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GOD SPEAKS, PART 2

Please Cancel My Request!

Have you ever prayed for one thing and received another? I have. When that happened to me, some dear soul would inevitably say, "God is trying to get you to persist. Keep praying until you receive what you are asking for." I kept asking God for one thing, but I kept receiving something else.

During one of these experiences I started reading Mark 2, which tells the account of the four men who brought their crippled friend to Jesus to be healed. Because of the large crowd they opened a hole in the roof of the house and let the man down in front of Jesus. Jesus said, "Son, your sins are forgiven" (Mark 2:5).

I started to read on, but I sensed the Spirit of God saying, "Henry, did you see that?" I went back and meditated on that Scripture. The Holy Spirit revealed to me a wonderful truth: the four men asked Jesus to physically heal the man, but Jesus forgave the man's sins. They asked for one thing, and Jesus gave another! This man and his friends asked for a temporary gift, but Jesus wanted to make the man a child of God for eternity so he could inherit everything!

I found myself weeping before God and saying, "O God, if I ever ask You for one thing and You have more to give me than I am asking, please cancel my request!"

Day 1

You must decide whether you will do what you want and ask God to bless it or adjust your life to where He is working.

WHAT HAPPENS WHEN YOU PRAY?

If I start asking God for one thing and something different happens, I always respond to what begins happening. I have found God always has far more to give me than I can even ask or think. Paul wrote, "Now to him who is able to do above and beyond all that we ask or think according to the power that works in us—to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus to all generations, forever and ever. Amen!" (Eph. 3:20–21).

You can't imagine a prayer that comes close to what God wants to give you. Only the Spirit of God knows what God is doing or purposing in your life. Let God give you all He wants to bestow (see 1 Cor. 2:10-12). Never be satisfied with less than God intends for you!

Are you experiencing what God intends for you, or are you experiencing only what you have asked for?

What is the evidence?

Who alone can guide you into the center of God's will?

Suppose your church wants to start a mission church in a particular area of town. You have taken a survey to identify needs. You have made long-range plans. You have asked God to bless and guide your work. Then God begins to bring to your church a group of ethnic people to whom you did not intend to minister. What would you do?

a. I would not be diverted from starting the mission church we had planned.

b. I would add the ethnic group to our future plans.

c. I would start asking God questions to learn whether we should start an ethnic mission church instead of or in addition to the other one.

In this situation I would immediately go before God to clarify what He is saying. If I have been working and praying in one direction and I see God working in a different way, I adjust my life to what God is doing. You must decide whether you will do what you want and ask God to bless it or adjust your life to where He is working.

We started a special emphasis to reach university students in Vancouver. We began with 30 students in the fall. By the end of the spring semester, about 250 were attending. Two-thirds of these were international students. We could have said, "We didn't plan for a ministry to internationals. Please go somewhere else, and may God bless you." Of course, we didn't do that. We adjusted our plans to what God was doing around us.

SPIRITUAL CONCENTRATION

Our problem is that when we pray, we usually don't relate our prayers to anything that subsequently happens. After you pray, practice spiritual concentration. When you pray in a particular direction, immediately anticipate God's activity in answer to your prayer. Throughout Scripture when God's people prayed, He responded.

Here's what happens if you pray and then forget about what you prayed. Things start to happen during the day that are unusual. Seeing them as distractions, you ignore them and fail to connect them with what you prayed about earlier.

When I pray, I immediately begin to watch for what happens next. I prepare to make adjustments to what happens in my life. When I pray, the idea that God is not going to answer never crosses my mind. Expect God to answer your prayers, but stick around for the answer. His timing is always best.

THE SILENCES OF GOD

I went through a lengthy time when God was silent. You have probably have had that experience too. I had been praying for many days, but God was silent. I sensed heaven was shut up, and I didn't understand what was happening. Some people had told me that if God does not answer my prayer, I have sin in my life. However, I had repented of and confessed all known sin. I could not understand God's silence.

Do you remember a biblical person who had a problem like this? Job did. His counselors told him all his problems were caused by sin, while Job claimed he and God were on good terms. Job did not know all God was doing during that time, but his counselors were wrong. God had another reason for His silence.

