October was a busy month at Ka'iulani Elementary.

If we were looking, those of us in the choir could see them returning to school afterward to be picked up by their parents.


On October 21, the whole school was involved in their Annual Kaʻiulani Dav

celebration. All students in every grade level danced and/or sang. I saw two of our own Sunday School students, Charles and Kingston perform with their classes and they did a wonderful job. The Ka'iulani Cheerleaders also did cheer and hula. The Royal Hawaiian Band provided prelude and instrumental music. The Ahahui Ka'iulani was represented by Coline Aiu, who handed out awards to students who played leading roles in the day's activities with artwork, written compositions, and emceeing. I was so impressed by the level of participation by everyone in the school community and the high quality performances by the children. When I complimented Principal Puletasi, she said, "It is our honor to be at this school. This is one way we can repay that honor."

The fifth graders also attended a celebration at The Princess Ka'iulani Hotel on October 24 to present song and hula to the guests, in honor of the Princess.

Finally, On October 25, they had their twice annual Town Hall meeting for the families of Ka'iulani Elementary. The primary purpose is to present necessary information to the school community, but Principal Puletasi and the School Community Council always want to make sure it is fun too. So after learning about test scores and necessary information on the sewer system, everyone was rewarded to 2 family learning activities presented by Honolulu Community Action Program (HCAP): a DIY aquaponics system, and DIY popsicle stick catapult – complete with gummy bears to launch. A yummy dinner of chicken and rice with tossed salad was served beforehand, and door prizes were distributed throughout to make things even more exciting than flying gummy bears!

We are blessed to have such a wonderful school in our community!

Pledge income news for you continues to be good news. October pledge income totaled \$12,697 – this total is the third highest pledge income in a month for this year.

Through October, ten months into 2016, pledge income totals \$113,117 and this amount is \$8,109 ahead of last year.

Last year the last two months in the year were good months for pledge income. In November of 2015 pledge income was \$10,367, and in December pledge income was \$10,310. This year we are actually doing better than that on a monthly basis, so we might be able to stay ahead of these monthly totals.


