St. John's Council Meeting via Zoom at 7pm on September 14, 2020

President Jerry Crites opened the meeting and Pastor Matt had the meditation. A vocal roll call of members present was taken.

Minutes of the August 17, 2020 meeting were approved by acclamation. (M/S/P: Drew Catrow; Linda Payne)

Pastor's Report: Confirmation classes will meet virtually twice a month for 90 minutes. One of these will be the large group and once will be each congregational group separately. St. John has four confirmands. The curriculum for the large group will be "Collaborate: Lutheran Confirmation - Lutheran Living". Each congregational session will focus on what it means to be a member of a church (i.e. St. John's). Each confirmand will have a mentor from the church Pastor continues on the settlement of Elaine Bennett's estate. The backpack program was a huge success with kudos to Betty Lou for pulling the project together. The Evangelism committee met in August. They are looking into moving to a less expensive platform for our website and will meet again in September to look at ways to connect with our member and our community at large. Pastor is planning a few days in October to concentrate on reading and study. He will be leading a synod wide virtual Con-Ed course the week of September 21st. Pastor would appreciate the congregation observing Fridays as his day off each week except in emergencies. Bishop Riegel has information regarding congregational meetings, emails and creating budgets for 2021 that council will looking at.

Heather Watkins, choir director, presented some ideas for music during the pandemic. Choir practice and singing in services with specially designed masks for singing, social distancing, etc.; starting a handbell choir or chimes choir were also suggested as food for thought. St. John's would have to purchase handbells or chimes unless we could borrow them from a church that wasn't using them. She also would like to recruit volunteers for vocal or instrumental solos. Another idea would be to provide music, etc., on an AV screen so paper music wouldn't be needed during the service. Council thanked Heather for her research and ideas and these will be explored.

Unfinished Business: Discussion on continuing church services safely both indoor and outdoors. Outdoors is working until the weather turns too cold, probably in October. Parking lot services could continue with broadcasting in low frequency transmitter to our cars in/around the parking lot. Moving indoors presents many hurdles. Dr. Fauci recommends that to return indoor worship under the safest conditions requires three things: run the heat, have windows open and humidify the air. We will ask M.S. Johnson (our HVAC contractor) to evaluate our system and request that the National Guard evaluate both the church and Luther Hall for feasibility of indoor worship. Luther Hall has the advantage of a more modern ventilation system and windows that open. While the cost of 'foggers' to treat indoor spaces is coming down, the solutions are still quite expensive and have purportedly caused damage to organ pipes, leather and maybe other items used in and around the church. Rick Losh met with Potomac Edison representative to evaluate placing a light in the parking lot for safety and security lighting. There is a power pole there, and if the tree that has grown around the pole could be removed, a light can be installed. If not, a new pole would be needed to be installed. Rick took care of the tree, thank you! Now we can proceed with having the light installed. Michael Noll gave a progress report on the security and networking issues. He received 2 bids for the security system. (1) A complete replacement for \$1,200.00 from one vendor, Security Electronics. (2) RCS looked at the system and indicated that it did not require replacement at this time and they would test and inspect the system and connect the panel to a new monitoring service with labor costs at \$85.00 per hour plus the costs of any parts. Monitoring would be \$30.00 per month using Cellular Communication. An additional bid was suggested and will be requested from a friend of Jerry Olsen who has a security company. Michael and Jerry will make contact and ask for a bid. Regarding the Wired and Wireless Network that supports the church and the Mustard Seed.

• The current wireless system is not stable and able to meet the needs of the Mustard Seed and the Church. With the addition of the new Air Conditioners Units in Luther Hall the Thermostats are controlled via the wireless network. With the addition of the equipment and the teachers' requirement for internet connectivity the present system is unable to handle the load. •Charles Avery is a parent of a student in the Mustard Seed and has volunteered to work with Michael to upgrade the system.

•As part of the report Michael requested that a budget be set to not exceed \$2,500.00. Charles has agreed to make a donation toward the equipment

•The modem and equipment in the office will be moved to the basement and installed in a rack with a patch panel. This will make for a clean installation and improve in troubleshooting problems.

•Church Upgrade - A wireless node and equipment to support it will be installed in the church to support video streaming the service and administration functions.

•Cameras – 4 cameras will be purchased for Luther Hall to cover the play yard, doors and halls.