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All I knew to do was to go back to God, believing that the God who was in a love relationship with me would let me know what was happening in my life when and if I needed to know. So I prayed, "Heavenly Father, I don't understand this silence. You are going to have to tell me what You are doing in my life." He did—from His Word. This became one of the most meaningful experiences in my life.

I did not frantically search for an answer but continued my daily reading of God's Word. I was convinced that as I regularly read the Word of God, the Spirit of God—who knew the mind of God for me—was in the process of helping me understand what God was doing in my life. God will let you know what He is doing in your life when and if you need to know.

One morning I was reading the account of the death of Lazarus (see John 11:1-45). John reported that Jesus loved Lazarus, Mary, and Martha. Although Jesus received



God will let you know what He is doing in your life when and if you need to know. word that His good friend was sick and at the point of death, He delayed going until Lazarus died. In other words, Mary and Martha asked Jesus to come help their brother when he was sick, but Jesus remained silent. All the way through Lazarus's final sickness and death, Jesus did not answer. They received no response from the One who claimed to love Lazarus. Jesus loved Mary and Martha too, yet He did nothing.

Lazarus died, and Mary and Martha went through the funeral process, preparing his body, putting him in the grave, and covering it with a stone. Still, God's silence continued. Finally, Jesus said to His disciples, "Let's go."

When Jesus arrived, Lazarus had been dead four days. Martha said to Jesus, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother wouldn't have died" (v. 32). Then the Spirit of God began to help me understand something. It seemed to me as if Jesus said to Mary and Martha: "You are exactly right. If I had come when you asked, your brother would not have died. You know I could have healed him, because you have seen Me heal people many times before. If I had come when you asked Me to, I would have healed him. But you would have never known any more about Me than you already understood. I knew you were ready for a greater revelation of Me than you have known before. I wanted you to experience that I am the Resurrection and the Life. My refusal and My silence were not rejection. They were opportunities for Me to disclose to you more of Me than you have ever known."

When that truth dawned on me, I almost jumped out of my chair. I said, "That's what's happening in my life! God's silence means He is ready to bring into my life a greater revelation of Himself than I have ever known." I immediately changed my whole attitude toward God, With great anticipation I began to watch for what God was going to teach me about Himself. Then some things happened that I might never have responded to without that readiness and anticipation.

What are two possible reasons for God's silence when you pray?

Now when I pray and God is silent, I still pray through my sin checklist. Sometimes God's silences are indeed caused by sin in my life. If unconfessed sin is in my life, I confess it and make it right. If God is still silent after that, I get ready for a new experience with Him. Sometimes God is silent as He prepares to bring you to a deeper understanding of Himself. Sometimes His silence is designed to bring you into a state of absolute dependence on and trust in God. Whenever God is silent, continue doing the last thing God told you and watch and wait for a fresh encounter with Him.

You can respond to God's silence in two ways. You can become frustrated, feel guilty, or be impatient. Or you can expect that God is about to bring you to a deeper knowledge of Himself. These responses are as different as night and day.

Do you know what set me free? Truth. Truth is a Person who is actively involved in my life. The moment I understood what God might be doing, I adjusted my life to Him. I put away my discouragement and guilt. I quit feeling that I was of no use to God and He wasn't listening to me. I made a major adjustment in my life to an attitude of expectation, faith, and trust. The moment I did, God began to show me how I could respond to Him in such a way that I would know Him on a deeper level.

GOD SPEAKS THROUGH CIRCUMSTANCES

Day 2

The Holy Spirit uses the Bible, prayer, circumstances, and God's people to speak to us to show us the Father's will. This third means—circumstances—is illustrated in the way Jesus knew what the Father wanted Him to do. This is how Jesus knew the Father's will for His life and daily activity. Jesus described the process in John 5:17,19-20.

To understand your bad or difficult circumstances, God's perspective is vital.

Verse 19 is your memory verse for this unit. Try to recite it now.

