutheran rites and practice. Many congregations hold midweek services during Lent and a baptismal renewal theme is particularly appropriate for these.

Many congregations refrain from speaking or singing the word "alleluia" during Lent. "Burying" the alleluia occurs at the conclusion of worship on Transfiguration Sunday and it is restored at either the Vigil of Easter or Easter Sunday. A Lenten acclamation replaces the alleluia verse in preparation for hearing the Gospel (See ELW pg. 103 for one example).

- •There will be a simple meal held before Evening Prayer each Wednesday. The Evening Meal Coordinator will make sure there are people who sign up to bring food for dinner. **The coordinator will be Betty Lou Boyton.**

Pastor's Report: Pastors Matt and Diane express their thanks and gratitude for the generous gift cards they have received. "Your generosity is overwhelming and incredibly helpful!" Baby Day is due March 6th or so. Baptism will be celebrated on the first Sunday after Easter with Bishop Riegel presiding. Pastor Christine (Arden) and Pastor Karen (Shepherdstown) will both be on-call. Pastor Kreiensieck will be able to cover Winchester Hospital emergencies. Sunday services in March (8,15,22) will be led by Pastor Nelson Strobert. Bishop Riegel's Presentation: The Bishop presented Stewardship resources available to us on the ELCA website. Pastor Matt has forwarded all council members the website for reviewing these materials. Our mission/goal is to review some of the suggested actions/activities and focus on those initiatives that would best match the needs, talents, and goals to grow our church. Bishop stressed that every congregation is different and he cannot give us a template for action. He will be available for support as we move through the process. Linda Payne, Jane Kelley and Diane Shewbridge will form a committee to begin reviewing the online resources. All council members are encouraged to take a look at these various resources also and make a note of things that might work well for St. John's. This committee will meet late February/early March. Just a few suggested links/topics are: Longitudinal Stewardship Analysis, Intergenerational Stewardship activities, Cottage meetings, Stewards of God's Love.

Town Hall Meeting Review: The Town Hall/Souper Bowl event was well attended. Donations received were put into the fund for our youth to attend the 2021 Youth Gathering in Minneapolis. Topics raised included economic/finances, property updates and concerns (need to organize a Property Committee), visitation/ministry to shut-ins, backup support for our church secretary (Martha Seitler) and treasurer (Bess Day), activity director (unpaid position), cottage meetings, small interest groups, growing our membership, giving Pastor feedback on anything is much appreciated, ecumenical togetherness with other congregations, improving our media and messaging options. Welcome the Children "Let the little children come to me ..." Matthew 19:14

Steve, Maria, and their two young children were new to the area and were looking for a church to call "home." After checking the Yellow Pages, they decided to visit First Church, a long-standing congregation not far from where they lived. Upon their arrival, they noticed several things about the congregation:

- There were not many people their age or their children's ages
- There was a nursery, but parents had to remain there with their children during worship as the nursery was not staffed.
- During the Fellowship Hour after worship, there were no refreshment choices for their children. Hot tea and coffee were the only available beverage choices.
- Except for the nursery, there was no age-appropriate furniture anywhere in the building.
- There were no "kid-friendly" activities and/or resources during worship, e.g. children's sermon; children's choir; children's bulletins; or children's activity packs.

Without saying a word, it was obvious to visitors that children were not welcome here.

Questions to Ponder

- *I. What arrangements does your congregation make to "welcome the stranger"?*
- 2. What "unspoken messages" do those who visit your congregation "receive"?
- 3. How has your congregation addressed any of the issues noticed by Steve and Maria? What else might your congregation do to address these issues?

5 WAYS TO OBSESERVE LENT

Last Month, we published a comprehensive list of some different spiritual practices you can try Lent. However, those were just a few. Here is an article Patheos that might help spark those creative juices and hopefully inspire you to take on the blessings of Lent.

Many Christians observe the season of Lent with 40 days of a spiritual practice of their choosing. Lent is traditionally the fast of 40 days before Easter, beginning on Ash Wednesday, and it helps us clear out space in our lives for a deeper relationship with God. It's a small way we honor the suffering of Jesus in the last days of his life.