•Installation will be by Charles and Michael on an upcoming Saturday

A motion to approve up to \$2,500 to be used for the work outlined above. (M/S/P: Drew Catrow; Rick Losh) All voted in favor via vocal roll call vote.

New Business: Planning for fall activities will depend on covid numbers and safety. Christmas Eve services might be a 6pm outdoor "barnyard" service with a later service either in Luther Hall or inside the church again, depending on the feasibility after getting the professional evaluation by the National Guard and the status of the virus in our county. Covenants for the upcoming year will be repeated based upon this year's covenants until further plans are considered. Preparing a budget for 2021 will be challenging but several approaches are being considered. Bess will provide the budget planning document for the 2020 (current) budget to Pastor, Jerry Crites, and Trustees and a meeting will be called later in October to work on next year's budget recommendations. St. John's received a letter from CASA (a nonprofit organization) asking if they could use up to 5 spaces in our parking lot Monday thru Friday during the day. They will be renting office space in the Gateway Hotel across the street. After discussion a motion to deny the request was made. (M/S/P: Linda Payne; Drew Catrow) A vocal roll call vote was taken with 8 votes in favor of the motion and 1 vote against the amendment. Parking request by CASA was denied citing the use of the parking lot by Mustard Seed employees and parents, as well as other activities at the church. The copier

in the office is up for contract renewal or replacement. Several options were explored and a decision will be made soon. President Jerry thanked several members of the congregation for their services around and about the church during this pandemic. Acknowledging that many more have contributed much but for which we are very appreciative, the following have gone above and beyond: Doug Widmeyer, Buddy and Gail Newman, Betty Lou Boynton, Mike Noll, Drew Catrow, Kandi Ruth, and Brenda Morrison. Thanks to these folks and many others.

Property: Anne Moore had shared information regarding the steeple completion project. The contractor renovating the Gateway Hotel submitted a proposal for \$400,000 to rebuild the steeple. While this contractor would get the job done in a timely manner with a very professional, durable steeple completed, the cost is probably not doable with our budget. Contractor will be approached again to see if work could be done in stages over time or if we could contract for a less costly steeple that would still be durable for a long time.

LUTHER AND AFRICA BY GENE VEITH



The Christian History site, sponsored by *Christianity Today*, has posted a fascinating article about the influence of Ethiopia on Luther and the Reformation.

Wheaton theology professor Jennifer Powell McNutt, in her article **An Unsung Inspiration for the Protestant Reformation: the Ethiopian**

Church, recounts how the Reformation-far from being an exercise in individualism-saw itself in the context of the historical church and global Christianity. The Reformers looked to the Orthodox

churches of the East and of Africa as providing a precedent for many of their reforms.

When Rome insisted that there can be no church without a Pope, the Reformers pointed to the Orthodox churches, which have no Pope and whose practices pre-date those of Medieval Catholicism. Those churches do not emphasize Purgatory and do not sell indulgences. They do not worship in Latin. Their clergy could marry. And yet even Rome admitted that the Eastern churches, despite the **Great Schism of 1054** at the very beginning of the Medieval era, were true churches.

Luther was especially interested in the Orthodox church of Ethiopia, which he believed was founded by the Ethiopian eunuch of Acts 8, making it one of the most ancient of all church bodies. Luther mentioned Ethiopia 85 times in his writings. Luther was even visited in 1534 by an Ethiopian cleric, Michael the Deacon. Here is the account in **Wikipedia** of that meeting: In 1534, Michael the Deacon travelled to **Wittenberg** and met with Martin Luther, a leader in the Reformation.[2] [3] During the meeting, the two compared the Lutheran Mass with that used by the Ethiopian Orthodox Church and found that they were in agreement with one another.[1][4] Michael the Deacon also affirmed Luther's Articles of the Christian Faith as a "good creed".[3][1] As such, the Lutheran Churches extended full communion to the Ethiopian Orthodox Church.[5][1] Prof. McNutt summarizes Luther's interest in Ethiopia: Luther marveled at how the churches of Armenia, Ethiopia, and India had avoided the private masses that developed in the West since Gregory the Great's time. Luther also regarded it significant that, before there was a "pope," there were the bishops of Ethiopia, Syria, Antioch, and Rome. The Orthodox branches were a link back to a purer, more apostolic era.

