Day One

- 1. Read Psalm 139 This Psalm was written by David, the 2nd king over Israel. He wrote over half of the Psalms in this book of the Bible and is regarded by Christians, Jews, and Muslims and others to be one of the greatest authors of all time. His words are honest and powerful, but more importantly, they are the inspired Words of God given to David and to all who read them. God had a heart for David and David, as the Bible says was "a man after God's own heart." In spite of this lofty title, David was a frail and failing human who lived a dynamic yet often tortured life. He committed murder and adultery. Suffered the loss of a newborn child, the rebellion and attempted murder of his own son, the tragic death of his best friend, and the bitter attacks of his one-time mentor and former king of Israel. We can learn a lot not only from his life but from the words he shared in his many writings.

From my heart to yours...

In 2004, two weeks before Christmas, I discovered that my husband had been emotionally and sexually unfaithful with a woman for nearly a year. I cannot bear to relive the moments of anguish I went through that evening when I found the truth. The pain was crushing like a physical weight on my soul, sapping the breath and life from me. I wept bitter broken tears. The ache was horrendous. I wouldn't wish it upon anyone. Over the next hours I screamed at God not in anger towards Him, but in desperation to release the betrayal my body was absorbing. I shuddered at the images that invaded my mind. I cringed at the months I had lived under the same roof with a man who had broken the most sacred of vows. I trembled under the physical and emotional shock in my body.

Alone at home, as the days went forward, I spent hours on my knees in prayer. Where do I

go? Who will deliver me from this pain? Can I ever move on? What next? Where? Help me, Oh, God.

I wanted to die. I wanted to vanish. I wanted the pain to end. Christmas day was coming and I had no desire to celebrate.

I sat and stared. (What next) The anger had seethed into desperate hurt.

The tree was already up and decorated, presents had already been

wrapped and placed, holiday plans made and now. . . what? On Christmas Eve, after kissing my son goodnight, I went back downstairs and sat on the sofa next to the tree. Alone with my thoughts in a dark, empty home. The only lights on in the house were the white lights of the tree. I just sat and stared and thought. What next? The shocked and anger had seethed into desperate hurt. I wept and stared some more.

Looking at the tree, I saw the ornaments from each of our Christmases together. Our first Christmas as an engaged couple – skis from Mammoth – Our first Christmas as a married couple – a little house – Our first Christmas with a baby – a little baby in a manger...every ornament hanging on that tree represented a year of our life and I felt that I wanted to crush every one of them, throw them all in the fireplace and burn them up.

Thoughts of my sweet eight-year-old son sleeping upstairs and looking forward to Christmas morning kept me from doing something rash. Instead I clutched the sofa and screamed out a silent scream lifting my head and wailing to God, "I'm so afraid! I'm so hurt! What do you want me to do?" I heaved and hiccupped through the tears and when I could breathe again I heard a whisper in my heart, "Forgive him."

I wanted the pain and fear to end.

I wanted the one who had caused the pain to pay.

I wanted to be free and whole and done and healed...but in no way was I ready to forgive. -

Too soon.

Too much pain.

But I had clearly asked God what to do. And He had clearly spoken.

Forgive.

Sister, I have no earthly explanation for what took place in my spirit in the next hours, but I do know this...I had presented my request to God, "What do I do?" and He had answered. When I released the tension in my shoulders. When I unclenched my fists from the edge of the sofa. When I breathed out and breathed in again, a tranquility came over me that defies understanding. These Words of God became more real to me in that moment than ever in my life, "Do not be anxious about anything, but in

everything by prayer...present your requests to God. And the peace of God which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus." (Philippians 4)

Rut I had clearly asked God what to do. And He had clearly spoken. Forque.

