# Grow in Faith

Reflections on Haiti by Gary Stephan

When I first told people that I would be performing mission work in Haiti, many said, "Why are you going? You can't really change anything." There are many issues affecting Haiti – the lack of a stable government, the lack of natural resources, no infrastructure, companies do not want to go to Haiti, and high unemployment. Looking at these situations, it can appear that anything we do will have little or no impact on the improvement of these situations.

We faced issues ourselves while in Haiti. We didn't always have the supplies we needed; we had only one vehicle to make supply runs; and the language barrier with the Creole speaking population. When we went up to the mountain village to run the medical clinic, we were the only source for medical supplies, so we had to bring everything we thought we would need. With these struggles, there were doubts. Were we doing enough and are we really making a difference? As long as we continued to look at the big things, it was hard to see a difference.

Mother Teresa faced many of the same situations in Calcutta, India. But she wasn't there to change the big picture, but to help those who were being left out. She once stated, "Don't look for big things, just do small things with great love ... The smaller the thing, the greater must be our love."

I was not a direct part of the three clinics since I was working on other projects. But that gave me a perspective that the doctor, nurses, and workers were not seeing. I would watch as a person went into the clinic with a look of concern, but then come out of the clinic (sometimes holding

I visited Haiti in the spring of this year, with three others led by Pastor Dionne. I was made extremely welcome by the people of the Zamar Mission and its outreach posts, whom I met during the 6 day Mission trip. I witnessed a very resourceful people scraping together a living the best they could in circumstances of unemployment at close to 80%. Despite the obvious challenges which confront them, the people of the Zamar community have a very strong faith, display a positive outlook for the future and really look out for each other. They may have very little in terms of material possessions but they have a wealth of love and caring in their extended 'families.'

I had such a positive experience in March, that I wanted to return and continue working with the folks in Zamar; to help improve their quality of life. The children in the school are delightful, and thrive in Zamar's learning environment. Their walk to school is through polluted and dusty streets, yet they manage to look immaculate in their school uniforms when they arrive. The school's facilities are minimal and there is a lack of basic amenities which we take for granted in the United



States. I wanted to apply my skills to improve their environment, so, on this most recent visit we installed the school's first flush toilet and sink with running water. I was so motivated and excited about it.

My second visit will be remembered for the experience of joining a much larger team of people with an age range from 17 to 60 years old. This was an inspirational group, who worked so well together; everybody made such an impact in their own way. It was a real blessing to be with such wonderful people. We shared adventures which we will talk about for many years to come. Such as how seventeen people got into a small pickup truck to return to Croix des Bouquets when our rental van broke down. And the miracle of managing to buy gas in a plastic container from a mountain cabin in the middle of nowhere!

Will I return to Haiti? ...... Yes, you bet I will!

What hit me the most about Haiti is that it's a third world country in our own backyard, just a mere three hours flying time from the US. I come from India, a country like Haiti. However, I have forgotten how valuable basic necessities like clean water, a sanitation system, a public health and education system, roads/highways and just basic infrastructure can be. What we take for granted here is considered a blessing in Haiti.

What moves me is the people still smile and generally are happy. There is no mention of the earthquake last year. Nobody speaks about it. Haitians have moved on and life goes on as usual. No one is complaining about the poverty seen all around them, nor about their government – they are just happy living from day to day. What a beautiful and a simple way of life. I see children bright eyed with scabies all over their bodies, still running around kicking rocks instead of balls.

The church may not be air conditioned but the people are sitting on hard benches, under a tin roof for 6-7 hours and singing their hearts out, praising God for what they have. The children are so dedicated, dressed in their best, with pretty stuff on their hair and when they sing, their voices echo their joyfulness. The church is full of youth, full of a sense of community and the families and young people spend their whole Sunday in dedication to the Lord. When was the last time we did that as a community? When did I really thank the Lord for the blessings I have received? I sincerely believe that we have to look at the Haitians and learn how to see beyond ourselves and our daily comforts. They have found means of adaptation far more superior that can be found in our culture.

