St. John's Council Meeting via Phone Conference at 7pm on May 4, 2020

Member Present on Conference Call Roll Call: Pastor Matt, Jerry Crites, Brenda Morrison, Anne Moore, Michael Gottlieb, Drew Catrow, Shane Wagoner, Linda Payne, Rick Losh, Diane Shewbridge, Bess Day, Michael Noll Members Absent: Jane Kelley, Trey Voorhees

Pastor Matt opened the meeting with devotions.

Pastor's report on the Synod Conference call on "how to safely open churches" for worship.

- •Wait until we (Berkeley, Jefferson Counties) are not designated as a "hot spot" in WV
- •We are not required to open until we are ready and able to do so
- •The 3% rate should not be based on state statistics but rather our panhandle rate, currently higher than the state averaged rate
- •Financial considerations realizing that the budget may limit how we proceed
- •Insurance policy for our church: insurance is not going to cover anything that occurs if attendance is above 5 persons as dictated by Governor Justice
- •Pastor and the Council each have responsibilities and roles and should work hand-in-hand as we plan for reopening our church. Should disagreements that cannot be resolved, Bishop Riegel will work with us to resolve the issue/s in disagreement

Recommendations from Pastor Matt:

- I. It would be best to take the state's advice and say 3% for 3 consecutive days before we consider reopening for in-person worship.
- 2. It is important that we listen to data and not desire.
- 3. It might be good to have worship in the parking lot via people cars using a low power fm transmitter, PA system or simply a bullhorn. FYI, having people leave their cars ups the risk of social distancing not being followed. There are also weather considerations for doing Parking Lot worship. Also, we have limited space in our parking lot. We might need to have people park on the street and park in a way that requires people backing into the lot and blocking people into spots to maximize space.
- 4. All decisions should be made in consultation with each other. While we have never had these issues before, in this time, we could clash. Bishop Riegel has made himself available if conflicts arise.
- 5. We make available three service times and one of those services would be for 65 or older. Only have 25 people in Luther Hall. For overflow, we would livestream the worship to Luther Hall. We will need to appoint a leader usher for Luther Hall to ensure proper social distancing is followed, livestream is started, and the people's needs are met. No overflow in the chapel. No nursery care and we should close the nursery off to use. Further consideration/Recommendation: If multiple worship services are unfeasible,

we might want to consider worship services during the week.

- 6. Corporate, in-person worship cannot resume until our plan for reopening has been put into full effect.
- 7. The synod will be holding a conference call around reopening the church for a Max of 2 people from each congregation. I suggest we appoint two people to attend. They will be putting out a video of the call that others can watch later.

Discussion via conference call:

- •Live stream of services will continue after we reopen the church on any level.
- •Perhaps the train station parking lot could be used on Sunday morning as there is more room for distance spacing of vehicles. A low power fm unit would need to be purchased as a bull horn is not practical as there are residences near the train station. Might also be a conflict of church vs state if complaints of this activity were reported. Bess offered to purchase the low power fm transmitter unit and donate it for whatever use may be identified in the future.
- •Once able to return to the church for services, should several services be offered, i.e., one for members age 65 and older, maybe one service during the week, etc. Average attendance prior to Covid19 was 88. When Berkeley County is removed from the hot spot status, our attendance would be 25 per space. Should we request or require reservations to attend service or services, alternate Sundays that congregants would attend, use Luther Hall and or the Chapel as overflow areas? To be determined as a reopening date is closer on the horizon. There are several considerations that make it impossible to open up for services. Which area allows for the safest space to open first? Cushions in the church would have to be removed. Entrance would need to be via the W. Martin St./elevator entrance. Ushers would instruct congregants where to sit and have a 6' measure to ensure distancing and mark which pews should be left empty. (only family units who live together may sit with one another). Linda Payne and Pastor Matt will arrange for training the ushers on the proper procedures. Best seating would be to fill available space from the front of the church to the back, and be dismissed from back to front to limit the possibility of transferring germs as people pass by others as they leave in the aisles. Keep all restrooms closed, open only one, or open both? Requires folks to go into the Chapel.
- •Would it be better to open Luther Hall for services first? Hard surfaces are easier to clean, one entrance, via the parking lot which is handicap accessible, one bathroom, in the hallway next to the lounge, would be unisex with wipes and disinfectant spray to be used before/after each use. All other areas off-limits. Ushers still dictate seating.

