



his coming Wednesday kicks off another season of Lent. I always look forward to this time of year despite the busy schedule it provides. Every year we kickoff the festivities with our Annual Sue Cobb Memorial Pancake Dinner. We hope you will join us for this event because 1. It honors one of the saints of our congregation who has left behind a legacy of love and service to the congregation, 2. It continues the time honored tradition of using up the dairy products for a feast before the fasting season of Lent begins, and 3. It raises funds to honor our hard-working senior girls to help ease the burden of their education costs. The following day we continue our traditions with both our morning and evening Ash Wednesday Services and then on Thursday Chuck Tanner begins leading the daily Lectionary readings at 7:15am.

I was first introduced to Ash Wednesday and Lent when I was sixteen, my first year in the Presbyterian church. We always had youth group on Wednesdays and on this particular Wednesday our Senior Pastor Rev. Alan Jackson came down to "the barn" during the worship portion of youth group. He spoke a lot about "dust" and we took turns being marked with the ashes. It was surreal to see a room full of more than 80 of us all marked with our ashen crosses. We then spent our small group time talking about "giving something up" for Lent. I felt convicted to give up swearing ... something that was easier said than done. Thanks to accountability from some good friends of mine, that included an intense push-up penalty system, it was something that really never reentered my vocabulary the same way.

Over the next few years I struggled with what felt like glorification of what people would or would not give up and who was giving up the "best" thing for Lent. Thus after hearing a sermon in college on the same topic I chose another path. That year, annoyed with the concept of everyone giving up sugar or soda, I decided to give up tying my shoes. Yes, I am serious, and yes I was being that ridiculous. In what quickly turned out to be a case of doing the right thing for the wrong reasons I was quickly put in my place about my protest. My roommate bought me my first pair of flip flops, and concerned strangers tied my tennis shoes on the street during that rainy March. I had more conversations about God, because of un-tied shoes, than I ever had before. I think I realized how Jonah felt after trying to dodge his call to Nineveh. Most importantly my appreciation and respect for the disciplines associated with Lent rooted themselves permanently into my heart.

The Lenten fast dates back to the times of the Apostles and has been formalized since the First Council of Nicea in 325 A.D. It is a time of preparation, repentance and discipline. It is a chance to get ourselves back into good habits or have the strength to fend off bad ones. In this coming season of Lent whether you give up something bad, or add something good (daily devotional etc.), let it be the spirit of honoring God and his immense love for us.

This hydraulic system means that climbers can take control of their descent, returning to the ground without relying on another person.

Sunday, December 6 Capital Ringers


The ensemble, performing on six octaves of handbells and hand chimes, will present a program of seasonal music, including a light show and audience participation.