### Mark Braverman –Working for Peace

On your brand-new calendars, please mark this date, January 30, 2012, and plan to attend a great event. Mark Braverman will be speaking at the University of South Florida, Tampa, in Room 2708, Marshall Student Center, from 7-9 pm. Come at 6 pm should you want an autographed copy of Braverman's book, *Fatal Embrace*.

Who is Mark Braverman? Mark Braverman's roots are in the Holy Land - his grandfather, a fifth generation Palestinian Jew, was born in Jerusalem, and emigrated to the U.S. as a young man. Growing up in the United States, Braverman was reared in the Jewish tradition, studying Bible, Hebrew literature, and Jewish history. Trained in clinical psychology and crisis management, Braverman devoted his professional career to working with groups and individuals undergoing traumatic stress. Returning to the Holy Land

in 2006, he was transformed by witnessing the occupation of Palestine and by encounters with peace activists and civil society leaders from the Muslim, Christian and Jewish communities.

Why should you attend and encourage others to do so? You should attend because you are a Christian and Christians care about their neighbors. Our neighbors in the Land of the Holy One are in crisis. Mark, once a strong supporter of Israel's policies, will tell you why his views changed and why he is working so hard to find a just peace. Isn't that what we want as Christians? # Seave Others

When Reverend Gene Watson and Reverend Lois Rogers met, they found that they had many things in common. Both had served as missionaries, spent their lives as clergy in the United Methodist Church, raised wonderful children and suffered the loss of beloved spouses. Their friends will tell you that both have effervescent personalities and radiate the love of Lord. What brought them together more than anything else, though, was their love of missions.

After college, Gene, a native of Missouri, served as a Methodist missionary, called a US-2, at a children's home in York, Nebraska. While there, he met She remains a master Guardian to this day. and married Marion Lowry, also a US-2 from Missouri. After four years, he entered seminary and served a total Pasco County that was making toys for children in of 40 years in ministry, including five years on the Bishop's Cabinet. His influence was felt far and wide in Nebraska as he worked to revitalize local churches and communities. Meanwhile, Marion was his partner in ministry, a leader in each community, and a professional advocate for children. Gene and Marion had planned retirement in 2001, but Marion died after a brief illness in the spring of that year.

Lois, a native of New York State, heard God's call to servant ministry in college, and after graduating became a US-2. Two years later she married Jack Rogers, also a US-2, and they became commissioned home missionaries who served in Georgia, Ohio, and Indiana. Both were consecrated diaconal ministers in 1977 and ordained Deacons in 1997. For twenty-three years Lois served as a bridge between the church and community in her work as library media specialist in an inner city school in Hammond, Indiana and as one of

the ministers of First UMC of Hammond. In the fall of 2000, Jack died suddenly.

Gene and Lois married in October 2002 and moved to the Tampa Bay area. Their blended family consists of four adult children, three foster daughters, and seven granddaughters.

For five years, Lois was Associate Pastor at East Lake UMC where she was in charge of adult programming. She was appointed to the Guardian ad Litem Program where volunteers look out for the best interests of abused, abandoned, or neglected children.

Gene became passionate about a group in need. Now the Toymakers of East Lake is a thriving group of over 50 men and women volunteers who have made thousands of wooden cars, trucks, boats, and trains and repaired hundreds of bicycles.

Children in Cooperative Ministries programs have been the recipients of many of these toys. Gene and Lois don't just stop at dropping off the toys, though. They don their festive apparel, gather their elves, and play Santa and Mrs. Claus at the Cooperative Ministries Christmas party.

The Reverends Gene Watson and Lois Rogers-Watson have made an extraordinary difference in the world around them. And, they have been faithful and generous supporters of Cooperative Ministries.

Will you join me in thanking Gene Watson and Lois Rogers-Watson for their service to Christ and our community.




