Yesterday we looked at the six areas that the author of Hebrews wants mature believers to be established in. How's your understanding of these six concepts? The author of Hebrews had a warning for his audience because they didn't have a grasp of them. Do you? Let's look a little closer at each one and see how we are doing in our personal maturity and understanding. **NOTE:** There are a lot of references to look up in today's study. If you're new at thumbing through the Word, this might go slowly for you. Don't be discouraged. Do at least one reference from each section. You'll get more familiar with the Bible as you continue to study. It's so rewarding! Also, if you use the online version of this study, all of the references are linked directly to BibleGateway. Email me if you need any help.

1. Hebrews 6:1 - <u>Repentance from dead works</u>. Repentance means literally "to change one's mind" from the Greek *meta/change + noia/mind*.

 Hebrews 6:2 – <u>Instruction about washings</u>. The Greek phrase occurs only this one time in the Bible: *baptismon didachen*. This refers to the difference between washings in the Mosaic law and Christian baptism. The Jews knew about washings of the Mosaic law, and they had been taught about baptism into Christ.

Acts 19:1-6 – In whose name were they baptized and what was the result?

Acts 1:5; 2:38 and Mark 1:4-8 – What kind of baptism do Christians believe in?

Understanding the basic "doctrines of Christ" is essential – literally foundational to our faith. But so many are either bored of it, ignorant of it, or dismissive of it. In this passage I hope that you have seen the need we have to grasp these essentials. They're nothing to be bored of, ignorant of, and certainly not dismissive of. I love the saying that our parents give us "roots and wings." This is exactly what our Heavenly Father, has modeled. Roots ground us and give us the nourishing start – wings allow us to live and demonstrate our faith by obedience. When it comes to maturity it's a process that involves growing from well-nourished roots onto soaring on strong wings. Is that you? Soaring? Maturing? Great! It's a wonderful feeling and it's exactly what you were created to do. If not, why? What's holding you back? Don't you think the times of ignorance are over? It's time to repent from baby food and be ready for maturity. Move on, be obedient, and be skilled in the word of righteousness.

If you came across a memo that read, "You all are not meeting the expectations around here. These messes have got to stop. We've gone over this before and if it doesn't change, big consequences are coming for each of you." What assumptions would you make about the author? She knows the people she's dealing with? She's in charge and has influence? What assumptions would you make about the recipients? They know better? They are aware of the expectations? If you found out that the memo was a Post-It note that your friend put on her fridge addressing her toddlers...what would you think? Pretty harsh, right? Overkill for kiddos, right? She needs some decaf, right? If, however, it was a memo on the fridge in the break room at a corporate office, written from an executive and directed to senior staffers, you'd nod and think they'd better get their act together, right? Knowing the audience and the author made the difference. The same goes here in our study of Hebrews. Unlike the other epistles of the Bible, Hebrews doesn't open with the typical greeting. With no formal greeting to a specific group of people anywhere in Hebrews, we get to play detective and collect information as we read.

→ BEFORE YOU BEGIN: In the introduction to this Bible study I asked that you NOT use any commentaries or even the notes in your Bible. I'm going to reiterate that request as you enter in to today's lesson. Trust the Holy Spirit. Just. Read. The. Word.

1. Collect information about the original recipients of this message. Note: <u>plural pronouns</u> are inclusive, e.g. "us, we, our" implies "you all and me" (the author). Will their end be "to be burned?" Believers can be burned up in the end? What?!!? Could this happen to you? It's a frightening prospect – I hope it is. We'll dig in to these verses today, and I'll be addressing these questions in the online study session for this day! Remember, you can join me every day "Live or Later" as we go through each lesson together. Tune in! Yesterday we flew over Hebrews 6:4-8. Today, let's look more closely. The word "enlightened" in your Bible come from the Greek $\phi\omega\tau\iota\sigma\theta\dot{e}v\tau\alpha\varsigma/ph\bar{o}tisthentas$. Can you see the English word here? Remember 7th grade science and learning about how plants make food from light? That's "photosynthesis," and it's the same Greek root.

In the agrarian culture of the day, there was a practice of starting over with soil that was producing bad crops, thorn, and thistles. A farmer would burn his land down to destroy the weeds. This would make the soil useful again.

God has made His desire clear to us through His Word and His Son – relationship. Draw near to me. Follow me. Learn from me. Like parents laying out before the family the details of a great trip that they have planned, the Father has laid before all of us His great plan – a plan so marvelous it culminates in everlasting, glorious life – and it's far greater than any trip we could imagine. In order for us to enjoy that plan we must take the trip according to His route. Any other route will lead to detours along dangerous and unfortunate paths, disappointment, and even extremely severe consequences. When Jesus spoke of those who come to Him he said, "whoever comes to me I will never cast out...for this is the will of my

The phrase translated "fallen away" is from the Greek word " $\pi \alpha \rho \alpha \pi \varepsilon \sigma \delta v \tau \alpha \varsigma / \rho a rapesontas"$ which has the sense of "having fallen to the side." This phrase is the final of the experiences listed in the "case of those who have once been enlightened ." The Jubilee 2000 and NET Bible versions translate this word with its implications in mind, and I think they are helpful. It is referring to an apostate or backslider - someone who had believed, but has fallen aside. Father, that everyone who looks on the Son and believes in him should have eternal life, and I will raise him up on the last day." (John 6:36-40.) So strong is His love for us that those who chose to follow and fall away he will give strong course correcting warnings to! The author of Hebrews likened that sort of falling away to crucifying Christ all over again – being counted amongst those Jews who had the blood of Jesus on their hands. It is my prayer that as you have studied this passage you have been honest with your position in Christ. Are you in danger of being cursed and burned – coming under the discipline and judgment of God because you have fallen away? If so, repent – change your mind! Turn from anything that is keeping you from maturing or risk the blow of burning discipline from God. "Do not regard lightly the discipline of the Lord."

*Hermeneutics is "the branch of knowledge that deals with interpretation, especially of the Bible or literary texts." Your hermeneutical approach to Scripture will determine whether you end up eisegeting (reading into what you think or feel) or exegeting (drawing out of what the author intended.) We covered how to study the Bible in the very first lesson. You can listen to that talk at www.DwellingRichly.Podbean.com or www.YouTube.com/c/JenniferRichmond "How to Study the Bible." Good hermeneutics flows like this:

- 1) Start with the **word or phrase** you are studying.
- 2) Move from there to the **immediate context** of the passage that word is in and its meaning.
- 3) From there move out to how the **author uses that word** in the rest of that epistle
- 4) Has the author written other books in the Bible? If so, see how he has used it in those books?
- 5) Where does the word/phrase occur elsewhere in Scripture? How is it used?
- 6) How is the word/phrase used in <u>extra-biblical writings</u> from that same time period?

Here's a visual look at a sound hermeneutical approach. When you want to know the meaning – and not just what it says – start in the center and move out.

The author brings his audience back to Abraham, and with that, a tender reminder of family and the sense that we're together in this. The mention of Abraham would have been nearly synonymous with "promise" - the two are inseparable.
