ADVENT AND CHRISTMAS AT VALLEY

Advent means coming. During this first season of the Church year, we anticipate the coming of Christ into the world and the coming of Christ into our lives. Advent is a season of Holy waiting; waiting for God's peace to come to earth... waiting for the light of Christ to shine... waiting for the shepherds, the angels, and the Christ child.

Advent lasts for four Sundays, leading up to Christmas Day. During our Advent worship, we prepare the way for our hearts and minds to receive God's greatest gift to us, the birth of his Son. We light the Advent candles, one more each week, as we remember God's promises to us for Hope, Love, Joy and Peace. We hear the prophets' words of warning and promise, and we listen with wonder for the miraculous Gospel story leading to Christ's birth. During this Holy season, we prepare to celebrate the coming of Emanuel, God-with-us!

Sunday, November 28 - First Sunday of Advent

We begin Advent with symbols of the season displayed in the sanctuary. The first candle of Advent symbolizing Hope will be lit.

Saturday, December 4 - The Christmas Tree will be erected and decorated on the front lawn.

Sunday, December 5 - Second Sunday of Advent

The second candle of Advent symbolizing Peace will be lit. The Advent Fair will be held in Davis Hall/Gym from 2:00-4:00 p.m.

Sunday, December 12 - Third Sunday of Advent

The third candle of Advent symbolizing Joy will be lit. The Christmas Pageant will be presented during 10:00 a.m. worship. Children will dramatize the coming and birth of Jesus and the Armonia Choir will sing.

Sunday, December 19 - Fourth Sunday of Advent

The fourth candle of Advent symbolizing Love will be lit. A Christmas Concert featuring Thomas Rheingans and soloists will be held at 3:00 p.m. We are encouraged to invite friends and family to the concert.

Friday, December 24 - Christmas Eve at 8:00 p.m.

The Christ candle will be lit. A candlelight service celebrating the birth of Jesus Christ will be held at 8:00 p.m. with the Sanctuary and Armonia Choirs participating.

Our Christmas celebration continues with services on Sunday, December 26 and Sunday, January 2, 2022.

Together Women Rise



Together Women Rise at Valley will end the year on Zoom. We will meet on Sunday December 19 at 11:30 a.m. to enjoy each other's company on the screen and to learn about this month's featured grantee. Our presenter will take us to Rwanda to begin to understand what young women in that country are confronted with and how Komera is making a difference.

In the local language *komera* means strong and courageous. The non-profit organization, Komera, was founded in 2007 by Margaret Butler, a former primary school teacher and former professional runner, who spent one year living in a remote village in Rwanda. She saw the inequities present and did something about it.

Komera was established in partnership with a local team of social workers who knew and understood the issues that young women were facing. Education was an imperative, but furthermore, they knew that more was needed in order to truly see young women develop into female leaders. Since 2007, Komera has established Rwandan leadership with a focus on holistic care for adolescent girls and their families. This means girls receive healthcare, economic and advocacy training, and community support in addition to education.

The main goals of the program that Together Women Rise is supporting are to provide a pathway out of poverty for both teen mothers and vulnerable adolescent girls. Interventions are designed to transform their futures through education on sexual reproductive health and women's rights, access to family planning and resources, and working to change negative stereotypes that limit women from reaching their full potential.

Mission Endowment Committee Awards Fall 2021 Grants

The Mission Endowment Committee has awarded five grants totaling \$12,850 for Fall 2021. These were approved by Valley's Session in November. The grants support housing, education, medical needs, and social services here in the Portland area and around the world.

- ◆ **Valley Community Presbyterian Church, Afghan Refugee Housing - \$4,200**
This grant will help cover the revenue lost by not renting the house that we're providing for an Afghan refugee family. Please see the article elsewhere in this issue that contains a full description of this project.
- ◆ **Janus Youth Services - \$1,850**
Support the Yellow Brick Road Program which provides first aid and hygiene items for runaway and homeless street youth in the Portland metro area.
- ◆ **YWCA of Greater Portland, Domestic Violence Services - \$1,900**
Work with survivors of domestic violence to secure affordable housing and provide other services so that they can become self-sufficient.
- ◆ **Willamette West Habitat for Humanity - \$2,400**
Support continued construction of homes for low income families in the Denney Gardens Neighborhood.
- ◆ **Ecumenical Ministries of Oregon: Second Home - \$2,500**
Provide funding for a triannual staff strategic planning retreat at Menucha. Second Home's core mission is to provide stable housing for unaccompanied students.

Christmas Joy Offering



Our Christmas service will include a denominational special offering, received once a year, in response to the great gift that we've all been given in the person of the Christ child. The Christmas Joy Offering brings us together to open doors of relief and opportunity, and to relationships that are part of God's story, a part of God's perfect Gift to us.

