convenience when you know that it won't last very long. It won't be long now.

I did find one good piece of news. Federal health authorities reported a 43 percent drop in the obesity rate among 2- to 5-year-old children over the past decade. This is the first broad decline in an epidemic that often leads to lifelong struggles with weight and higher risks for cancer, heart disease, and stroke. The trend came as a welcome surprise to researchers. New evidence has shown that obesity takes hold young: children who are overweight or obese at three to five years old are five times as likely to be overweight or obese as adults.

The reason for the good news is not surprising. Pre-schools are allowing more time for children to run around outside (more activity). Young children also are consuming fewer calories and there has been a dramatic decrease in the amount of surgery beverages children drink. The article below this discussed the USDA proposing a ban on junk food advertising in schools. Duh! Why are they allowed to advertise in the first place? Maybe there is hope for the next generation.

So, it's off to the gym to get my body ready for Tuesday night softball and Wednesday night golf league. The long hard slog is almost over and before you know it the advertisements for Christmas shopping on Thanksgiving Day will be everywhere.
