Even with the return to in-person worship to resume July 26, we will continue to livestream our worship via Facebook and over the phone. We recently upgraded to a new platform for both nonfacebook and phone uses that will hopefully be more reliable, but it does mean a new phone number that you will have to use on Sunday. On June 30, the council voted to begin in-person worship starting July 26 outside in our parking lot.

This decision is contingent on the number of Covid cases in our area.

If you do not feel comfortable gathering for worship, you can still gather with us online or on the phone.

A plan to reopen and return safely

Reopening

- It is important that we listen to data and not desire.
- All none essential activities are canceled until further notice. Essential activities of the church include:
 - Worship
 - Funerals
 - Weddings
 - · Baptisms
 - Friends Feeding Friends and other feeding ministries
- We will continue to livestream and use the conference call system until the pandemic is over. This includes Weddings, Funerals, and Baptisms.

What will in-person worship and church life look like once we reopen?

- I. If you are sick, you need to stay home. If you show symptoms when you attend worship, you will be asked to leave.
- Everyone attending worship on a particular Sunday will need to sign in. Ushers will be writing your name down so that, in the event of someone contracting the virus, we can assist in contract tracing.
- Social distancing must be kept. Council members will be on hand to enforce social distancing among members attending inperson worship. No Coffee Hour. No physical contact of any kind including hugging, fist bumps, hand shakes or elbow taps.
- 4. We will need to sit at least 6 feet away from each family attending worship. Ushers will seat people in order to maintain distance and will then help with dismissing people at the end of worship.
- Masks need to be worn outside during worship, even outside. We will have extra masks on hand for people who forget their masks and for visitors who did not bring one.

- 6. An usher will seat you when you come to worship. Please bring a chair with you from home. We will have chairs on hand if you forget to bring one.
- 7. We will offer hand sanitizer for people to use while in worship. People are encouraged to bring their own and use it.
- 8. Lysol wipes will be placed outside of the bathrooms so that people can use them to wipe down surfaces before and after use. Bathrooms will be opened in Luther Hall. We ask that you limit trips inside to use the restroom.
- Posters will be posted around the church/parking lot reminding people of proper social distancing.
- 10. There will be no acolytes during this time. Pastor Matt will take care of the reading the lessons or will prerecord the lessons.
- 11. The offering plate will be placed in the back of the church/ parking lot and not passed. An usher will be in charge of making sure the box is protected.
- 12. The church nursery is closed until further notice.
- 13. Communion will distributed under one kind. The host will be distributed by the pastor. The pastor will be wearing gloves and a mask. Please put your mask on before receiving the host. Congregants will be asked to hold your hands up so that I can drop the wafer into a congregants hand. If that is not possible, we can have have small cups available so that these persons can just hold the cup out.
- 14. For those who cannot come to worship because they are in the <u>vulnerable population</u>, Pastor Matt will take communion to their home and distribute the elements to them using the rite typically used for those are informed or shut-in. Distribution will take place on the front porch. Persons wishing to receive communion will need to contact Pastor Matt and schedule a time for him to come to your home.
- 15. After each worship, the chairs used will need to be wiped down and cleaned.
- 16. No outside groups will be allowed to use our facilities with the exception of feeding ministries that take place outside.
- 17. In-person Choir rehearsal will be canceled until further notice.

St. John's Council Meeting via Phone Conference at 7pm on June 8, 2020

Jerry opened the meeting with prayer.

Bishop Reigel addressed Council to ask for a confirmation that Council approved of the appointment of pastor Matt as Dean in the WV-WMD Conference. Deans are recommended by pastors in the conference and serve at the will and pleasure of the bishop to assist the bishop in providing pastoral are to pastors and congregations. It is an unpaid appointment with a recommended minimum of one day per month devoted to assignments from the bishop. The appointment undergoes an annual review. Pastor was asked by council to confirm his willingness to undertake this appointment, which pastor answered affirmatively. Pastor expressed his belief that it is an important mission and his appointment was supported by fellow pastors. It is not a lifetime appointment and can be terminated if circumstances arise that would warrant termination for any reason. As there were no objections from council, Pastor Matt was appointed Dean by general consent. (MSP: Mike Noll; Linda Pavne) **Minutes:** May 4, 2020 Minutes were approved by general consent. (MSP: Jerry Crites; Anne Moore)

Treasurer's Report: Bess will email the financials when ready as not all information was complete in time for the meeting.

