



INFORMATION ABOUT VOTING

The POP Advocacy Team encourages you to exercise your right to vote. Here is the most current information on how you can cast your ballot. You will find much useful information on voting including a history of your voting record on myvote.wi.gov.

When are the upcoming Elections?

The primary for legislative and congressional races is Aug. 11 and the general election is Nov. 3. The Aug 11 primaries are held in races that have more than one Republican or more than one Democrat running in order to narrow the races for Nov. 3.

How do I register to Vote?

You can register to vote at myvote.wi.gov by mail, in a clerk's office (through the Friday prior to election day) or at the polls the day of.

You will need proof of residence such as a driver's license, utility bill or another supporting document. You will also have to provide a Wisconsin Driver's License or the last four digits of your social security number if you don't have a license.

The deadline for registering by mail to the above website is July 22nd for August 11th primary and Oct 14 for the Nov 3rd general election. You can also register at the Clerks office or at the polls on election day.

What are my options for Voting?

1. At the Polls on Election Day
2. At an early voting site ahead of the election
3. By Mail (July 22 was the last day for requesting absentee ballots.)

Who can vote Absentee in Wisconsin?

Wisconsin allows people to vote absentee for any reason as long as their registered to vote.

How do I get an absentee ballot?

Voters can request absentee ballots online, by mail or in person. You must request the ballot by 5 p.m. the Thursday before the Election.

When do ballots have to be returned?

To be counted, completed absentee ballots must be in the hands of clerks by 8 p.m. on election day. That means absentee ballots that are being mailed in must be provided to the post office at least a few days before then.

How does the Voter ID work?

Most voters must provide a copy of a photo ID to cast a ballot whether they are voting in person or by mail.

Do I need a witness to vote by mail?

Yes. Those who vote by mail must fill out their ballot in the presence of an adult witness. Witnesses are not supposed to view the voter's selections but must sign a certificate and provide their address. Signatures are very important and must be included for vote to be counted.

How can I vote early in person?

Voters can cast ballots in their clerk's office before election day. Check your local Clerk's office for time and availability to cast your vote.