The church of Ethiopia, especially, was mentioned among early modern Christians. Some scholars have noted that Luther mentions Ethiopia at least 85 times in his written works. (It was a common though mistaken belief to view Ethiopia as the first Christian kingdom. That belief was based on a particular reading of Acts 8.) Luther's esteem only grew after he was visited by Michael the Deacon, an Ethiopian cleric, in 1534. As Daniels explains,

For Luther, the Church of Ethiopia had more fidelity to the Christian tradition. ... Thus, the Church in Europe needed to be reformed in the direction of the Church of Ethiopia. Possibly for Luther the Church of Ethiopia was proof that his reform of the Church in Europe had both a biblical *and* a historical basis.

To Luther, "Ethiopia" symbolized the church, and one of the most valued legacies that the Reformers identified within the Ethiopian church was its insistence on maintaining the Bible in the common language.

The church of Ethiopia had the Bible in its own language, as did other Orthodox churches, and this became an important precedent for the principle of vernacular Bible translations.

Later, in the 1570s, Lutheran theologians, led by Jacob Andreae-one of the key contributors to the **Book of Concord**began a correspondence with the Patriarch of Constantinople, sending him a Greek translation of the Augsburg Confession in an effort to find common ground. But there were more differences between Lutheranism and Eastern Orthodoxy than the early Reformers had realized, particularly regarding the authority of Scripture and justification by faith alone. But it is surely significant that today, the **Ethiopian Evangelical Church Mekane Yesus** [place of Jesus], with 9 million members, is the largest Lutheran church body in the world.

2020 Family Retreat Details Please call Julie at (540) 449-0018 or email julie@carolinefurnace.org if you have questions or would like more information. We look forward to hosting your family this summer!

Caroline Furnace will be open for Family Retreats beginning on July 9. We are grateful that Virginia continues to view outdoor activity as essential, and that we are able to provide outdoor faith, education, and renewal in a safe way. We can host a maximum of 5 family groups (of 10 or less) on property at once; spaces are first come, first served.

- For family groups of 10 or less; 14 days of Health Pre-Screening required for all participants
- Minimum stay is two nights; maximum four nights (3pm Thursday to 11am Monday)
- The Farmhouse and Sukkah Village are optional no-contact retreat spaces.

Farmhouse (\$200-250 per night*)

- *Cost is a flat rate of \$200 per night for 1-6 people, or \$250 for 7-10 people
- Wi-Fi is provided. You can continue to work and study remotely while on retreat.
- You'll have a fully equipped kitchen; only ingredients are needed. Bed linens and towels are provided.

Cabin Village (\$200-250 per night, meals included*)

- *Cost is a flat rate of \$200 per night for 1-6 people, or \$250 for 7-10 people, +\$50 for A/C (Cabin 7 & 8)
- Wi-Fi is provided. You can continue to work and study remotely while on retreat.
- Bathhouse shower times are scheduled by family. Each group will have a designated rain space and campfire circle. Up to three family groups may stay in the Cabin Village at one time.

Sukkah Village (\$50 per night*)

- *Cost is a flat rate of \$50 per night for 1-6 people, or \$75 for 7-10 people
- You may choose tent camping or RV camping (no RV hookups -regular 110v power available)
- Camping stoves allowed; a fire circle and firewood is also available
- The pavilion and one side of the bathhouse will be open.

Meals (+\$20-35 per meal, per family)

- For Farmhouse and Sukkah Village groups: add \$20 per breakfast or lunch, \$25 per dinner for up to 6 people; add an additional \$10 per meal for 7-10 people
- Breakfast 8:00am, Lunch 12:30pm, Dinner 5:30pm
- Meals are provided by outdoor take-out or by delivery to your cabin porch/lodging space.
- Bag lunches are available if you are traveling off-site.

Staff-led Activities (+\$50 per day / for two activities)

- You may choose from 1 to 3 days of staff-led activities. Plan for 1 to 1.5 hours per activity.
- At least one adult must participate in each staff-activity and is expected to provide supervision.
- 6+ feet of distancing is required. If this isn't realistic (first aid), our staff will wear a mask/gloves.
- Pick Two (/day): Archery, Canoeing, Creekwalking, CDC/low ropes, Fishing, History Hike, Swimming

*If this is cost prohibitive for you but your family would still like to come on retreat, please contact us. We want to do everything we can to support you during this time.