Pastor's Report: Pastor has devoted considerable time to making phone calls to church members to see how our people are doing during this trying time of the pandemic. The evening prayer services will continue virtually through June and then probably end. Our conference calls are costing \$30. Pastor suggested using Zoom for future virtual meetings at a cost of \$15 per month. Approved by general consent. (MSP: Mike Noll; Drew Catrow)

Rev. Rachel Crumley, Pastor of Tuscarora Presbyterian Church is exploring an alternative worship experience via a 'coffee shop' to include music and bible study much like Pastor Matt's Table Talks at the Daily Grind but with more discipleship. Council expressed an interest in learning more from Pastor Crumley and will invite her to speak with us to see if St. John's would like to participate in an alternative coffee shop worship experience. Pastor will be taking some time off to decompress (June 15-20) and asks that we hold off on contacting him until after June 21st. Pastor will be away from August 6-14 and might need a supply

pastor. Pastor Matt expressed his appreciation for all the support he has gotten during this stressful time. Pastor was happy to have the Mustard Seed back as parents have been pushing him to get the Mustard Seed back in operation. The director, Christie, expressed on Facebook much thanks to all who made their reopening possible and a successful first day back. Of course all covid-19 precautions and procedures were in place and will continue to be adhered to.

Unfinished Business: Church will not reopen in the month of June. Jerry will appoint a committee to work on a safe reopening. Discussion ensued with concerns that other churches are opening and maybe we should work to reopen soon. Other concerns were the uptick in virus cases among congregations that have reopened already. Outdoor services are safer than indoor and would it be possible to meet at War Memorial Park, Poor House Farm or other outdoor venue? There was a general consensus to remain closed for services through June and continue live streaming the services. Our security contract expired at the end of May. Drew got one quote from Security Electronics. Mike asked Drew to send him the quote/criteria and Mike would get other quote/s. Due to the pandemic Rick has not followed through with improved lighting on our parking lot, especially in the back corner where it is very dark but he will pick this up and contact Potomac Edison about our options.

New Business: Church picnic would normally be scheduled for September 13th (first Sunday after Labor Day). Martha will reserve Poor House Farm Park for that day and we will cancel if we have to. Jerry appointed Pastor Matt and Brenda Morrison along with himself to comprise the committee to reopen the church. Our next council meeting will be July 13th at 7pm. There is a possibility that this meeting will be in Luther Hall observing Covid-19 protocol. (To Be Determined.) A question arose regarding payment to Aaron, our sexton, for stripping and waxing the floors in Luther Hall. Before the pandemic the work was going to be undertaken by Aaron and his father outside of Aaron's regular work schedule for St. John's and a proposal was to be submitted. A proposal was not submitted and the work was actually done during the pandemic/shut down of the church during which time Aaron was paid his regular church salary based on hours worked and his father was paid \$800 for his work. During the hours devoted to the floor project, Aaron was not working on regular church duties as there was no activity requiring Aaron's time otherwise. By role call a motion passed to pay Aaron \$100 additional for a job well done. (MSP: Anne Moore; Linda Payne).

Committee Reports:

Christian Ed: No report but Pastor will touch base with Shane. A virtual VBS is planned.

Social Ministry: Friends Feeding Friends continues as a 'grab and go' bag lunch distributed in our parking lot. The Backpack block party will be possible due to the virus; however, plans are to fill backpacks and deliver them to four elementary schools in town – Burke Street, Winchester Ave, Berkeley Heights and Rosemont.

Evangelism: No report

Music and Worship: We are still worshiping and there is still music!

LYFE: No report

Property/Tech: Bid for steeple completion from J.P. Smith was \$171,000. Doug Widmeyer is soliciting other bid/s, including a bid from the contractors working on the Gateway Hotel project. The water problem in Luther Hall (ceiling issue) is most likely problems with the whole downspout system. Needs to be fixed. Smoke detectors need to be changed/checked/replaced. Mike Noll will get someone to climb up under the beams and take care of this.