My heart felt the protective guard of His peace. I could breathe. I didn't know how I could forgive, but I could breathe and I could trust God to show me how to forgive sometime eventually at least. And so, I called my husband and told him to come for Christmas morning. The season of healing and repair to our marriage that began that night continued on Christmas morning when I told Glen that I forgave him. He wept and we held strong for our young son and let him have a beautiful and memorable Christmas morning. The Gospel, brought by the angels means, "good news or good tidings." The angel that greeted the shepherds and announced the beautiful

truth of the birth of the promised Messiah said, "Fear not, I bring you good news of great joy..." This very Jesus spoke good tidings into my fearful, aching heart the night before. The fear and anguish in my heart gave way to healing and hope.

Do you see it? After reading and studying through Psalm 139 are you beginning to see the power of the truth of God? God's truth is the firm foundation I stood on during these times. God's truth, not the ache,

not the pain, not the brokenness and sense of total loss...God knew me, loved me, had a plan for me...and all these truths were true for my husband as well.

It was this truth that saved me. This truth will save you too. Get to know the God of the Bible. Read it daily. Pray and continue to grow in your faith and understanding of God. It's the only reliable source of truth and hope you have.

~ This Week's Focus ~

The most important voice for you to hear and believe is God's. The most essential way to hear that begins by reading His Words for yourself.

Day One - Read Psalm 119:1-40

Psalm 119 is one of the most unique chapters in the Bible. That's clear enough reading it in English, but reading it in Hebrew is even more amazing. When you read it in Hebrew you see the beauty of the structure. Psalm 119 is divided into 22 sections: one for each letter of the Hebrew alphabet. Each section is composed of 8 verses and each verse begins with the same Hebrew letter. It's not only beautifully written, it's got a purpose! It's special kind of poem that makes learning the word easy and you might have learned this way in school. This kind of poem is known as an acrostic. Each verse contains a special word pertaining to God's commandments, law, ordinances, word, judgments, statutes, precepts and decrees.

Over the next several days, as we study this Psalm, my heart is that you will come away with a renewed passion to be in God's Word and a bigger picture of who Jesus is.

1. From Psalm 119:1-40 Make a note of several verses you read that shows how King David* feels about God's word.

While studying, we want to see David as our inspiration and role model. Inspired by the Holy Spirit (Hebrew: the ruach chodesh), he wrote this Psalm over 3000 years ago and yet reading it today I feel that David could be sitting across from me sharing his heart. The Bible says that God called David a "man after His own heart." That is high praise and calls me to want to get to know David all the more through this Psalm.

*David is not named as the author. Some think it might have been the prophet Ezra. However, tradition and scholars tend to agree that David was, so for our study I'll be referring to King David as the author.

2. David makes requests of God in verses 17-40. List several here:

- 3. What does this say about David's priorities and understanding of God's Word?
- 4. What did David do when he was discouraged? Write a verse from this selection that stands out to you. Consider committing it to memory.

Day Two-Read Psalm 119:41-12

5. David frequently writes that he is expecting God to keep His promise, remember His word, etc. Write one or more of those verses here:

6. What does Psalm 119:43 say about where David's hope is?

This is the verse where the word "hope" first appears, but as you can see from reading so far, much of the first 48 verses speak to our hearts with words that remind us of feeling hopeless. And where again and again does David find hope? God's Word. In fact, David so treasures God's Word that after 42 verses of recounting how deliberately he needs, wants, works for, memorizes, treasures, recounts, and obeys God's Word He asks God to not take – literally "snatch" – the "word of truth" from his mouth.

Does this strike you as odd? Why would he even be concerned that God do such a thing? Well, David's been through a lot – A LOT – and by "a lot" I mean serious sinful behavior.

7. Read Psalm 119:49-50

What a strong thought! From verse 49, write what David wants God to do and why. Then from verse 50 write from where David draws comfort:

Day Three - Read Psalm 119:13-104 & Psalm 51

8. The introduction in your Bible will give you a reminder about why David wrote Psalm 51. He had broken the word of God. He had sinned by coveting, murdering, lying, committing adultery. What does he say to God in verse 11?

What does he say in 51:15?