In either area, the following would have to be observed

- •Consider limiting the service to 30 minutes as the procedures for opening and closing will take some extra time.
- •The offering plates will be placed at the back of the church and not passed during the service.
- •Posters outlining the procedures for social distancing will be hung throughout. Pastor Matt will take on developing and sourcing.
- •6 foot distancing as people line up to enter the building.
- •Face masks would be required to be worn at all times with no exceptions St. John's will buy and/or make face masks, 100% cotton, which will be collected and laundered. (Jerry Crites volunteered to do the laundering) Kathy Chapman will be contacted to send email request for mask-makers. Drew Catrow will coordinate with volunteer mask makers. We will need 50 to get started.
- •Temperatures taken via infrared thermometer. Anyone with a fever of 100.4 or more will be asked to return home along with family members. A roll call vote was taken with one "no" vote and the rest "yes" for taking temperature before people are admitted into the church.
- •Ushers would record the names of anyone entering for # attending and for contact tracing if necessary.
- •Limit paper transfer wherever possible. Disposable bulletins, limited singing (if only 1 service per week would hymnals be safe to reuse without cleaning?)
- •Readings could be done with readers staying at their seat. If a microphone is used it will need to be sanitized before being used by someone else. All greetings, i.e., hand shaking, elbow or fist bumping, or any other physical contact will not be permitted in order to keep the social distancing of 6 feet.
- •Communion could be most safely administered as 'one kind' (wafer only); exact distribution procedure to be determined later. See further explanation on the distribution of Communion below.
- •Hand sanitizer will be available for worship and all are encouraged to bring their own to use during the service.
- •A two-month supply of cleaning supplies will need to be on hand before opening church or Mustard Seed and backfilled ongoing. Bess has 7 vendors we have dealt with and an additional vendor to place orders with. Germ killing hand sanitizer, wipes, spray, cleaning supplies, etc. Cleaning all used areas after services.
- •Everyone would be expected to clean their pew or chair as they prepare to leave the service.
- •There will be no nursery until further notice.
- •Aaron, sexton, will need to put in extra hours to properly clean after worship and Mustard Seed.

Communion Handling and Distribution:

•The set up and care of the vessels will be handled by the pastor. Altar guild

will still handle changing and care of paraments and communion linens.

- •We will have hand sanitizers and wipes close to the communion distribution area for the pastor to use.
- •Communion wafers will be used.
- •Communion will be distributed under one kind. During distribution, people will hear both words said.
- •The host will be distributed by the pastor. The pastor will be wearing gloves and a mask. Congregants will be asked to hold your hands up so that I can drop the wafer into a congregant's hand. If that is not possible, we can have small cups available so that these persons can just hold the cup out.
- •Congregants will remain in their pews and the pastor will come to them.
- •Theologically speaking, distribution under one kind is valid. The proclamation, "The blood of Christ, shed for you" will still be said. After this pandemic is over, we will return to past communion practices.
- •For those who cannot come to worship because they are in the <u>vulnerable</u> <u>population</u>, Pastor Matt will take communion to their home and distribute the elements to them using the rite typically used for those are informed or shut-in. Distribution will take place on the front porch. Persons wishing to receive communion in this way must sign up with Pastor Matt ahead of time. Essential Services to resume when safely possible, abiding by distancing, crowd size, masks, etc. include: Funerals, weddings, baptisms, Friends Feeding Friends.
- •Pastor will meet with Wagoners to discuss Vacation Bible School.
- •Mustard Seed reopening will not be before June 1st and only when all safety precautions are in place. Only those associated with the Mustard Seed will be allowed into Luther Hall during school hours.
- •All group activities, i.e., Sierra Club, showers, birthday parties, etc. are cancelled. Anyone with an event already approved will be notified and no new bookings will be taken.

Considerations as we move forward:

- •No one is permitted to enter Luther Hall without permission and by appointment. This is to prevent contamination and keep a safe work space for Martha, Pastor, Rick, Sharon and Bess, etc. The cloth coverings have been removed from the table in the lounge to facilitate counting the offering. No one should enter the office until Martha has left for the day.
- •A call list would be useful for contacting church members for welfare checks, updates on church activities, etc.
- •No choir rehearsals for now. May reconvene in the Fall depending on the status of the virus in our area.
- •The pipes will need to be flushed due to limited use. HVAC is under a service contract and will be serviced and will fulfill CDC recommendations.

- •We need a plan for the next outbreak occurs; what can we do to be prepared should the virus break out again?
- •Brenda Morrison has been keeping track of the confirmed Covid-19 cases in Berkeley County, Jefferson County, and surrounding counties in Maryland and Virginia. Because Berkeley and Jefferson Counties are state 'hot spots' the state statistics do not reflect the local statistics which are more problematic than the state statistics.
- •We will stay out of church until our supplies are stocked, ushers and assistants with services are trained in the procedures we will adopt, and when our local statistics indicate that with all safety precautions in place and 25 people are permitted to gather as per state regulations.
- •Brenda Morrison and Jerry Crites, representing St. John's, will join in the upcoming Synod conference call regarding the virus and reopening of our churches. A video of the conference call will be made available for viewing at a later date.

A note regarding property concerns: There is a problem with the roof or spouting over Luther Hall that needs to be investigated to determine the source of some water leaking in. One estimate has been received for completing the work on the steeple (\$171,000) and other estimate/s are pending. Several members were remembered for continuing to work on projects during the time the church has been closed.

The next meeting of council will be June 8th unless a need to meet comes up before then. Meeting will be by phone conference unless conditions at that time permit a face-to-face meeting abiding by social distancing guidelines.

