We have wounds, don't we? Of course. Each of us has experienced woundedness because of sin in the world. A couple of weeks ago in my sermon, *Sin Separates, Love Unites*, I spoke about the seriousness of sin.

Sin is the breaking down of fellowship between God and man. Sin is the breaking down of fellowship between man and man. Sin is wandering, loneliness, going astray, separation, and transgression. Everything that is wrong in the world is due to sin.

Not only have we been wounded, but we are also guilty of wounding others. The Law of God reveals our wayward behavior. We have not followed the path that God had planned for our life. We do not always love Him with our whole heart, mind, body, and strength. And we certainly do not always love our neighbor as ourselves.

But Jesus, the Christ, came to fulfill the Law of God. Jesus lived a sinless life and endured the cruelty of the cross in our place. Because of His life, death, and resurrection, we receive by faith; forgiveness, everlasting life, and salvation. We are saved by grace through faith in Jesus our Savior. Grace is the undeserved kindness and love of God. Grace is the restoration of our fellowship.

During Lent this year, our midweek worship will focus upon the wounds of Jesus. The innocent Son of God had no sins of His own for which He deserved to die, yet his enemies falsely accused Him of violating every commandment of God. It was our sin, our disobedience, that Jesus bore in His body on the cross. The Lord laid on Him "the iniquity of us all." Jesus suffered the penalty of death in our place, and "by His wounds we are healed."

May God grant us His blessing this Lenten season as we journey toward the cross and ultimately, His resurrection.

Let the peace of God rule in your hearts. Colossians 3:15

Science has confirmed what the Bible taught centuries ago: there is a close relationship between our minds and bodies. Proverbs puts it this way: "A cheerful heart is good medicine, but a crushed spirit dries up the bones" (17:22 NIV).

But there is also a close relationship between our mental and physical health and the health of our spiritual lives. Guilt, fear, jealousy, bitterness, futility, escapism – these and a host of other problems are spiritual ills brought about by the disease of sin. Like poison, they can sicken us in mind and body.

But when Christ comes into our lives, He removes our guilt and takes away our fears. He gives us love for others and a new purpose in life. His joy and peace neutralize sin's poison and promote emotional and physical health.

Does that mean our emotional and physical problems will vanish? Not necessarily. But like a spring of pure water, God's peace in our hearts brings cleansing and refreshment to our minds and bodies.

Featured Resources For March Focus on Lent

Lent is the forty days preceding Easter, excluding Sundays, from Ash Wednesday to Easter Sunday. This season of solemn preparation culminates in Holy Week, when we follow Jesus to the cross, for us, on Good Friday and His victory over death Resurrection morning. Lent is a time to recognize that mankind's greatest problem, fatal separation from God, has a solution: the sacrifice of Jesus Christ for our redemption. Lent is a time to contemplate God's great mercy given to us in Christ Jesus. It is a reflective time to strengthen our faith.



While some may choose to give something up during this time, many will choose to increase their meditation and devotional practices. (If you don't spend daily time with Our Lord, this is a great season to start!) The Church Library offers several tools for use during your times of reflection and repentance this season.

The following resources will be available throughout the Lenten season:

An Explanation of the History of the Suffering and Death of Our Lord Jesus Christ by Johann Gerhard

This classic work is a must-read during Lent. The 24 sermons draw upon the Old Testament prophesies and show how they find their fulfillment in Christ.

He was Crucified by Gerard Stanley

(Even if you don't check this out from the library, go to the library and flip through the pages of this.)

In this beautiful book, Gerard Stanley, a medical doctor, uses history and his medical experience to offer reflections on the physical and mental anguish Jesus endured in the hours leading up to His death. This stunning book will deepen your understanding of what Jesus experienced.

A free study guide is even available from www.CPH.org

Thy Kingdom Come - Lent and Easter Sermons by David H. Petersen.

With over sixty sermons spanning Pre-Lent, all forty days of Lent, and the Sundays after Easter, this book serves as an excellent daily devotion.

The Christ of the Gospels by William F. Beck

The life and work of JESUS as told by Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John presented as one complete story in the language of today.