9. Before that in verse 11 he cried out for God NOT to cast him away or take His Holy Spirit, and later in Psalm 119:43 he pleads again, don't take this from me! What does this say about David's priorities? Write your thoughts here:

10. Write down the verses that show David's desperation for God's word:

Have you put your hope in God's judgments? Is what He has decided final enough for you? David had most definitely been on the receiving end of God's judgment. In fact, David and Bathsheba committed adultery, conceived a child, and part of God's judgment on their sin was that their child would die. Harsh and so painful! And yet, David can come before the Lord and say that he has "hope in your judgment." This hope is because of David's confidence in the righteousness of God. That is why we can hope in the Word of God. It is right. It is true. It is not going to fail us even when we fail Him.

Day Four - Read Psalm 119:105-136

11. In Psalm 119 we see at least FIVE verses where David repeats this phrase "I have put my hope in your word." Write Psalm 119:114:

12. David writes often of what he has done as well as what he wants God to do. List some of David's written expectations here:

15. Read Psalm 119:143-144 Think about a time of deep struggle, sadness, difficulty in your life. Rewrite these verses in your own words. Instead of "trouble and anguish" (ESV) name the specific life circumstance that you think of when you consider this verse. Instead of "your commandments" list a specific verse or verses from Psalm 119 that you have found delight in.

Persevering through trial and truly living out the Word of God is possible when we are in relationship with Christ.

Day One - Read James

Today, as we kick-off our James study, let's read and meditate on the entire book. It's only 5 chapters and can be read in one sitting. Take notes as you read. The remaining days of our study will break down each chapter and several verses for a closer look. But today is a straight read-through. Just like you would read through someone's letter - start to finish - we'll read through this letter from James. You wouldn't get a letter in the mail and read a few sentences from the middle, then jump to the beginning, then the end again – right? We want to engage in Scripture with the same approach. Let's understand this book as a whole before we dig deeper.

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Day Three - Read James 1:1-8

There are four men named James in the New Testament. Which one wrote this letter? It is widely accepted by biblical scholars to be the half-brother of Jesus, also called "James the Just." James had rejected Jesus as Messiah (John 7:5) until after His resurrection (1 Cor. 15:7) when Jesus appeared to him. Then in Acts and Galatians we see James active as a key leader in the growing church at Jerusalem. In Galatians 2:9 Paul refers to James as one of the pillars of the church along with Peter and John. As you read through James keep this background in mind. James, once a skeptic, perhaps a bitter half-brother, confused and maybe estranged in his relationship to Jesus before His resurrection, is now enthusiastically writing to teach and encourage others. Consider the huge shift in James' heart and mind that must have taken place. Now he has written, under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, a letter that has been read for over 2000 years by millions and millions of people. It influenced the thinking of the early church and still influences you and me today. Thank God for changed hearts! Thank God for James and his faithful ministry.

- 7. In what way do these verses point you to your need for a Savior in Jesus Christ?

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Day Three – Read James 3:5-8

- James 3:5 refers to the tongue as a ______ yet it does what?_____ Have you seen this to be true in your own life? Explain:
- 2. Comparing the power of the tongue to a wildfire hits close to home for those of us raised in Southern California. Fire season is a real threat and comes every year with terrible loss of property and life. In James 3:6 what do you think James means when he says "setting on fire the entire course of life" and "set on fire by hell?"
- 3. James 3:7-8 warns that no "human being" can tame the tongue. Yet this passage is a reminder of the mandate given to Adam at creation that man was given dominion over the animals. If man is given dominion (Genesis 1:26) over something as untamable as wild animals and yet they can be tamed who can be given dominion over our tongues and therefore we have hope for its taming? Consider James 1:16-18 and 26.
- 4. Read Psalm 19:1-14 How can one give dominion of their tongue to Jesus? Where does it start? List truths you find in this Psalm that point you to the right way of thinking that it takes in order for you to tame your tongue what you read about who God is, what God does, what His Word is like, etc.:

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As followers of Christ, our lives should be characterized by total complete surrender to the Father and total transformation of our will.