Throughout Christian history, Lent has been a time of taking responsibility for our failures and sin—penance—and dedicating ourselves to greater devotion through our giving of time and money, spending more time in spiritual activities, and abstaining from that which comes between us and God.

If you want to observe Lent this year, here are five ideas to consider:

1. **Fast.** The golden oldy of Christian spiritual practices. Catholics fast by not eating meat on Ash Wednesday or on Fridays during Lent. You could choose to skip one meal a day, a week or by eating only 3 meals a day (no in-between-meal snacks). You can fast from foods that you feel addicted to, with chocolate being top on the list for many of us. So, there are fasting options for all bodies and physical conditions. Some people fast from media, gossip, complaining or other habits that get in the way of their spiritual condition

 Move your Body. Most of us don't exercise enough, and while Lent is not about a body project, it is a good time to simply move around more. Prayer walks are especially helpful. They are exactly what they sound like. You pray and open yourself to God's presence as you walk.
 Appreciate nature. Most of us also don't spend as much time outside our four walls as we need to. Breathing fresh air and enjoying the elements (be they sunshine, clouds, rain or snow) bring us closer to God. Commit to feeling more grounded by letting your feet come into contact with actual *ground*!

4. Add a spiritual exercise to your daily

routine. I call this the Preferred-Protestant-Practice for Lent. While my Catholic friends are perfectly OK giving something up for Lent, my Protestant friends don't usually like that approach, so they add a practice. There's no reason you can't do both and I personally would like to see all Christians at least *try* giving up something that is not healthy for Lent! Adding a new spiritual practice to your life can be refreshing. If you have never tried centering prayer sitting in silent openness to God—Lent is a great season to pick this practice up. If you need new ideas for prayer, see my book **50 Ways to Pray**.

5. **Almsgiving**. This is the traditional Lenten practice of giving more of your income to alleviate poverty. Since a prime sin in our culture seems to be over consumption, giving wealth way is proper penance and it helps loosen the grip of materialism in our lives.

WE ARE BROKEN

In 1526 the reformers embarked on a program of visiting the parishes in Electoral Saxony. It's known as the Saxon Visitation. As would later be stated in the Augsburg Confession, its objective was to determine if "the gospel is taught purely and the sacraments are administered rightly."

Martin Luther himself visited the parishes in and around Wittenberg. He wasn't pleased. He found that many clergy didn't receive adequate compensation, and that the gospel was not clearly taught or understood.

Luther, In his inimitable subtle style, wrote: "Dear God, what misery I beheld! The ordinary person, especially in the villages, knows absolutely nothing about the Christian faith, and unfortunately many pastors are completely unskilled and incompetent teachers. Yet supposedly they all bear the name Christian, are baptized, and receive the holy sacrament, even though they do not know the Lord's Prayer, the Creed, or the Ten Commandments! As a result, they live like simple cattle or irrational pigs and, despite the fact that the gospel has returned, have mastered the fine art of misusing all their freedom." Yikes!

Luther's experience led to the publication of his Small Catechism, a "Handbook for Ordinary Pastors and Preachers." In clear and concise language, he explained the basics of the Christian faith so that all people, not just educated professionals, could understand the great gift of the gospel and live it in daily life.

Theologian Timothy Wengert points out that Luther rearranged the typical order of medieval catechisms to make clear the evangelical understanding that the good news means law and gospel, judgment and promise. Luther "insisted on moving from law (Ten Commandments) to gospel (Creed and Lord's Prayer)."

This uniquely Lutheran understanding of the gospel is an important contribution to the Christian movement. It calls out the reality of the

human condition, that we are broken and have broken creation, that we are captive to sin and cannot free ourselves, that we need a just and loving God who has no illusions about human nature and, at the same time, has infinite love that claims us and sets us free.

This is true evangelicalism that rejects what I call the "Billy Joel gospel" that declares: "I like you just the way you are." God's love is unconditional, but God does not like us just the way we are—that's why we have Jesus.

