Thursday Evening TLC



Dear friends and family,

This year has been filled with transitions. I transitioned back to the US this Spring. This Summer I traveled through much of the U.S., and this fall I transitioned back into the life of a masters student in Dallas, TX. Amidst all these transitions God has been with me each step of the way and I am thankful. He has placed supportive family and friends in my life to help me in my transitions. I would like to introduce you to a very important friend of mine who has supported me through each of these transitions.

Naomi Erber is a registered occupational therapist working in Topeka, KS. She has been living there for several years now. Before I share about our connection, I would like to provide a brief introduction.

Naomi was born in Nigeria to Rev. David and Joyce Erber, missionaries with the LCMS. She grew up in rural Nigeria and attended a Christian school in Jos, Nigeria throughout middle school and high school. Her parents transitioned to Accra, Ghana during the end of her senior year of high school. Her experiences in Nigeria have shaped her into someone who values people and relationships greatly. If you meet Naomi, you will see someone who has a large smile and all the time in the world to listen to you and hear about your family, work, and life story. People are important to her, and serving people and sharing Christ's love is something she learned from her immediate family and Nigerian friends.

After graduating from high school, she attended Concordia University in Wisconsin (CUW). She was involved in several campus ministries and that is where we met. We also shared some mutual friends.

We didn't keep in contact much after I graduated from CUW while I was in the States preparing to head to Ghana. While I was living in Ghana I would share stories with her from my experiences from time to time.

In the summer of 2018 we began to message each other more frequently. As our relationship grew, it also changed. We asked for our parents to pray and guide us as we continued to communicate back and forth. Long distance relationships are not desirable, but they are possible.

In February she was able to come see her parents in Accra, and I was able to fly down to be with her for a couple weeks. It was a relief to be together in person after several years of not seeing each other. Her visit also helped strengthen our relationship.

We were able to do some activities together this summer, like whale watching (above) and be with family on vacation (below).








During family vacation we were able to see the Ark Encounter in Kentucky (top left). It was a blessing to see each other in February in Accra, Ghana (top right).

MAX LUCADO gives us Christmas Candle.





Dear Brothers & Sisters in Christ:

Deaconess Lori Wilbert has been serving in Prison Ministry for over 30 years within the NID. The No. IL District has had connections to prison ministry since the 1930's. Lori currently serves Stateville Prison in Crest Hill, IL, outside of Joliet. Pastor Robert Kramer trained Lori and worked with her for over 10 years before retiring in the mid 1990's. The history of the district office is that for a good many years they were able to fund a number of chaplains and ministries but in 2003 money ran out and two of the ministries, Voice of Hope Behind the Wall (Lori) and Voice of Care, mentally handicapped, have had to raise their own salaries and ministry costs. Without the support of churches and individuals in the NID there would be no prison ministry.

Here at St. Paul's Lutheran in Matteson, we decided to connect with Lori's ministry in 2003 (to present) providing her with financial support, love and prayers. From the first time Lori spoke to us about the work at Stateville Prison we felt the need to stay educated and informed about this sizeable group (over 3000 inmates) of individuals living behind the wall that need to hear the Good News! Each year Lori visits us and brings us stories of the lives of inmates that she has come to know in her ministry work. I've had the opportunity to go with Lori "behind the bars" and bring communion to inmates who are brothers in Christ in the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod. It is a sobering experience! Lori found out the first time she visited St. Paul's that a member here had a personal attachment to Stateville through a family member who had worked there years ago. We feel blessed to partner with Prison Ministry.

On a personal note, Lori and I have connections that go back to my vicarage and Lori's' first call when she graduated from the Deaconess program at Concordia, River Forest (Chicago). I was a vicar at Gloria Dei (53rd & Major) and Lori took a call to Nazareth (3250 W. 60th St.).

VOICE OF HOPE | BEHIND THE WALL

"You have been told, O man and woman, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, to love kindness and to walk humbly with your God." - Micah 6:8

Have you ever felt alone in your work and ministry? Work you were convinced God called you to, work you took great joy in and work that fed your soul...? I am convinced all of us have felt this way at some point or another. I know I have. There are times I see God working miracles in the lives of people, offering them a second chance. There are moments I have witnessed slammed doors opening just a crack, and roadblocks removed. I know in those sacred moments, God is working. There will always be days full of challenges and overwhelming obstacles that leave us feeling quite alone and perhaps, doubting ourselves. Expect it. I have come to see these alone times as the "norm," perhaps an indicator that we are on the right path, the road God has called us to in order to get His work done. Things do get tough and we may want to give up, however, by God's grace we rise to the occasion in spite of ourselves.

Jesus, the Son of man, Son of God, was well acquainted with going it alone. The Pharisees and Saducees, the politicians of the day (mighty Rome) all conspired to shut him down yet he persevered. Jesus' single focus was to love the unloveable, forgive the unpardonable and grant grace where there was only law. Each day we need to remind ourselves to touch the hem of his garment, as the woman did in Mt 9:21-22, "for she thought, "if I only touch him, I will be healed." Jesus turned around and spoke to her. "Daughter, he said, "all is well!" Your faith has healed you. And the woman was well from that moment."

We are to do the same. The individuals I teach and visit in the cell houses each week inspire me. They are curious, interested in this Son of man, Son of God, and they hunger to know more of God's grace, pardon and forgiveness. We do the work God has called us to in spite of the obstacles because God always finds a way to keep us in good stead and "run the race with perseverance," no matter what. He is faithful. Remember to touch the hem of his garment and always know, you are not alone.

"...and let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us. Let us fix our eyes on Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy set before him endured the cross, scorning its shame, and sat down at the right hand of the throne of God."

Hebrews 12 1 - 2

Up Date - Classes:

Classes and rounds are ongoing. In addition to the work at Stateville, I spoke to a group of students at Concordia River Forest in early September interested in prison ministry, the correctional system and issues revolving around incarceration. I very much appreciated our dialogue after my presentation as well as answering their questions and responding to their insights regarding the individuals I serve. It was an opportunity to speak to restorative justice and the needs of both victims and offenders. What does healing look like? How can we, the church, be involved in this system and make a positive impact? I will be bringing various students into the prison between now and May to participate in the Houses of Healing class I teach. What a great opportunity for learning on both sides.