Day One - Read James chapter four

Read <u>James 4:1-17</u> Use the next page or your Bible study journal/notebook to write any notes, thoughts, questions, even drawings, that will help you engage and understand the Scripture. <u>Before you read</u>, pray that God would open the eyes of your heart to see clearly the wonders in His word (<u>Psalm 119:18</u>) and that He would give you wisdom (James 1:5) to grasp and apply what you are reading.

1. All through his epistle, James has used questions to help us think and grasp the point. List the questions he uses in this chapter: (There are at least 6)

What causes quarrels and fights? 4:1

Is it not that your passions are at war? 4:1 Do you not know that friendship with the world is enmity with God? 4:4 Do you suppose it is to no purpose that he Scripture says, "He yearns jealously over the spirit that he has made to dwelling in us? 4:5 But who are you to judge your neighbor? 4:12 What is your life? 4:14

 Because you prayed before beginning your reading, God has answered your prayer as you read. I am confident of this. It's a prayer that He will always answer with "Yes!" Now, based on what you read, write a few thoughts about what really captured your heart and mind from these verses:

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- Notes from James 4:1-17 -

Day Two - Read James 4:1-3

Read <u>James 4:1-3</u> after praying for wisdom and understanding. Then answer the following:

1. As you read these verses, list the actions/behaviors that James calls out:

Quarrels, fights, murder, coveting, not asking

- 2. Maybe you relate to one or more of the sins listed in verse one? I know I do. Go back to question #1 and mark which one or more of the above you have done in your life. Be honest. (Don't worry. No one will be judging you.) Which one(s) have you <u>not</u> done? (Women might possibly list "murder" which will be addressed in Question #3)
- 3. Read <u>Matthew 5:21-26</u>. What does Jesus say about murder and hatred? *Hating someone is the same as murdering them in your heart*.

What point is He making about the state of our heart versus our actions? That what we think in our heart is as/or more important than our actions. Guard our hearts!

4. Read <u>1 John 3:15</u>. How do John's words echo Christ's from Matthew 5:21-26?
 If you hate someone you are a murderer.

If you have hatred toward someone today, take a moment right now to pause with no excuses about their behavior or thoughts about how much they deserve it, and simply confess your hatred and ask God to search you and see if there is any offensive way in you (Psalm 139:23-24) and to give you a new heart – His heart toward that person (Deut. 30:6)

5. There's that word "desire" again. James spoke of it directly in chapter one verses 14-15, alluded to our desires again in chapters two and three, and now he reminds us about our desires in verse two. What kind of desire is he speaking of in <u>4:2</u>?

Selfish desire, envy, covetousness

What **should** we desire? Begin with the following passages and as time permits, do a word study on "desire/s" and make note of what God teaches about what we should be desiring.

<u>Psalm 37:4</u> Delight in the Lord – desires of you heart.

<u>Psalm 19:7-11</u> Desire his Word

<u>1 Corinthians 12:31</u> Desire the higher gifts

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6. According to James 4:2-3, why don't we have what we desire?

Because we do not ask and when we do ask we ask with wrong motives – selfishness.

What do you think are examples of selfish motives in our prayer life? Consider any Scripture to back up your thoughts.

What do you think are examples of pure motives? What Scripture do you think supports your answer?

7. How should we pray then? Well, the disciples asked that question of Jesus, and Jesus answered. Read <u>Matthew 6:5-13</u> and <u>Matthew 6:33-34</u> then prayerfully consider how you are talking to God about what you want. Ask God to reveal any selfish motives you have. Ask Him to mature you in your prayer life and continue to make you more like Jesus who prayed, "not my will but Yours be done." (<u>Luke 22:42</u>)

Day Three - Read James 4:4-6

Read <u>James 4:4-6</u> after praying for wisdom and understanding. Then answer the following:

- Ouch! What harsh word does James call the people? _____ Why? (review 4:1-5) (adulterous)
 Quarrels, fights, murder, coveting, not asking, asking w/out pure motives
- 2. Imagery of adultery was written throughout the Old Testament as God cultivated relationship with His chosen people. A simple word study will bring up scores of verses that relate to this. God wants an exclusive relationship with His people. What is the essential nature of an act of adultery?