Jesus said He did not take the initiative in doing anything for the Father (see v. 19). Only the Father has the right to initiate a divine work. The Father had been working right up until Jesus' time on earth, and He was still working (see v. 17). The Father would let the Son know what He was doing (see v. 20). When the Son saw the Father's activity, that was the Father's invitation for the Son to join Him.

John 5:17


"Jesus responded to them, 'My Father is still working, and I am working also.'"

God used circumstances to reveal to Jesus what He should do. The circumstances were the things Jesus saw the Father doing. There are certain things only the Father can do.

Jesus always looked for where the Father was at work; then He joined Him. The Father loved the Son and showed Him everything He was doing. Jesus did not have to guess what to do. This is exactly what Jesus wants us to do through His lordship in our lives. We see what He is doing; then we adjust our lives, our plans, and our goals to Him. We are to place our lives at His disposal—where He is working—so He will accomplish His purposes through us.



GOD'S PERSPECTIVE IS VITAL

Jesus' example is a positive way God speaks through circumstances. Sometimes circumstances appear to be negative. Maybe you have found yourself in the middle of a difficult situation and asked God, "Why is this happening to me?" You are not alone. Job had an experience like that. He did not know what was happening when everything he owned was destroyed, when his children died, and when he developed excruciating sores all over his body (see Job 1—2). Job wrestled with understanding his circumstances. They certainly appeared bad! He did not know what was happening from God's perspective (see Job 1:6-12; 2:1-7). Neither did He know the last chapter of the story (see Job 42:12-17), in which God would restore his property, his family, and his health.

Job's friends, thinking they had God's perspective, told Job to confess his sin. Job could not find any unrighteousness in his life to confess. If you didn't have that last chapter and didn't know God's perspective, whose side do you think you would be on—God's or Job's? You would probably be with Job, saying, "I want to ask God what's going on. Why is He allowing this to happen?" You would think God was being cruel to Job.

To understand your painful or difficult circumstances, God's perspective is vital. When you face hardships or confusing situations, they can overwhelm you. When you look at God from the middle of your circumstances, you will always have a distorted understanding of Him. For instance, you might say, "God doesn't love me" or "God isn't fair." Both of those statements about God are completely false.

Perhaps you began to question God's love or His wisdom. Maybe you were afraid to say He was wrong, but you said, "God, You misled me in letting me believe this was the right thing to do. Why didn't You stop me? If I had known things were going to turn out like this, ..." You can get into spiritual difficulty if you look at God from the middle of circumstances.

What should you do? First, go to God and ask Him to show you His perspective on your circumstances. Look back at your circumstances from the heart of God. When you face confusing events, the Spirit of God will take the Word of God and help you understand your circumstances from God's perspective. He will reveal to you the truth of your situation.

At the beginning of unit 3 I told you about our daughter Carrie's bout with cancer, a challenging situation for our whole family. The doctors prepared us for six to eight months of intense chemotherapy, plus radiation treatments. We knew God loved us, so we went to Him in prayer and asked for understanding of what He was doing or was going to do in our lives. We wanted to be rightly adjusted to Him through this time. We prayed, "What are You purposing to do in this experience that we need to adjust ourselves to?"

As we prayed, a Scripture promise came that we believed was from God. Not only did we receive the promise, but we also received letters and calls from many people who quoted this same Scripture promise to us, sensing this verse was from God for our circumstance. The verse reads, "This sickness will not end in death but it is for the glory of God, so that the Son of God may be glorified through it" (John 11:4). While it would have been natural for us to claim this verse for our daughter, we sensed God was giving us this Scripture as His word for our circumstances. Our sense that God was speaking to us grew stronger as the Bible, prayer, and other believers' testimonies began to agree. We then adjusted our lives to the truth and began to watch for ways God would use this situation for His glory.

During this time people from many places in Canada, Europe, and the United States prayed for Carrie. Individuals, college-student groups, and churches called to tell us of their prayers. One thing surfaced in conversations with these people. Many said something like this: "Our prayer ministry had become so dry and cold, and we hadn't seen any special answers to prayer in a long time. But when we heard about Carrie, we felt motivated to pray for her regularly."