Mutual Ministry: No Report Stewardship: No Report

Mustard Seed: The Mustard Seed Board had a policy review in view of the recent shooting incident in our parking lot during a protest gathering. The policy regarding the procedures when there is an incident has been updated following much work that went into this.

Motion to adjourn: By general consent the meeting was adjourned. There will be another meeting on June 30th at 8pm.

And although we are unable to open for Summer Camp this year, we continue to prepare for WHEN we are able to resume Summer Camp. Our hope rests in the power of the overnight Summer Camp experience, and we look forward to sharing this experience with you again soon.

We want to thank you for your patience and grace as we continue to adapt to this ever-changing situation in the COVID-19 pandemic. We have learned so much in the past three months and expect to see more developments in the coming weeks. 



My brothers and sisters in Christ, Joseph Robinson wrote a hymn title, "Tis good, Lord, to be here." The first verse reads:

How good, Lord, to be here! Your glory fills the night; your face and garments, like the sun, shine with unborrowed light.

The hymn itself is about the Transfiguration or our Lord. The Feast of the Transfiguration was actually the last time I was with you all in person for worship before Isaiah was born and our eventual exile from in-person worship. The hymn speaks about Peter, James, and John wishing that they could stay on the mountaintop with the transfigured Jesus. Robinson even writes one of the verses to say "we long to hold the vision bright and make this hill our home." I think back to this Sunday in February and long for the days of "normalcy." I just want to go to my office and visit the people who I have been called to serve. I just want preach from the pulpit at St. John's to a room full of people I love. I just want to stand behind the altar and proclaim the gospel through the sacrament. I just want to baptize my son in the font surrounded by both my family and my church family.

How good it would be for things to be just like the way they use to be where it felt as though Christ's glory filled the our sanctuary, his face shined with the brightness of the sun, and everything felt good. However, Robinson goes on to write in the last stanza:

How good, Lord, to be here! Yet we may not remain; but since you bid us leave the mount, come with us to the plain.

Christ called us to leave the mountain with him three months ago and what an exit it was! We left the mountain and have been down in the valley for sometime. For some, this valley has been the wilderness. Some of us want to go back to the mountain. Some of us are too scared to leave their homes even to attempt the return trip. The good news though—Christ is with us wherever we shall go.

I am very excited about our future. I know God is going to do amazing things. Friends Feeding Friends will continue to done on the fourth Saturday of the month. VBS might be virtual, but it is still going to be VBS and God will sanctify our work and make what we do holy and good for our children. We are still going to make sure kids in our communities have all the school supplies they need to start the school year. Even though we might be losing Christy Costello as our director

of the Mustard Seed and a longtime employee, I know God will see this ministry through and be with us during our time of discernment.

Over the coming months, we are going to have to grapple with doing church as safely as possible. Right now, the council has decided that with the proper safety measures in place, we can hold worship safely outside starting July 26 barring any major changes from the CDC, the governor's office, or local health officials. However, we know that with all the safety measures in place, we cannot provide a fully-safe worship environment. With that said, we will continue to stream our worship over facebook and the phone. **Both forms are valid and holy.** No one should feel shame for choosing to stay home during this time. This virus is terrifying. If you choose to stay home during this time, you can still worship. We have proven that the communion of saints is not limited to the gathering of people on Sunday mornings in our buildings. When this virus passes, and it will pass in time, we will all gather back together. Until then, do what is best for you and your family.

I am worried about the future of worship and church. I am worried that people will not come back. I am worried that our church might not ever look the same as it once did. However, Jesus tells us that not even the gates of Hades will prevail against us. If we truly believe these words from Jesus, then we must trust that God will see us through this time.

I believe that this time in exile has forced us to examine what really matters to our ministry. Right now, we are doing what is necessary and concentrating all our energy on making sure that those things which are vital the our mission and ministry happen and those things that are not vital, have been put on hold. I hope we continue to examine what is vital and necessary to our mission and ministry; that we do those things which are vital and leave behind the things that are not.

COVID might have caused us to stay home, but our work and ministry in downtown Martinsburg continues. THANK YOU for coming along for the ride! And thank you for all your prayers and support. Your generosity has made the work we do as a congregation possible!