Betraying one's spouse - you are supposed to be committed by vow and action to one spouse. Don't cheat on them with another person. How then does adultery relate to the follower of Christ and how she behaves? Consider <u>2 Corinthians 11:2</u> and <u>Revelation 19:7-9</u> We, as believers/the Church are the Bride of Christ. We should be faithful to Him and not cheat on Him with worldliness.

- 3. Write James 4:4 in your own words. Use a dictionary or thesaurus to help you. You are like unfaithful wives, flirting with the glamour of this world, and never realising that to be the world's lover means becoming the enemy of God! (J·B· Phillips translation)
- 4. What happens when we make "friends with the world" (in the sinful/ungodly sense)? We make enemies of God· He is jealous for us like a faithful spouse would be·

5. Read <u>Exodus 20:5</u> (which is in a context that I'm sure you'll find familiar). Consider this verse now in light of James 4:5. Explain God's desire toward us and expectations of us as His faithful children in your own words. How serious does God take this?

God wants exclusive relationship with us. So much so that He placed it in His holy commands!

- 6. What does James says that God gives more of? ______ (grace)
- 7. To whom does God extend His grace? _____ (the humble)

As you conclude, prayerfully consider ways in which you are prone to get friendly with the world in a way that might be demonstrating pride in yourself and your ability to "handle" it. Ask God to reveal to you any areas in your life in which you need to be more humble and faithful to Him.

Day Four - Read James 4:1-12

Read <u>James 4:7-12</u> after praying for wisdom and understanding. Then answer the following:

1. List the command verbs in James 4:7-12 (Hint: there are at least 10)

Submit to God, resist the devil, draw near to god, cleanse your hands, purify your hearts, be wretched, mourn, weep, let laughter be turned to mourning, joy to gloom, humble yourself.

Go back and connect the command/promise combinations from these verses. (You do this...God will do that...)

- Feeling the presence of the Devil and his influences? What should you do? (4:7b)
 Resist and he will flee
- Don't feel near to God? What should you do? (4:8)
 Draw near to God

Is this accurate to what God's word actually says, though? Should we never judge and just be ok that everyone lives any way they want? Why or why not? Use Scripture to support your response:

No. God has set his law in our hearts. Man knows right from wrong. We should be like John the Baptist and call out sin and remind people of their need for repentance. Luke 3:7-18

As you conclude today, prayerfully consider how accurately you are grasping the heart of God toward sin in your own life as well as how willing you are to live a life that helps others grasp the heart of God and the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

Day Five - Read James 4:13-11

Read James 4:13-17 after praying for wisdom and understanding. Then answer the following:

- 7. So, how will that look then when you go to bed and think through your plans for the coming day?





11. As a child of God, you are redeemed. You don't have to pay the penalty of your sin. Jesus paid the ultimate price for your sins! How does this fact motivate you toward holy living?

Interesting to Note

The Greek phrase Peter wrote in 1:13, "preparing your minds for action" is literally translated: "girding up the loins of your mind" and is a word picture used only this one time in the Bible. Read Exodus 12:11 where God instructs His people how they are to eat that first Passover in a manner of total readiness to get out of Egypt because of God's impending deliverance. In the time of Peter's writing and as far back as they could remember, men and women wore tunics. Tunics were cinched about the middle by a belt or girdle. They were comfortable and cooling in the heat of the land, but you can imagine that the tunic would get in the way when fighting or even completing chores. For example, when ancient Hebrew men had to battle or escape persecution they would lift the base of their tunic and tuck it into their belt or tie it in a knot to keep it off the ground. Now they basically had a pair of shorts that allowed them to move. So, saying, "gird up your loins" was to tell the people to get ready for hard work or battle. Consider Peter's interesting and descriptive phrase here. He is telling us to do the same with our mind. Get ready for battle! Don't let anything hinder you! As you continue through 1 Peter, notice other ways he connects how God's people were (Old Testament) to how God's people now are (New Testament.)