After three months of treatments, the doctors ran more tests. They said, "We don't understand this, but all the tests are negative. We cannot find any trace of cancer." I immediately communicated this answer to prayer with those who had committed to pray for Carrie. In instance after instance people said God used this answer to prayer to renew their prayer lives. Church prayer ministries were revitalized. Student prayer groups found new life.

Then I began to see what God had in mind for this circumstance: through this experience God was glorified in the eyes of His people. Many people sensed a fresh call to prayer. They personally began to experience anew the presence of Truth—Truth as a Person. Some of Carrie's closest friends began to pray fervently. Some students even became Christians after observing what God had done in and through Carrie. God indeed brought glory to Himself through this sickness.


Do you see what happened? We faced a trying situation. We could have looked back at God from the middle of our circumstances and developed a distorted understanding of God. Instead, we went directly to Him and sought His perspective. The Holy Spirit took God's Word and revealed to us God's perspective on the end result of that circumstance. We believed God and adjusted our lives to Him and to what He was doing. Then we went through the circumstance looking for ways His purposes would be accomplished in ways that would bring Him glory. So when the answer to prayer came, I immediately knew that my job was to glorify God with everyone I could. In the process we came to know God in a new way because of the compassion He showed us by revealing His perspective on our situation. Let me summarize how you can respond when circumstances are difficult or confusing.

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THE TRUTH OF YOUR CIRCUMSTANCE

DAY 3

You cannot know the truth of your circumstance until you have heard from God. In Exodus 5–6 Moses did as God instructed and asked Pharaoh to set the Israelites free. Pharaoh refused and multiplied their hardship. Then the people turned against Moses and criticized him for causing them so much trouble.

Moses' story really encourages me. The first three responses above are more like the ways we usually respond. If you haven't read Exodus 5–6, you may have the idea from what I have said that Moses picked response d. He didn't! He blamed God and accused Him of failing to do what He had promised. Moses said, "Lord, why have you caused trouble for this people? And why did you ever send me? 23 Ever since I went in to Pharaoh to speak in your name he has caused trouble for this people, and you haven't rescued your people at all" (Ex. 5:22–23). Moses was so discouraged he was ready to quit (see Ex. 6:12).

I'm glad God is patient with us! He took time to reveal His perspective to Moses. God explained He wanted Pharaoh to resist so the people could see God's mighty hand of deliverance. He wanted the people to know Him by experience as the great I AM. Learn from Moses' example. When you face confusing circumstances, don't blame God. Don't give up following Him. Go to God. Ask Him to reveal the truth of your circumstances. Ask Him to show you His perspective. Then wait on the Lord.

Radically orient your life to God. The most difficult thing you will ever have to do is deny self, take up your cross, and follow Him. The most challenging part of your relationship with God is being God-centered. If you recorded a day in your life, you might find that your prayers, your attitudes, your thoughts, and your actions are intensely self-centered. You may not see things from God's perspective; rather, you may try to explain to God what your perspective is. When He becomes the Lord of your life, He alone has the right to be: the Focus of your life; the Initiator in your life; the Director of your life. That is what it means for Him to be Lord.

HEARING FROM TRUTH

When the Holy Spirit talks to you, He reveals Truth. He communicates with you about a Person—about Jesus. Truth is a Person (see John 14:6)!

The disciples were in a boat during a storm, while Jesus slept at the back. If you had gone to those disciples in the middle of that tempest and asked them, "What is the truth of this situation?" what would they have said? "We perish!" Was that the

If you had asked the widow in her only son's funeral procession, "What's the truth of this situation?" she might have replied, "My husband died several years ago. I had one son, and I anticipated he would comfort and care for me in my old age. Now my son is dead, and I must live the rest of my life without anyone to care for me." Was that the truth?

No, Truth was standing in front of her! When Truth reached out, touched her son, and restored him, everything changed. You never know the truth of any situation until you have heard from Jesus. When Jesus revealed Himself in this circumstance, "fear came over everyone, and they glorified God, saying, 'A great prophet has risen among us,' and 'God has visited his people.' This report about him went throughout Judea and all the vicinity." (Luke 7:16-17). Never determine the truth of a situation only by looking at the circumstances. Don't evaluate your situation until you have heard from Jesus. He is Truth.

