## Community Recycling Event a Success!



In celebration of God's creation and in an effort to keep recyclable and reusable items out of the landfills, Valley's Earth Care Team sponsored a Community Recycling Event on April 17 in the church's TriMet lot. **AND WHAT A CELEBRATION IT WAS!!!**

The team knew that it would be a busier event than the inaugural event in September 2019 because more community sponsors were there, which would have inspired more guests to participate. We had no idea how busy the event would be!

Here is a recap:

- During the 4 hour event over 440 cars came through! This is 7X the guests that we welcomed in 2019!
- Interstate All Battery Center accepted 1200 pounds of batteries that will be responsibly recycled.
- Computer Drive Connection totally jam packed their 26 foot truck with electronic items to be recycled and reused.
- Agilyx and hearty volunteers accepted enough styrofoam to make at least 15 pickup truck loads to their Tigard location.
- Community Warehouse filled about half of their 26 foot truck with quality furniture and home goods that will go to families in need.
- Love Inc. accepted enough bedding and bath linens to fill half of the Youth House garage. These will go to families in need in Tigard, Tualatin and Sherwood.
- Ridwell accepted plastic film, flexifoam and both usable and unusable textiles that resulted in at least three completely filled service vans full.
- The Youth collected more bags of returnable cans and bottles than were counted (probably around 20.)
- Usable athletic shoes were collected for local agencies that will distribute them: they filled 24 filled packing cartons!
- Non-perishable food donations were collected and added up to over 700#!!!! AND, a collection jar for the CROP walk to end world hunger was generously filled with over \$900 in donations!

### WHEW!

Thank you to all of the volunteers (You know who you are) and thank you for supporting and spreading the word about this event. Valley Community Presbyterian Church did LOTS of good on Saturday, April 17, both for the good of the community and our dear planet Earth!!

## Together Women Rise



### TOGETHER WOMEN RISE

Collective action for global gender equality

The program in May will support TERREWODE in Uganda, which is a Reintegration Program for Obstetric Fistula Survivors.

Although not a topic of conversation among first world populations, those that acquire fistulas around the globe deal with this trauma long after the difficult birth during which it occurred.

Terrewode addresses the social consequences of fistula: the discrimination, stigma, shaming, social isolation, high rates of divorce, and abandonment. Economically, women with fistula are pushed deeper into poverty as they experience workforce discrimination and increased costs for health and hygiene needs. The reintegration program through Terrewode that follows the surgical repair of fistula allows for new beginnings, and the restoration of dignity, purpose and confidence. Educating the community on the risk factors for obstetric fistula is gradually creating cultural shifts and improving overall maternal health in Uganda.

Please join us on Sunday May 16 at 11:30 a.m. to learn more about Together Women Rise and how their selection for this month's grantee project will help promote gender equality for the affected women in Uganda.

## White Easter Dossal

Easter was celebrated on April 4 in remembrance of Christ's resurrection. The sanctuary paraments were changed to white for the 50 days of Easter, which will end on Pentecost.

This year a new white chancel dossal was created to hang behind the cross in honor and fond memory of Jini DeVries. Karen Sandberg and Fran Searce cut and sewed the 40 yards of fabric required. They also oversaw the installation team of Karen and Larry Yakymi, Steve Reese, Carol Powers, and Ruthann and David Marquis. The dossal material was gathered on a rod and hoisted over 25 feet using preinstalled ropes and pulleys. Special thanks to Larry for climbing to the cross-arm and positioning the dossal behind the cross. Butterfly banners, white paraments and commemorative lilies were added.

At the end of May, following Pentecost and Trinity Sunday, June will return to Ordinary Time with the green dossal and paraments.



## Pentecost Offering Supports Outreach to Children, Teens, and Young Adults



On May 23 the church celebrates Pentecost, which commemorates the gift of the Holy Spirit and the birthday of the church. The Holy Spirit remains with us, connecting us with the church of the past, continuing to inspire the church of today, and pointing us to the church of the future. The Pentecost Offering is one of four special offerings our denomination collects during each year. By giving to the Pentecost Offering, we are

nurturing the faith of those who are the church to come – children, youth, and young adults.

The Pentecost Offering helps our youth begin life with a strong start – a solid foundation of faith formed in the first third of life, from childhood through young adulthood. This foundation helps ensure lifelong faith and service. Forty percent of the Pentecost Offering collected by Valley Community Presbyterian Church stays with our congregation to develop and support programs for young people in our church and community. ## Note from St. Matthew Lutheran Pantry



Please thank your congregation for your wonderful food drive donations to the Saint Matthew Lutheran Pantry. Since January your food drives have brought in 2585 lbs. of food. This is such an amazing gift! All the food will go to help low income families and people who have lost jobs in our community.

We are so grateful to have Valley Community Church as a partner church in our food ministry. Between 200 and 225 families receive food each month from the pantry. We have 5 one hour drive-in pantries each week, and we deliver to 12 shut-in families each week. Valley helps serve at 2 or 3 pantries each month as well as delivering food from your food drives. We also support the backpack food program for low income students at Raleigh Park Elementary School. This program started up again in January with 16 families. Teachers and other volunteers delivered to the families during school closures.

You are a vital part of our community's food ministry, and we appreciate all that you are doing to help our neighbors.


## CROP Walk 2021

## Earth Care Corner

For May, I'd like to reflect on the chapter "Water and Climate" from Jane Fonda's book "What Can I Do? My Path from Climate Despair to Action." This element of our environment is basic to all life. Evidence of water, either current or ancient supplies, is the principal element that our space exploration teams are interested in identifying on other planets because its presence indicates that life is, or once was, possible.

Billions of people globally currently lack access to safe and clean water, and climate change will worsen that situation. The Northern Triangle in Latin America (El Salvador, Guatemala, and Honduras) is experiencing decades-long drought affecting the ability of indigenous people to sustain subsistence farming and forcing them into poverty in cities and to the U.S. border. Elsewhere in the world climate change is having similar effects, causing "climate refugees" in the thousands.

Currently, industrial and agricultural pollution and fracking use up water that can't be recovered for human consumption, and that risk the purity of aquifers. The U.N. estimates that half of our planet will lack access to clean water by 2050, and eighty percent of U.S. water managers anticipate water shortages by 2023.

Our water infrastructure is not built to handle the floods and droughts we're seeing. There's been depletion of groundwater in the southern Great Plains and the Southwest U.S., and intense rainfall and flooding in other areas overloads the water systems and causes sewage spills. Algal blooms in the Great Lakes and Florida lakes from fertilizer runoff give off toxins that poison those bodies of water.

### What Can We Do?

- Avoid bottled water and ban its sale in public facilities. Plastic bottles of water contain many more microplastics than tap water, and use lots of petroleum products to transport them. Watch a YouTube video at "[youtube.com/watch?v=Se12y9hSOM0](https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=Se12y9hSOM0)"

- Study "Blue Communities Projects" to protect and promote water as a human right and a public trust.