My brothers and sisters,

503 years later, the church stands. 503 years ago, a German monk changed the world when he went up against a superpower with the confidence in his heart and mind that he was right. He had the word of God on his side and some pretty important people to protect him. Many came

before Luther and were killed. Luther got lucky. Why the Holy Spirit chose him and not the others is something I would like to ask God one day. 503 years later, we gather as Lutheran-Christians. This year, we gather in a very different way but we still gather. We are still a family and as a family, we stick together.

503 years ago, our family was broken. Division occurred in the church and that hurt. We are still feeling the pain of this division 503 years later. Now, this virus has divided us again. As hard as I try, I still feel disconnected and like I have lost touch with some of you. If you feel that way, I am sorry. I was not trained for this kind of ministry and I have been learning as I go.

One of things I love about St. John's is the dedication to our ministry. Covid has caused us to rethink how we do ministry and even with the struggles, people are stepping up and taking the lead on many things. From redoing the way we do ushers, to packing over 400 backpacks full of school, to the evangelism committee rethinking outreach, I love how so many of you have taken our ministry to the next level. Has it been easy? No. Have I banged my head against the wall? So many times that I think there is an indentation. Even with all the stress and failures, the disconnect and brokenness we have felt the Holy Spirit still moving and breathing within our community. The Holy Spirit is still inspiring us to do ministry in Martinsburg. For years, many have said we needed to be more creative with our ministry. Well, I guess this is the time for creativity.

I mentioned the Evangelism committee work in my last paragraph. We have met twice now and each time we have met, I have left feeling very inspired. We have a number of things in the work. One event is the Trunk or Treat being held on Saturday, October 31st at noon. I am calling this Trunk or Treat 2.0 because the committee wants to take this event to the next level. This year, we want to focus more on our neighbors and reaching out to them. Here is the plan:

• We will have members donate candy for trunk or treat by Sunday October 25. After church on this Sunday, we would put the candy into individual, ziplock bags and then let them sit all week.

- On the day of the event, we will have people come and decorate their cars as usual. Those who are handing out candy will be given a mask and gloves.
- We will post signs asking that all adults wear a mask while at the event and that families keep physical distance. Halloween is pretty cool because most costumes have masks already built in. We will also have additional masks available for children who might need one.
- We also want to take this to the next level and offer things we have not offered before. Right now, our plan is to serve a prepackage lunch of Hotdogs (with ketchup and mustard packets—available upon request), a small bag of chips, and a bottle of water.
- We will need volunteers to this day. If you feel up to helping, let me know in advance. We will need some help in the kitchen, help handing out candy, cars decorated, candy people, and just general welcomers. We want this to be an outreach event and one of our biggest assets as a congregation is YOU! So, let the community know just how awesome you are and meet the people of our neighborhood.

One last thing. Dr. Fauci has said that we should expect to not have things go back to pre-covid normal until December 2021 only if a vaccine is developed (and these novel-corona-viruses are very hard to develop a vaccine against). That statement is hard for many of us to digest and something that has caused our council to start thinking long-term about our future. As many of you know, Diane and I had planned to have Isaiah baptized back in April. We kept saying we would wait to have him baptized until after the vaccine was developed thinking maybe this Spring. However, with Dr. Fauci's statement, we no longer wish to wait, so if all goes according to plan (and we all know that plans change all the time) we plan to baptize Isaiah on October 25th at our Reformation Service. It will be a special day not only because of Isaiah's baptism, but we will share this day with our brothers and sisters of St. Thomas Lutheran. They will join us both in-person and virtually this day to celebrate the Word of God continuing to dwell with us. It is not the baptism we envision for Isaiah, but as Luther says-Baptism is not simply plain water. Instead, it is water used according to God's command and connected with God's word...For without the word of God the water is plain water and not a baptism, but with the word of God it is a baptism, that is, a grace-filled water of life and a "bath of the new birth in the Holy Spirit ... "When the Word of God is present, ordinary things such as water become means for which salvation is freely given.

So, come October 25th, God will do an amazing thing because the word of God will be present in the craziest of places—our parking lot. I hope you will join us that day both in-person or virtually.
