# The Caller

#### **December 1, 2013**

hen Andrea and I got married almost 20 years ago (Feb 5, 1994), my brother Paul, who served as best man, offered a simple but powerful toast to "Second Chances." Do you ever wish you could have a second chance?

A second chance to say something different, to have not said anything at all? A second chance to repair a relationship? A do over so you could have taken advantage of some opportunity? A second chance to chase a dream you deferred or follow through on a responsibility you avoided? If you're anything like me, you can easily think of several things for which you wouldn't mind a second chance.

This past Sunday, we read Luke's depiction of the crucifixion of Jesus. I noticed just how many second chances there are here. The obvious one is that in Luke's gospel alone Jesus forgives those who crucify him — all of those who crucify him. I take Luke to mean both the active participants and the passive bystanders. And then there's "The Good Thief" who names his own sins and then asks to be remembered by Jesus. Remarkably, Jesus says to him, "Even today you will be with me in Paradise."

Jesus gave a lot of people a second chance. We remember that Peter denied Jesus and yet Jesus gave him another chance to lead his church. This is one of the key themes of Jesus' death and resurrection: not simply that we have a second and *final* chance, but rather that we always have available to us another opportunity for life, grace, mercy, and forgiveness. The gospel is about second chances.

Most of us will be gathering with friends and family for Thanksgiving. It has become a popular practice, even in non-Christian homes, to spend a few moments before diving into the turkey and fixings to go around the table and share those things and people in life in which we are most thankful for. Maybe you can do something different this year. Invite people to call to mind one of those things for which they long to have a second chance. A do over. Give them a chance to name the missed or bungled opportunity that they are going to try to correct and offer a prayer of encouragement for the second chance and new life Jesus offers us.

We ask for second chances every week as part of our prayers of confession. Each week during the silent confession we are invited to take stock of our hurt and the hurt we have caused, and to accept Jesus' offer of healing. It is part of my duty and delight to declare that by royal fiat and divine command, Christ the King has granted to us a second chance. Christ sends us out after worship with the freedom to repair those relationships that need repaired, amend our speech or actions, and to live without the burden of regret we have carried for too long.

This thanksgiving season, let us all give thanks for the grace and courage to receive God's gift of grace, then go out and proclaim it by how we live and serve.

Christmas Families

Christmas Families is our annual community outreach where we receive referrals from the Prince George's County Public Schools and the Bowie Interfaith Food Pantry of children in need of a little help at Christmas time. We "adopt" the children (ages infant through grade 12) and provide them with an outfit of clothing (top and pair of pants) and a toy or fun gift. We also provide a replenishment of school supplies for the elementary school age children, and groceries to provide a traditional Christmas dinner and some extras to carry the family through about one week.

Christmas Families sign up is in Dodds Hall beginning at 9:00 am and continuing after the 10 am service. There are about 60 children still needing to be adopted. Sign up sheets for other volunteer opportunities are also available.
