Thoughts from Pastor Gene

For this is what the high and lofty One says – he who lives forever, whose name is holy; I live in a high and holy pace, but also with him who is contrite and lowly in spirit, to revive the spirit of the lowly and to revive the heart of the contrite. (Isaiah 57:15)

The nation of Israel often wavered and strayed in its commitment to God. At times, the people were disloyal religiously and disobedient morally. Those abandoning Judaism went as far as engaging in sexual relations with prostitutes in fertility religions and offering their children as sacrifices to false gods. Pride, lust, violence, and injustice were widespread.

As a prophet, Isaiah faithfully spoke out against the people's involvement in false religions. He warned the people about their verbal attacks on the minority who were striving to be true to God. His words and the words of other prophets often fell on deaf ears. The wayward people seldom expressed a desire to repent and give up their sinful ways.

Interestingly, Isaiah stated that although heaven is God's home, God also lives with "him who is contrite and lowly in spirit." God knows when we are brokenhearted because of our wrongdoing. He knows when we give us our selfishness, defiance, indulgence, and defensiveness. He knows when we accept our guilt without making excuses or blaming others. He knows when we are remorseful. He knows when we are not thinking too highly of ourselves and understand our need of Him.

As we head into the fall, let's do a spiritual inventory. As Dr. Jim Denison has suggested, "Get alone with God. Take a piece of paper and a pen. Ask the Holy Spirit to bring to your mind anything that displeases God, and write down what comes to your thoughts. Be very specific and honest. Then confess these sins individually to God. Claim His promise to forgive all you confess. Shred the paper, and rejoice in the grace of your loving Father."