Bearing the Cross: Devotions on Albrecht Durer's Small Passion by Carolyn Brinkley

This combines the great artwork of Albrecht Dürer's Small Passion, gems of hymnody, and Holy Scripture into faith enriching devotional vignettes. You will be escorted from Genesis to Revelation in a personal, intimate journey with Christ. (This is also available from Amazon for your Kindle.)

Sacred Meditations by Johann Gerhard

Johann Gerhard's 51 meditations immerse the you in Christ, bringing you through trial to glory, through anguish to peace, through doubt to certainty, through confession to absolution, through cross to resurrection. This classic work of Lutheran spirituality reminds us all that the Word of God is living and breathing, changing not only how we think or live, but even who we are.

The Day Christ Died by Jim Bishop

This book about the most dramatic day in the history of the world, the day on which Jesus of Nazareth died, is written by a journalist in a captivating manner.

The First Easter and In The Fullness of Time by Paul Maier

In these books, Pail Maier unravels the politics behind the Crucifixion, retells the resurrection accounts, and illustrates with numerous photographs the sacred sites.

<u>Pontius Pilate</u> by Paul L. Maier is a historical novel that draws you into the events Holy Week and offers a different vantage point. If you have never read this book before, you are missing out on a very unique and engaging read. I recommend reading it before Good Friday. If your local public library offers a Hoopla app, this is available on Hoopla.

<u>With My Own Eyes</u> by Bo Giertz is a third person narrative of the Gospels but told from a different perspective with each story. You will be drawn in as you see and experience each event through the character's eyes.

If you have chosen to spend some time this Lenten Season learning God's Word through reading the Lutheran Confessions, a <u>2020</u> <u>Book of Concord Reading Plan</u> is available to assist you. The library also has several copies of <u>The Book of Concord</u> available. Consider spending some time each day growing in the faith and what we Lutherans believe, teach, and confess.




New Member Welcome!

Live Simply... Use Less Plastic

This is the third in a series of articles which extend the concepts of our recent Annual Stewardship Emphasis, "Live Simply." Each article includes a "30-Day Challenge" for you to consider. These challenges may, 1. Make your life simpler, and/or 2. Save you money, and/or 3. Practice good stewardship of the environment.

The 30 -Day Challenge for March is, for 30 days, reduce (or, if possible, eliminate) single-use plastics.

Isn't plastic wonderful? It's lightweight, it's inexpensive, it can be formed into countless shapes and colors. Unfortunately, it is almost totally non-biodegradable. When a Styrofoam cup or a plastic water bottle does break down (in 100 to 500 years), it simply becomes microplastic and nanoplastic particles. A staggering amount of plastic shopping bags, cups, lids, straws, eating utensils and bottles – just to name a few of the most obvious – end up in ditches and fields, where they are eaten by birds and other wildlife, or get washed into rivers, lakes and oceans, where they are eaten by fish and other marine animals...and eventually come back to us in the food we eat and even the air we breathe.

A few interesting statistics from a recent National Geographic article: one million plastic beverage bottles are bought every minute around the world. Less than half are recycled. Twenty-four billion pairs of shoes were made in 2018. Shoes are hard to recycle because different types of plastic and other materials are glued and molded together. One billion toothbrushes will be discarded in the U.S. this year. *Trillions* of cigarettes are sold around the world every year – many having a filter made from cellulose acetate – and two-thirds of them are flicked onto sidewalks, streets, beaches, parking lots, etc.

There are a lot of things we can do to reduce our use of plastics, but this 30-day challenge is specifically aimed at singleuse plastics. Could you eliminate, or at least significantly reduce, your use of single-use plastics for one month (or permanently)? Here are a few ideas.

If you go to a restaurant (not a great idea in itself – see last month's article), ask for your drink without a straw. If it's a fast-food place, skip the plastic lid on the drink. Get a refillable water bottle or coffee travel mug (as much as possible, avoid commercial bottled water entirely). Keep a set of reusable cutlery in your lunch bag, purse, briefcase, or car. Don't want to send metal silverware in your kids' lunches? Get some that are compostable. Put meal leftovers in permanent containers, like Pyrex bowls with lids (instead of covering with plastic wrap). Bring your own take-home container to a restaurant. Take tote bags or mesh produce bags when you shop (preferably cotton, not plastic ones).

This 30-day challenge won't save you much money – in fact, it may even cost you a little, at least at first. But it will make the world God gave us a little better place!