I am concerned that our branch of the Lutheran movement can become watered down to the point of Christian Moralistic Therapeutic Deism—a concept developed by Christian Smith and Melinda Lundquist Denton in their 2005 study of common beliefs of American youth. To paraphrase very roughly the results of their study: God exists, God wants people to be good, nice, and fair to each other, the central goal in life is to be happy and feel good about oneself, God does not need to be particularly in one's life except when God is needed to solve a problem, and good people go to heaven when they die.

In this philosophy, there is no awe in the presence of the Transcendent, no turning outward from self, no horror of the reality and the effects of sin—and not in the narrow sense of individual moral failings—no wonder at the intimate love of God shown in the incarnation and the crucifixion, no deep gratitude for the liberation of the resurrection.

In 2017, I called this church to study Luther's Small Catechism. I think we did for a while. I ask that we all study it again, use it in Bible study and preaching, refer to it when navigating the demands of daily life, incorporate it in our work of justice and advocacy, use it in honest self-examination, and trust its witness to the gospel when we receive the Lord's consolation. Luther said he needed to study it every day—and he wrote it! Let's us do the same.



My brothers and sisters in Christ,

The season of Lent is a multi-dimensional season in that it is shaped by the preaching of our Lord's passion, penitential reflection, and catechetical formation. These three areas, drive us to humble

repentance. Our hymnody also serves as a helpful aid in bringing about such repentance. One hymn that guides us in repentance through the Lenten Season is, "O Lord, Throughout These Forty Days."

This particular hymn is a type of prayer. It is based upon Jesus' successful battle with Satan and temptation in the wilderness. Since our Lord fought temptation and was successful, we pray in the first stanza that our Lord would inspire repentance within us as we battle with daily temptations. He who overcame Satan in the wilderness also claimed victory over the arch-enemy of God through his death on the cross and rising from the dead. He has freed us from our past and has the power to do so daily as we return to the promise of his forgiveness of sins granted to us in our baptisms.

In the second stanza of the hymn we pray for the courage, skill, and trust of Christ in God's eternal Word. We pray that he who overcame Satan and temptation with the written Word of God would grant us the strength to do the same, even as we gather together to hear, study, learn, and inwardly digest his Word.

In the third stanza we pray for God to bring about godly contentment in his Word and Will. We pray that God would help us seek not our own will and desires first and foremost, but that we would trust firmly in him to meet our needs and be satisfied with his provision for our bodies and our souls.

Finally, in the fourth stanza we pray that God would continue to be with us, even as he has promised to be with us and to never leave or forsake us. We pray that he would guide us through our Lenten pilgrimage and our season of preaching on our Lord's passion, penitential reflection, and catechetical formation. We pray that he would guide us and be with us through all our days, just as sure as he has freed us from our past. We pray that he do this so that when the final Easter dawns and our Lord returns, we join in heaven's praise. As we embark upon these 40 days, I ask that you take advantage of this season of Lent. Even though I will miss being with you for most of Lent this year because of the birth of our new child, this does not mean you should miss it too. Things will still happen on Wednesdays both during the day and at night. The word of God will still be proclaimed on Sunday mornings. St. John's is bigger than myself and it is times like this that stand as a good reminder to all of us that the future of St. John's is not myself, but Jesus Christ.

At the end of the month, we will welcome the students, parents, and teachers of the Mustard Seed to join us for worship. The children want to share some of what they have learned, Mrs. Christy will share some of the amazing things happening with the school, and also share some future plans. The Mustard Seed has come a long way in the past four years. It is time we celebrate the great work they are doing along side of us. Betty Lou and the Social Ministry team are planning some refreshments for after worship. I hope to see you all there this Sunday. Come and meet the families and make sure they feel welcome in our holy space. Diane and I are hoping to bring our new addition to worship this day!

I will miss you all over the next few weeks. Please, as always, keep my little family in your prayers as we welcome and re-adjust our lives to our new little addition. I will see you all at the end of the month if not before!