I wonder whether God ever tests our faith as He did Philip's. Does He say, "Feed the multitudes," and our church responds, "Our budget can't do it"? If you had asked the disciples about the truth of that situation, they might have said, "We can't do it. Lord, the truth is that this situation is impossible." Was that correct? No. We know the other half of the story. Wouldn't we be better off if we trusted God with the other half of the story in our lives? Truth Himself fed five thousand men, plus their families, and had 12 baskets full of leftovers!

Suppose God says to your church, "Take the gospel to the whole world," and the church says, "We can't. We're too small." Truth stands in the middle of that church, as the Head of that congregation, to say, "Believe Me. I will never give you an order without releasing My power to enable it to happen. Trust Me and obey Me, and it will happen."

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SPIRITUAL MARKERS

The diagrams I used for circumstances (pp. 118–20) may imply that the circumstance is a bad situation. That is not always the case. Sometimes the circumstance is a decision-making situation. In a decision-making time your greatest difficulty may not be choosing between good and bad but choosing between good and best. You may have several options that appear to be equally attractive. At a time like this, begin by saying with all your heart, "Lord, whatever I know to be Your will, I will do it. Regardless of the cost and regardless of the adjustment, I commit myself ahead of time to follow Your will. Lord, no matter what that will looks like, I will do it!"

If you cannot say that when you begin to seek God's will, you do not mean "Thy will be done" (Matt. 6:10, KJV). Instead, you mean "Thy will be done as long as it does not conflict with my will." Two words in a Christian's language cannot go together: "No, Lord." If you say no to God, He is not your Lord. If He really is your Lord, your answer must always be yes, Lord. In decision making, always begin at this point. Do not proceed until you can honestly say, "Whatever You ask of me, Lord., my answer is 'yes!"

command them: Take twelve stones from this place in the middle of the Jordan where the priests are standing, carry them with you, and set them down at the place where you spend the night." (Josh. 4:2-3). These stones were to serve as a sign to the Israelites. Joshua explained, "In the future, when your children ask you, 'What do these stones mean to you?' you should tell them, 'The water of the Jordan was cut off in front of the ark of the LORD's covenant. When it crossed the Jordan, the Jordan's water was cut off.' Therefore these stones will always be a memorial for the Israelites" (Josh. 4:6-7). The stones were to remind the people of God's mighty act on their behalf. On many other occasions people built altars or set up stones as a reminder of significant encounters with God.

Often people in the Old Testament set up stone markers or altars as reminders of their encounters with God. Places like Bethel (house of God) and Rehoboth (room) became reminders of God's great activity in the midst of His people. Moses named an altar The Lord is my Banner, and Samuel called a stone Ebenezer, saying, "The LORD has helped us" (1 Sam. 7:12). These altars and stones became physical markers of great spiritual encounters with God. They provided opportunities for people to teach their children about God's activity on behalf of His people.


SEEING GOD'S PERSPECTIVE

God works in sequence to accomplish His divine purposes. What He did in the past was accomplished with a Kingdom purpose in mind. What He is doing in the present is in sequence with the past and with the same Kingdom purpose. Every act of God builds on the past, with a view toward the future.

When God called Abraham (see Gen. 12), He began to develop a people for Himself. When He came to Isaac, Isaac saw God's perspective when God reminded him of His relationship with Isaac's father, Abraham (see Gen. 26:24). To Jacob God identified Himself as the God of Abraham and Isaac (see Gen. 28:13). When God encountered Moses, He helped Moses see His perspective on what He was doing through history. He said 'He was the God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob (see Ex. 3:6-10). At each new step in His divine plan, God involved a person. Often in the call God rehearsed His previous activity so the individual could see God's perspective on what was happening at that moment.

Throughout Deuteronomy Moses reviewed all God had done for Israel. God was preparing to move the people into the promised land, and He wanted His people to have the perspective of history as they took this new step. In Deuteronomy 29 Moses briefly summarized the nation's history. At this time of covenant renewal, Moses wanted to remind the people to be faithful in following God. They were getting ready to change leaders (from Moses to Joshua) and move into the promised land. They needed to see this new direction from God's perspective. Israel needed to see their current undertaking was in line with all God had done previously.