Half of the Christmas Joy Offering enables the PCUSA Board of Pensions to support the Assistance Program and Emergency Assistance Grants. The Assistance Program helps give stability in retirement for church workers, including pastors, who have served in lower-paying positions, sometimes as Mission workers, with an income supplement. The Emergency Assistance Grant program helps church employees, including pastors, cope with emergencies such as health crises and gaps in employment.


The other half of the Offering helps support three denominational educational institutions. Stillman College, in Tuscaloosa, Alabama, is a historically black liberal arts college founded in 1876 by a Presbyterian pastor in Tuscaloosa. Menaul School, in Albuquerque, New Mexico, is a faith-based, independent co-educational college prep school for grades 6-12. Eighty-four percent of the students identify as racially or ethnically diverse. The Presbyterian Pan-American School in Kingsville, Texas, is a Christian college prep school that educates and empowers young adults for leadership in the global community. It was established to educate Mexican boys, but has attracted students from a number of countries.

Stewardship 2022 Update



Thank you to all who have said “*Count me in*” with their pledge to Valley for 2022. We are grateful for your timely answer to our request for your support as Session continues planning for a busy 2022 for new pastoral positions and programs. For those who have not yet responded, the Stewardship Committee prayerfully requests your quick response.

You should have received your pledge card in the mail. Please mail in your pledge card, bring it to church, or call the church office to share your pledge commitment. We seek your timely support through a pledge to Valley to reach our 2022 goal of \$350,000 in pledges. We can meet this goal with a 5% increase in commitment for those who pledged this year, and a 10% increase in the number of returned pledges, bringing us back to 2019 and 2020 levels.



Extra Styrofoam Collection December 30



Valley's Earth Care team will host a **special extra Styrofoam collection** after Christmas on December 30 from 10:00-11:30 a.m. in Valley's East parking lot. This will be a most excellent way for your family and neighbors to recycle the polystyrene packaging from gifts and gadgets AND prevent it from going into the landfill in Arlington, Oregon.



Valley's Earth Care team has been faithfully collecting Styrofoam and #6 plastics two times every month this past year and taking what has been collected to Agilyx in Tigard. This occurs on the first and third Thursdays each month between 10:00-11:30 a.m. during the same time that nonperishable food is collected for the St. Matthew's Food Pantry.

Agilyx uses a proprietary process to break down the Styrofoam into a form to make new Styrofoam. Their commitment to recycling keeps volumes of Styrofoam out of the landfill and the environment.

Earth Care Corner

Here are some new and repeat eco-friendly ideas to ponder as the holiday season swiftly creeps up on us all! As the website EarthEasy states: *Christmas doesn't have to be a burden on the planet. With a little effort and imagination, we can reduce the environmental impact of the holiday season.*

- * **Buy less.** Not all gifts have to be store bought. Shorten your shopping list both for the number of people that you are giving to and the number of gifts that you are giving. Agree to put a limit on spending and stick to it.
- * **Buy smart.** Look for locally made gifts. Shop for fair trade items. Choose gifts made from recycled materials. Give battery free gifts. Avoid toys that promote violence. Be okay with "re-gifting." If you're giving physical gifts this Christmas, choose ones that are designed to last and won't end up on the landfill in a month or a year's time.
- * **Connect with nature.** Go on a family bird count or take a nature hike. Participate in a nature restoration activity. Decorate a tree for the birds.
- * **Lower the impact of holiday lighting.** Reduce the size of the outdoor lighting displays. Use LED lights both inside and outside for Christmas tree lighting. Turn off those lights at bedtime.
- * **Choose a live tree.** They can be used for 2-3 years, especially if you purchase a small tree in a large pot and then can be planted somewhere special in your yard after that. If you are going for artificial, consider shopping for one at garage or estate sales, rather than purchase a new one.
- * **Make homemade cards.** Last year's calendar or a child's artwork are good places to start.
- * **Find alternatives to wrapping paper.** Avoid glossy foil or metallic paper: These items are NOT recyclable in your curbside bin! Reuse gift wrap whenever you can. Use tape sparingly. Use a cloth bag or even pages from the funny paper. Choose a gorgeous fabric scarf to wrap your gift in – the recipient will love you for the 2-in-1 present. Charity shops and second hand stores are a good place to shop for them.
- * **Reuse/Recycle.** This includes gift packing materials and wrap/ribbon/bows, as well as old electronics and Christmas trees. Reuse gift bags, boxes, tissue paper and ribbon kept from last Christmas. Didn't save any? Make a point to do it this year.
