### How Often Do YOU Think About the Roman Empire?

Around the middle of last month, a certain meme began to rack up views on social media apps: women asking the men in their lives (husbands, boyfriends, fathers, etc.), "How often do you think about the Roman Empire?" The Internet was not prepared for the answer- many, perhaps most, responded with something between several times a day and weekly. The question became the subject of think pieces, web articles, and fodder for discussion on news and talk shows.

For my part, I think about the Roman Empire nearly every day, because the life of Jesus and the rest of the New Testament fall during this historical period. Beyond that, though, I think about the Roman Empire because it's an interesting thing to think about, as are many historical epochs. In visiting with some of my friends and classmates (many of whom are fellow lovers of history), our other most frequently considered historical blocs are (in no particular order) The Age of Exploration, The American Civil War, The Great War and World War II, The American West, The Founding Fathers, Shogun Japan, The Cold War/Space Race, and a number of others. History has much to teach us. The lessons are there if we have eyes to see them.

The Roman Empire period, though, is particularly instructive. Jesus' earthly ministry and the early church existed in the relative early stages of the Empire. Later, at the height of its power, Rome could be viewed as the last time Western Civilization had unity of politics, religion (Nicene Christianity), and land. There is much to admire and marvel over- aqueducts, roads and concrete, the Coliseum and the Parthenon (much of which still stands today). The Empire had longevity and legacy. Its priorities extended beyond the moment in which it existed- something we do not see much of in our day and time. Every would-be dominant state throughout history has been compared The Roman Empire. We observe its rise and we see the cautionary tale in its fall- Is this the path our culture is on right now?

One of Saint Augustine's most frequently quoted observations is "Bad times, hard times, this is what people keep saying: but let us live well, and times shall be good. We are the times: Such as we are, such are the times." To bring that idea forward: Are we better than the people of the time of the Roman Empire? Are we worse? And where are the answers to those questions going to take us?

Studying history also reminds us of one clear, fundamental truth of the Christian faith: There is only one Kingdom (or empire) that will prevail. St. Paul writes in 1 Corinthians 3, "If anyone among you thinks he is wise in this age, let him become a fool that he may become wise. For the wisdom of this world is folly with God. For it is written, "He catches the wise in their craftiness," and again, "The Lord knows the thoughts of the wise, that they are futile." Whether it is Rome or us, earthly wisdom and ingenuity pales in comparison to the Lord's divine architecture of heaven and earth. Is history interesting? It's fascinating. The Christian, though, studies history with an eye toward Zion. What can history teach me about God's divine plan and sovereignty over the affairs of men? If we humble ourselves, those at times random thoughts about The Roman Empire can call us to remember the Lord's ultimate desire for all of us us to live in his Kingdom in eternal righteousness, innocence, and blessedness.

Thanks to the Bereavement Committee and helpers who provided the meal and opportunity for fellowship with family and friends.


The beautiful plant and lantern given in Charles' memory is a reminder of the kindness and thoughtfulness of a loving church family!