In the diagram on the inside back cover, God's purposes are illustrated by the arrow at the top of the diagram.

Do you see what God was doing with Moses? He was helping him see his call from God's perspective.

- God had been working with Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, and even Moses' father to build a nation.
- God had promised Abraham He would bring the people out of bondage and give them the promised land.
- · God had been watching over them in Egypt.
- · Now He was responding to their suffering.



Israel needed to see the new direction was in line with all God had done previously.

- God had chosen to involve Moses in His divine purpose for Israel. He was going to use Moses to deliver the Israelites from Egypt and plunder the Egyptians at the same time.
- After Moses obeyed, God would bring them to this very mountain to worship. This worship service on the mountain would be Moses' sign God had sent him.

God wants to involve you in His purposes. God has been working in the world all along (see John 5:17). He was accomplishing His purposes for your life prior to your birth, and He has been active in your life since you were born. God said to Jeremiah the prophet, "Before I formed you in the womb; I set you apart before you were born. I appointed you a prophet to the nations" (Jer. 1:5). When God is ready for you to take a new step or direction in His activity, it will always be in sequence with what He has already been doing in your life. He does not go off on tangents or take meaningless detours. He builds your character in an orderly fashion with a divine purpose in mind.

A SPIRITUAL INVENTORY

I have found it helpful to identify spiritual markers in my life. Each time I have encountered God's call or directions for my life, I have mentally built a spiritual marker at that point. A spiritual marker identifies a time of transition, decision, or direction when I clearly know God has guided me. Over time I can look back at these spiritual markers and see how God has faithfully directed my life according to His divine purpose.

When I face a decision about God's direction, I review those spiritual markers. I don't take the next step without the context of God's full activity in my life. This helps me see God's perspective for my past and present. Then I examine the options before me, looking to see which direction is most consistent with what God has been doing in my life. Often one of these opportunities will be right in line with what God has already been doing. If none of the directions seem consistent, I continue to pray and wait on the Lord's guidance. When circumstances do not align with what God is saying in the Bible and in prayer, I assume the timing may be wrong. I then wait for God to reveal His timing.

My heritage goes back to England, where a number of my family were graduates of Spurgeon's College at a time when Charles Spurgeon was trying to win England to Christ. I grew up in a town in Canada where an evangelical witness for Christ was desperately needed. My father served as a lay pastor to help start a mission church in that town. In my teen years I began to sense a deep burden for communities all across Canada that did not have an evangelical church. When I was in seminary, God assured me He loved my nation enough to want to bring a great movement of His Spirit across our land. When I accepted God's call to go to Saskatoon as a pastor, God used the prospect of a spiritual awakening there to affirm my call. While I was in Saskatoon, a spiritual awakening erupted in that city and spread throughout Canada and across the world.

One day a man called me and said, "Henry, for more than two years we have prayed about filling a position for the Office for Prayer and Spiritual Awakening. Would you consider coming and directing our denomination in the area of spiritual awakening?"

As I reviewed God's activity in my life (my spiritual markers), I saw that an emphasis on spiritual awakening was an important element throughout my ministry. I said, "You could have asked me to do anything else in the world, and I would not have considered leaving what I am doing, but spiritual awakening has been a deep current that has run through my life since the time I was a teenager." After much prayer and confirmation in the Word and by other believers, I accepted the position. God didn't shift me; He focused me on something He had been doing throughout the course of my life.

Prepare a spiritual inventory of your life and identify your spiritual markers. These may begin with your heritage, your salvation experience, and times you made significant decisions about your future. What are some times of transition, decision, or direction in your life when you clearly knew that God guided you? Using a separate sheet of paper, your spiritual journal, or a notebook, start preparing a list. If God used specific Scriptures to speak during those times, record the Scriptures. Add to it as you continue to reflect and pray about God's activity in your life.

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DAY 5

GOD SPEAKS THROUGH THE CHURCH

As I function in relationship to the church, I depend on others in the church to help me understand God's will.