Day Three - 1 Peter 2:1-25

Before you read, pray that God would open the eyes of your heart to see clearly the wonders in His word (Psalm 119:18) and that He would give you wisdom (James 1:5) to grasp and apply what you are reading. Read 1 Peter chapter two. Review your notes from day one, and add any new insights, questions, or comments you have.

11. Read 1 Peter 3:8-16 Summarize by listing the distinct behaviors Peter is asking "all of you" (that means us too) to have:

Unity of mind, sympathy, brotherly love, tender heart, humble mind, not vengeful, bless others, suffer for righteousness, have no fear, honor Christ, be prepared to answer why you have such hope, be gentle, respectful, good conscience.

- 12. How would you say that these behaviors stand in contrast to the way the "world" behaves at home or in the workplace and the way the obedient Christian does?
 The world is literally motivated by the exact opposite behaviors. An obedient Christian should exemplify all of these.
- 13. What are we to do with Christ in our hearts? (3:15) Hint: Read this in several versions to help with clarity. Honor Christ as holy in our hearts
- 14. Why would anyone "ask you for a reason for your hope"?
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Because, in spite of all that you are going through you are of high moral and spiritual behavior when you should, by all rights, be all the opposite

- 15. What distinction in "suffering" does Peter make in 3:17 and in 2:20? One is suffering for doing good and the other is getting punished for doing evil·
- 16. Memorize 1 Peter 3:18 as one of the most succinct descriptions of purpose and plan for Christ's death and resurrection. Write it here then paraphrase it:

"For Christ also suffered once for sins, the righteous for the unrighteous, that he might bring us to God being put to death in the flesh buy made alive in the spirit."

Remember that Christ the just suffered for us the unjust, to bring us to God. That meant the death of his body, but he came to life again in the spirit. (Phillips)

- 17. Read 1 Peter 3:9-22. How does baptism relate to Noah being spared in the ark?
 Noah was spared for his obedience and faith. The water is a symbol of that sparing. What drowned the others saved him.
- 18. What did Jesus do after he had resurrected and was "in the spirit?" (3:19)

He proclaimed to the spirits in prison Why? (v20)

Does this mean they (the ones He proclaimed to) were given a second chance to repent? Explain. (Read <u>Hebrews 9:27</u> for refresher on the foundational truth taught in God's Word about what happens after we die.)

No· we are given one chance· After we die comes the judgment·

19. Does baptism save us? Explain. (Keep in mind the context of this passage that Peter is addressing believers who are being persecuted, admonishing them to remain obedient, and reviewing with them the truth – like you just did in #16 – of the resurrection of Christ.)

 $No \cdot Baptism$ is an appeal to God for a good conscience through the resurrection of Jesus \cdot

- 3. What does Peter mean in verse 1 when he says that "he who has suffered in the flesh has ceased from sin"? Is he saying that if we suffer we are now sinless? Consider the following to support your answer:

Ecclesiastes 7:20; Romans 6:5-7; 1 John 1:8-9; 3:9 No, we are still sinners, yet we are being made like Christ. We are being sanctified through our righteous suffering

4. How do the true followers of Christ "surprise" the rest of the world by their behaviors and what will they ultimately do with what they have seen in you? (4:4-6)

They are surprised because you don't act the way of the flesh. They will give an account to him who is ready to judge the living and the dead.

5. Read 1 Peter 4:6

Considering the final phrase of this verse, who are "those" who are dead?

□ Believers or □ Non-Believers

How have those who are dead been judged?

How will they then live?

So, is this verse referring to dead sinners getting a second chance or to believers who, having suffered, are alive in the spirit? Explain:

These are believers who are now alive in the spirit.

6. Read 1 Peter 4:7-11 How should the knowledge that the "end or all things" is at hand influence us as believers?

We should be self-controlled, sober minded, loving one another, show hospitality, no grumbling, serve, be good stewards,