With no further business at this time, a motion to adjourn was made by Pastor Matt and seconded by Linda Payne. All voted to adjourn.

The BackPack Program was piloted in 1995 after a Arkansas school nurse noticed students coming back from weekends and school vacations with symptoms of hunger. Working with the local food bank, the nurse was able to provide school children with groceries in nondescript backpacks to carry home. As an official program of the National Council of Feeding America, the BackPack program was brought to Berkeley County by a team of local parents in 2010. Through countless volunteer hours and generous donations from our sponsors and people like you, our mission of discreetly providing food to hungry Berkeley County students is becoming a reality.

Kidz Power Pacs is currently feeding 1025+ children and estimating more this school year! Many more children are being added as the teachers continue to identify. We currently are serving 42 schools in two counties. Packing's are held monthly at Eagle School Intermediate. We unload the trucks on Friday night starting at 4:30 pm. We always pack on a Saturday so families can serve together. So bring the children!! We start at 9:00 am with fellowship, demonstration/sharing from other outreaches and prayer over the children, families, our counties, our country and any prayer request. Packing starts at 10:00 am. What are Summer Camps doing this summer?

As of right now, they are waiting to see what the CDC says in order to hold camp safely. Camp Luther will not be holding summer camp this summer. While it is sad (especially for the Seniors who are missing out on another activity). Caroline Furnace is working out ways to do summer camp both online and inperson.

How is Caroline Furnace being affected by COVID-19?



My brothers and sisters in Christ,

We all thought this would be over by now. Clearly, the none of us could have imagined the impact that Covid-19 would have on our society and our world. The sad fact and reality is that this pandemic is not

going anywhere anytime soon. Economists are worried that another great depression is on the horizon. Businesses are weighing the risks of reopening. Churches are trying to figure out if all the restrictions are worth it in order to gather physically. Many have lost jobs. Graduating Seniors have missed out on the end of year activities and graduation. Many of these same seniors do not know what the fall holds for them. There is a great deal of uncertainty in the world right now.

Yet, we know that our Lord has not abandoned us. In Matthew 28, Jesus tells the disciples, "I am with you always, to the end of the age." Depending on where you are at, it might feel like the end of the age is much closer than ever before. You might be reading this with a great amount of worry in your heart. I worry about getting my boys sick.

At the same time, I see so much anger in the world right now. I hear so much about people refusing to wear masks. I have also read about some people spitting and coughing on store employees when asked to put on their masks.

My brothers and sisters, the way we deal with fear and anxiety is not by showing anger, but by showing love. Every time I go to the store, I thank my clerk for being there and I say, "Stay healthy." Many of these workers have not had a break in two months. They are tired, stressed, and many are severely underpaid. They deserve our love and respect, not our anger. I implore you to show love to all you meet. Jesus said, turn the other cheek. So, turn the other cheek this day. Show love and please, wear a mask. One thing scientists are learning is that so many who have Covid-19 are asymptomatic (meaning they have no symptoms and are just a carrier). Until a vaccine is developed, wearing a mask is the only way to keep others who are not asymptomatic from developing the virus. The more we can do to stop the spread of this virus, the less ill-effect the virus will have on our future. So I implore you, through the fourth

commandment, to listen to the officials and heed their advice.

I remember after 9/11, our country banded together and were unified for the first time in a long time. This is our time to once again, be unified. We can do this. I know we can. I have seen it. This virus will go away and how will we look at the end of all of this? Let our legacy be defined and rooted in love.

On May 31, we remembered all those seniors who did not have the same opportunity that most of have us had to celebrate such major accomplishments in our education. Diane and I were talking about how devastating this has to be for our seniors and yet, I hear so many stories of them taking it in stride. Nonetheless, this is a painful thing and we should not make light of it. It is why we decided to set time in our worship to remember them and pray for them. So, congratulations on all that you have done. The world needs you right now! I know you won't let us down!!!

Some updates from our congregation:

- •Council meets on June 8th to review all the data and make a decision when to reopen and what that will look like. As of right now, I am assuming that no changes will take place but that could change. We will let you know. We will be mailing out worship materials that you can use at home. If you did not receive a copy and wish to receive a packet, let me know.
- •Regardless of what happens, online and over the phone worship will continue for those who do not feel safe attending worship.
- •VBS is going to happen, but online this year. See page 17 for more information. Please register by June 6th so that we can mail all your VBS gear to your family by July 5th.
- •The Mustard Seed has applied for a Crisis License and hopes to be open sometime in June. The board is weighing all the risks and is working on making sure that when the school opens, it will be as safe as possible.
- •The council also okay my request to work from home for the foreseeable future. If you wish to call me, you can call (304) 370-3349. I love to chat on the phone and to hear your voice. I have been working my way through the directory. It has been a much slower process because I usually end up having some great conversations.

Continue to pray for an end to this virus. Make this a petition each time you pray. Our duty as Christians is to prayer and may we never forget that all prayers are heard and answered by God.