The Holy Spirit speaks to us through God's people, the local church. Later in this course we will devote a whole unit to ways a church hears and understands God's will. Today we will look at some ways you can understand God's will through the church.

THE BODY OF CHRIST


One problem many churches face today is they have so emphasized the doctrine of the priesthood of believers they have lost their sense of corporate identity. What does that mean in simple words? Christians think their walk with God is independent of anyone else and they are not accountable to the church. It is true Christians have direct access to God through Christ. However, God created the church as His redemptive agent in the world. He has a purpose for the church. God places every member in a church to accomplish His redemptive purposes through that congregation.

A church is a body—the body of Christ (see 1 Cor. 12:27). Jesus Christ is the Head of every local church (see **Eph. 4:15**), and God places every member in the body as it pleases Him (see 1 Cor. 12:18). The Holy Spirit manifests Himself to every person for the common good (see 1 Cor. 12:7). The Father fits together the whole body (see Eph. 5:16), and the Holy Spirit enables and equips members to function where the Father has placed them in the body. The body builds itself up until every member experiences the fullness of Christ (see Eph. 4:13). God made us mutually interdependent. We need one another. What one lacks, others in the body can supply.

What God is doing in and through the body is essential to my knowing how to respond to Him. When I see Him working in my church, I immediately adjust and put my life in that place too. In the church I let God use me in any way He chooses to complete His work in other members. This was Paul's goal when he said, "We proclaim him, awarning and teaching everyone with all wisdom, so that we may present everyone mature in Christ." (Col. 1:28). Paul constantly asked believers to become vitally involved with his life and ministry. The effectiveness of Paul's ministry rested on them (see Eph. 6:19; Col. 4:3; 2 Thess. 3:1–2).

Without the ear the rest of the body may not know when or how to respond. Every member needs to listen to what the other members say. If the members are not talking about what they sense God is doing in their midst, the whole body will be disoriented to God.

ALLOW GOD TO SPEAK THROUGH THE CHURCH

As I function in relationship to the church, I depend on others in the congregation to help me understand God's will. Let me illustrate this for you. Then in unit 10 we will spend more time studying the way members function as part of a body.

While I was in seminary, I was involved in a local church. The first year I taught teenage boys, and I did so with a willing heart. The next year I was asked to be the music and education director. I had never done either job in my life. I had sung in a choir, but I had never led congregational music. I knew nothing about directing the educational program of a church. Here is the way I approached this decision.

The people of God at this church needed a leader. As they prayed, they sensed God had purposely put me there to meet that need. I also saw the need and realized

As a servant of Jesus Christ, I did not have the option to say no. I believed the Head—Jesus Christ—could speak through the rest of the body to guide me to know how I should function in their midst. I said I would do my best.

For two years I served as the music and education director. Then the church voted to call me to be their pastor. I hadn't preached three sermons in my life. I had not gone to seminary because I felt called to be a pastor, but I had gone because I felt called by God into a relationship with Him for whatever He had in mind. I sensed I needed theological training so I would have tools with which to serve God. I didn't say, "I am going into foreign missions or home missions." I didn't confine myself to music or education or preaching. I said, "Lord, whatever You direct me to do in relation to Your body, that is what I will do. I am Your servant for Your purposes." I agreed to be the church's pastor.

In the church a need does not constitute the call. A need, however, is not to be ignored. Don't be afraid to let the body of believers assist you in knowing God's will. Also keep in mind that one individual is not the church. In the final analysis you must take all the counsel of people and go to God for clear direction. You will find that a number of things will begin to line up. When what you hear from the Bible, prayer, circumstances, and the church says the same thing, you can proceed with confidence.

You may say, "Henry, you don't know my church. I can't depend on them to help me know God's will." Be careful. When you say that, you have said more about what you believe about God than what you believe about your church. You are saying, "Henry, not even God can work through these people. He is not powerful enough." I don't think you believe that in your mind, but what you do says more about what you believe about God than what you say. This is the point where we need to focus on the crisis of belief. When God speaks, you have to decide what you really believe about God and act on it.
