

I doubt if there is any easy time to stop doing the work, to which you have dedicated your life. Some choose to retire after a milestone event: like the dedication of a new building. Some work until they reach a milestone: a certain age or an anniversary of service. Many have to work because they cannot afford to lose their paycheck and end up dying in the pulpit (like two of my former Bowie colleagues). One colleague was asked why he decided to retire, said, "I had a dream and God told me to stop preaching."

In my case, I fainted and fell in Chicago the day after Christmas while visiting my son and his family. The next week my annual physical exam and bloodwork produced some alarming results. My adult children forcefully told me — it is time to stop working and take better care of yourself. I decided in December this would be my last fall as pastor. The only question was the date. So, last night I informed the Session I will be retiring as pastor of CCPC effective May 31, 2020.

I write this with relief and sadness. CCPC is my favorite of the three congregations I have served. For almost 16 years, I have poured myself into it. Together we have accomplished many things. I treasure the friendships in the congregation. Yet, it is time to step aside.

When I have informed people of my decision to retire, I have been asked three questions:

Where will you live? Andrea and I plan to continue living in our home in Bowie. Andrea will continue her policy position with AARP. She cut back to 4 days a week this January. This will allow us some freedom to travel — especially to see our grandchildren in New Jersey and Illinois.

What will you do with your time? Except to play more golf, I don't know. I will figure that out.

Where have you been the past few weeks? I am thankful for the Session granting me three weeks to rest following some Session conflict. I traveled to Charleston, South Carolina (Andrea and I had great fun at the Elizabeth Warren rally with singer John Legend). I sought the trusted counsel of my colleagues in Orlando. Last weekend I visited my sister, my daughter and their husbands in Albany. The time was a blessing as I sorted out my plans for the future.

The Church of Jesus Christ is in the midst of a Reformation. Old patterns are done and new patterns are emerging. The church and its leaders will have to retool for whatever God is bringing our way. It has been a joy serving beside you in this wonderful faith community. Meanwhile, I will be preaching almost every week through May 31.

Sue Cobb Scholarship Fancake Dinner Update

Laurel Cox was asked to speak at the pancake dinner on Tuesday, February 25, about Shrove Tuesday (Fat Tuesday), the Sue Cobb Scholarship Pancake Dinner and Sue Cobb. Below is what she said:

"Today is Shrove Tuesday and tomorrow is Ash Wednesday, the beginning of the 40 days of fasting and prayer called Lent.

The word *shrove* is the past tense of the English verb *to shrive*, which means to obtain absolution for one's sins by way of confession and doing penance. During the week before Lent, sometimes called Shrovetide in English, Christians were expected to go to confession in preparation for the penitential season of turning to God. Shrove Tuesday was the last day before the beginning of Lent on Ash Wednesday, and noted in histories dating back to 1000 AD. Pancakes are associated with the day preceding Lent because they were a way to use up rich foodstuffs such as eggs, milk, and sugar, before the fasting season of the 40 days of Lent. The liturgical fasting emphasized eating plainer food and refraining from food that would give pleasure: In many cultures, this means no meat, dairy, or eggs. (And what is a good way to save eggs for 40 days? Hmm ... Easter eggs?!) Let us prepare our hearts for the coming worship season, and the rejoicing of our Risen Lord!

Sue Cobb Scholarship

The Shrove Tuesday Pancake Dinner is now used as a fundraiser for our Sue Cobb Scholarship. This scholarship is awarded to a graduating High School Senior young woman. All female Seniors are given an application for the scholarship. Because of Sue's commitment to Missions and service – the application has an emphasis on the applicant's mission service (both in the church and the community) The scholarship is awarded each year in June (Women's Sunday or Youth Sunday). The number of applicants, and awards, varies from year to year as you can see from the table cards in front of you. Those seniors who turn in applications are considered, as well as the funds available from your donations this evening – so in the memory of Sue Cobb and her generous life, please consider donating to this scholarship.

Sue Cobb fought a courageous battle against ovarian cancer for more than seven years. Sue was very active at CCPC. She served on Session and was very involved in our Missions. Sue loved, and lived for, serving others. Sue was honored with the 2009 Honorary Life Membership Award from the PWOC (Presbyterian Women of the Church). Sue leaves behind her husband TC, her boys Bert, Ty and Reb, her grandchildren and more friends than we can count!

I was blessed with Sue's friendship for only the last 5 years of her life. Over the years, I have enjoyed hearing those of you who knew her longer tell stories of raising your children together and working together to make this church family what it is today. I, like many of you, watched her battle. Until the end of her life she was still working and serving others. She faithfully served communion with her oxygen tank in tow. She served on Mission Council – legend has it that she called to say she would miss her last meeting because she was in the hospital. Sue introduced Living Waters for the World in her time on Mission Council – recruiting many dear friends to be part of this work. Our church is still working with Living Waters, specifically in Honduras (thank you for that Sue!). My greatest honor was being a part of the legacy of Sue Cobb – teaching Cradle Roll for two of her grandchildren Ben and Savannah … who are no longer babies. Sue was the embodiment of the Proverbs 31 Woman: today, specifically verses 20 & 3"1 –

She opens her arms to the poor and extends her hands to the needy ... and let her works bring her praise at the city gate
